ing tips. Learn about boating and how to stay safe on the water. Talk to experts about Arizona's wildlife, fishing, hunting and more. Visit with more than 150 exhibitors, including outdoor recreation and conservation groups, government agencies, and commercial vendors of outdoor products and

The department will auction off its annual collection of wildlife assets at the Expo. Sets of antlers, hides, skulls and head mounts, as well as wildlife artwork and taxidermy - all seized during law enforcement investigations, obtained from animals killed in vehicle collisions, or acquired through donations — will be put on the auction block both days. Funds generated from the auction are used to purchase equipment and technology used in the investigation of wildlife crimes and to protect the state's wildlife resources.

Concessionaires will have food and beverages available for purchase, and many accept only cash — ATMs will be on site. There is a nominal charge for ammunition at some of the target shooting venues.

Expo hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday and 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Sunday. The Outdoor Expo is easy to find, located on Carefree Highway, about 1/2 mile west of I-17 in Phoenix. More specifically, it's at 4044 W. Black Canyon Blvd, Phoenix (exit I-17 at Carefree Highway).

Lake Havasu Boat Show Adds Second Venue To Accommodate Expanding Exhibitor Demand

If the 26th Annual Lake Havasu Boat Show coming April 7-9 to Lake Havasu State Park is any indicator, the recreational boating industry is on the brink of its best year in a decade.

"[Even when we were still] two months out from our opening day at the Lake Havasu Boat Show and we've already exceeded the amount of sold display space from a year ago by nearly 50 percent," commented boat show producer, Bob Brown.

"It's a combination of new companies and products wanting to target the Lake Havasu market as well as local dealerships and businesses requesting larger spaces. It has created a situation where we have no choice but to expand into the new Windsor 3 lot at the State Park rather than turn exhibitors

The Lake Havasu Boat Show, co-sponsored by JetRenu and Mohave State Bank, and presented by the Lake Havasu Marine Association, is already the largest outdoor boat show in Arizona, Nevada and California. "The 2017 Lake Havasu Boat Show will be a challenge for guests to see it all in just one-day," said Brown.

"We're talking about a boat show that will encompass more than eight football fields of boats, marine engines, trailers and a myriad of boating accessories and services. Virtually every type of boat from 12' to over 40' will be on display, some valued as much as one million dollars. Probably

Make sure the vessel's registration is current before heading out on the water. It's one of the most important boating requirements needed to operate a watercraft on Arizona waterways

The registration fee is determined by watercraft length and ranges from \$20 to \$66 for Arizona residents and \$100 to \$495 for non-residents. Skip the line and renew your watercraft registration online at

Know the Rules: Learn to identify "Navi-Aids"



Arizona law enforcement agencies write many citations for "failure to obey naviga-tion laws." You can help ensure the safety of all on the

water by learning to identify these common navigational aids.



Information

Squares indicate where to find food, supplies, repairs, etc. and give directions and other information.

Controlled

Circles indicate a controlled area such as speed limit, no fishing or anchoraing, ski only or no skiing, or "slow, no wake."



Exclusion

Crossed diamonds indicate areas off-limits to all vessels such as swimming areas, dams, and spillways.



Danger

Diamonds warn of dangers such as rocks, shoals, con-struction, dams, or stumps. Always proceed with caution.

Other Non-Lateral Markers

Safe Water Markers are white with red vertical stripes and mark mid-channels or fairways. They may be passed on either



Inland Water Obstruction Markers are white with black vertical stripes and indicate an obstruction to navigation. You should not pass between these buoys and nearest shore.

Mooring Buoy

Mooring Buoys are round and white with a blue horizontal band and are found in marinas and other areas where vessels are allowed to anchor.

Note, the following actions are il-

Willfully damaging, removing, interfering with, or tying up to a navagation buoy not intended for mooring

◆ Mooring, anchoring, or fastening to shore for more than 14 consecutive days any vessel on public waters.

Need to borrow a life jacket?

Visitors to lakes Pleasant, Havasu, Saguaro or Mohave needing a life jacket can borrow one at Life Jacket Loaner Stations near each lake's boat ramps.

Stations contain jackets for infants to adults. Please return the jackets so they can be used by others.

Wet Winter Brings Rising Lake Levels At Roosevelt Lake

Here's what you need to know to plan a great Spring Break!

The start of boating season is almost here and you can expect water levels at Roosevelt Lake to be higher than they have been in years!

The past few months of winter brought more than expected rain and snowfall to the area around Roosevelt Lake, as well as to the higher elevations in northern Arizona. Salt River Project reports from late February indicate that Roosevelt Lake is nearly 60 percent full.

As the weather warms heading into Spring Break and boating season, snowmelt it expected to increase runoff into the lake with preliminary reports indicating the lake could surpass levels of more than 80 percent, which has not been seen in years. 

BoatUS Members Are Asked To Petition Re: Ethanol Policy

Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS) is asking its more than half-million members — and any recreational boat owner concerned with having a safe fuel supply — to petition the Trump administration and Congress to reform the ethanol mandate, also known as the Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS).

In a communication to members, BoatUS urged boaters to go to Fix the Ethanol Mandate to easily send a communication to their legislator in Congress and President Trump.

"Boaters must act now to get a fix to

"Boaters must act now to get a fix to ethanol policy rolling in the new year," said Government Affairs Manager David Kennedy. "Our members have an important role in this process and we're counting on them to make their voices heard."

In its communication to members, BoatUS notes:

Gasoline with more than 10 percent ethanol has been shown to damage boat engines. A study by the National Renewable Energy Laboratory conclusively demonstrated that E15 (15 percent ethanol) damages boat engines.

You could put the wrong fuel in your boat. While gas blends greater than 10 percent ethanol are prohibited for use in recreational boats under federal law, a 2016 Harris Poll found that 64 percent of consumers were not sure or did not pay attention to the type of gas they used. As the RFS forces E15 and higher blends into the market, the chance of misfueling will increase. Pumps dispensing blends greater than 10 percent ethanol are only required to display a small orange warning sticker.

ing sticker.

Higher ethanol blends are becoming more common. E15 and higher ethanol blends can now be found in at least 23 states, often at the very same roadside gas station pumps dispensing E10 fuel. Boaters have to be extra vigilant to prevent misfueling.

You could face big repair bills: 87 percent of readers of a prominent boating industry publication reported engine damage caused by ethanol when E10 was used. Higher ethanol blends such as 15, 20 and even up to 85 percent ethanol, will cause even more damage to boat engines

Can you count on your engine when you need it? Boat engines that are unreliable due to ethanol fuel issues are a safety concern for every boater.

Gas without any ethanol (E0) is becoming harder to find. The RFS artificially limits its supply of ethanol-free (E0), a fuel that many boat owners prefer to protect their engine and ensure trouble-free operation.

Passed in 2005, the Renewable Fuel

Passed in 2005, the Renewable Fuel Standard requires the blending of biofuels such as corn-ethanol into the nation's



Boaters, Watercraft Users Urged To 'Spring Aboard' With Safety Course

The Arizona Game and Fish Department (AZGFD), in partnership with the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA), is encouraging the state's boating and watercraft users to Spring Aboard and prepare for the boating season by enrolling in a safety education course.

Spring Aboard is a national campaign that runs from March 19 to 25 and encourages boaters to protect themselves and their passengers by taking a safety course before stepping onto a boat or watercraft. This year, those who complete one of AZGFD's free boating safety courses will be eligible to receive a free watercraft rental.

Courses Free Of Charge

"Boating is a great family friendly activity, but only if it's done safely and responsibly," said Josh Hoffman, AZGFD Boating Safety Education coordinator. "The best way to ensure everyone on the water is having a great time is by taking a boating safety course. And because the Arizona Game and Fish Department offers them free of charge, there's really no rea-

son not to sign up for one today.'

Additionally, those who successfully complete a course are better informed on how to avoid an accident or tragedy on the water

In 2015 nationwide, 71 percent of the 626 watercraft-related deaths involved a vessel where the operator had never taken a safety course, according to U.S. Coast Guard statistics. It's with that statistic in mind that NASBLA developed and produced Spring Aboard, utilizing a grant from the U.S. Coast Guard.

Education Matters

"We know that an educated boater is safer on the water," NASBLA President Stephanie Weatherington said. "If a boater has taken a boating safety education course, the likelihood of their time spent on the water being a safe and enjoyable experience is much greater."

Most states require proof of completion of a boating education course for operators of some powered vessels. During the Spring Aboard campaign, many course providers, including AZGFD, will offer incentives or course discounts for students



who enroll in or complete a course.

There's A Course For Everyone

"With today's wide variety of courses available, there's a course for everyone's schedule," Weatherington said. "Boaters have many ways to get educated, from classroom courses offered by the Coast Guard Auxiliary and United States Power Squadrons to online offerings available anytime day or night. There's no reason to head out on the water without knowing what you're doing."

AZGFD offers free courses in Phoe-

AZGFD offers free courses in Phoenix and Lake Havasu City monthly to provide water users the information and tips needed to stay safe while on the water. Each year many deaths and injuries

on Arizona's waterways are the result of people who don't know how to operate a watercraft properly or how to act to avoid placing themselves in danger.

The department's courses include instruction on the basic skills needed to safely operate a boat or personal watercraft, trailering your vessel, navigational rules, buoys, anchoring, legal requirements, boating emergencies, watersports and paddling. In addition, most insurance companies offer a discount on boat or watercraft insurance rates for completing a course.

The department also reminds watercraft users that all boats, including paddleboards, must have a wearable life jacket for every passenger onboard and those 12 years old and younger must wear a life jacket at all times, under state law. Users should also check to make sure a life jacket fits properly by ensuring there is no excess room above the openings of the jacket and that it does not ride up over the chin or face.



SELF-DEFENSE INSURANCE

Gun Owners Should Definitely Consider This Protection

BY JOHN ANDERSON

I'm assuming that if you have a Concealed Carry Permit it's because you actually carry a weapon and would be willing to use it to defend yourself or your loved ones if your lives were being threatened. You may think that self-defense is cut and dried, but even here in Arizona, there are cases where, even though it seems to be a clear case of self defense, the shooter goes to jail, gets charged with a criminal offense, and could ultimately lose, even though he whole-heartedly believes that his shooting was completely justified.

There Are Many Reasons

There are a lot of reasons why this happens. Prosecutors often want to make a name for themselves, or they feel pressured by rioters or threats from groups of voters. Sometimes — often, actually — the person who was defending himself hangs himself by his words.

Consider the case of the hockey dad, who was convicted of killing a hockey coach, whom he only punched, but the guy had an aneurism or something and died. Odds are, he would have been fine except for what he said to the policeman. He said, "He (hockey coach) wasn't afraid of me, and I wasn't afraid of him". Bingo.

If you aren't afraid, then it's not selfdefense. Lesson number one in using any weapon for self-defense: When the police come, cooperate and do what they tell you to do. But say *nothing* except "I was afraid for my life". Then tell them you will cooperate fully, *after* your attorney shows up. Then shut up, even if the police bait you.

What if you don't have an attorney? It's not like we all keep a criminal defense attorney's name and number handy. Plus, do you know how much they cost? Lots. Be prepared to be cuffed, thrown in the back of the police car, and booked into iail. Now

you're facing bail.

All of this adds up quickly, and the nightmare has just started. What if you *are* criminally charged? How will you pay for an attorney? Do you really want to take your chances with a public defender? Your insurance, even if you have an umbrella policy, will not pay for something you did delib-erately. But there is insurance for self-defense. Actually, many companies offer this kind of insurance.

Things To Remember

When you are deciding which self-de-fense insurance to buy, there are a couple of things to remember. Most of them reimburse you for attorney fees and such after you are acquitted. They pay a retainer up front, but that's it until it's all over. Most of them will also pay for civil suit costs, but that is also after it's all over. You simply get reimbursed.

The Armed Citizens Defense Network has a panel of experts who will look at the circumstances and cut you a check for law-yers and expert witnesses before the trial if they determine that your use of force was justified. They'll also pay for self-defense other than guns, which not all companies do. Most of them also have quite a bit of education available. Some will send you CDs, others have monthly magazines, some have online videos and/or educational content.

Only You Can Answer

Some of the self-defense insurance companies also pay for things like psychological support after the fact, interrogation and grand jury protection, aftermath cleanup, and compensation for loss of income while you're in court. Costs vary widely, and some offer three or even four levels of coverage, with discounts to add your spouse. What level of protection do you need? Only you can answer that.

For a truly justified shooting, a retainer of a few grand for a really good lawyer will probably have you back home in a couple

ARIZONA: MARCH 15TH DEADLINE

Public Comments Regarding Target Shooting Needed Now

It is imperative that sportsmen and women speak now about the Draft Target Shooting Plan for Sonoran Desert National Monument.

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) released for public comment a plan that will determine what lands within the Sonoran Desert National Monument (SDNM) will be closed to target shooting.

It was BLM's intent through an earlier management plan to close the SDNM to target shooting. If it had not been for the intervention of the National Rifle Association (NRA), the SDNM would already be closed to shooters. The BLM was encouraged to revise the management plan and in an about-face, it proposed that the entire SDNM be open to shooting. But, the proposal lacked the required documentation to support that recommenda-tion and the BLM was promptly sued. This is the third and likely final round

over the future of target shooting in the SDNM. It is imperative that all sports-men and women who find it important to keep our Federal lands open to hunting



and shooting take this draft plan seriously by reading it and submitting individual

of days. That is, unless the prosecutor decides to use your case to get himself some exposure. As I said before, what you consider to be absolutely justified can be viewed (or twisted) by others. Even if your attackers were drunk and stoned and chasing (unimpaired) you, your act of self defense could end up putting you in jail for a long time and costing you a ton of money, even if you ultimately get set free.

I did some research and made a chart of four different self-defense insurance companies. I listed what their Web sites say about their coverage, but let me make it clear that my chart is not necessarily 100 percent complete. To know exactly what insurance covers, you need to read the policy. Carefully.

Fishing At Lake Powell Is Incredible

Quality of life is measured by the amount of time spent fishing."

February was an excellent month for great fishing results in the southern lake. We found great spooning results in early February with a fish count of 75 stripers

Then, later in the month, we caught 38 stripers while trolling and casting.

Spoons did not work on that trip.

When we headed uplake to see how conditions had changed, we were prepared to give the stripers any presentation they wanted. The fish did not disappoint us; in fact, we were amazed at what happened.

Following reports from the previous day, we went to the back of the canyon and started spooning when a few shad or striper traces were seen on the graph. Our spoon were ignored by the stripers seen on the graph. We went looking for cooperative fish by trolling while watching the graph.

In Short Order

In short order, 12-14 inch (planktoneating) stripers were caught randomly on Lucky Craft XD78 pointers in ghost and chartreuse shad colors. There was no real pattern or many fish seen on the bottom but the small (best eating size) fish were caught regularly. After 1.5 hours, we had 10 fish in the cooler and we moved on

Heavy Run-Off Fills Many Of Arizona Lakes

Tip Of The Week

Three years ago, the world record redear sunfish was taken out of Lake Havasu. Hector Brito caught a 5.80-pound redear sunfish on Sunday, Feb. 16, 2014. Redear sunfish have grown to trophy

size in Lake Havasu. Many are in the 2-pound range and larger are regularly caught at this 19,300-acre impoundment on the Colorado River, formed by Parker

Bluegill and redear can be caught around structure such as docks, vegetation, or artificial structure using mealworms, nightcrawlers, or small crappie

The Reel Deal

The big news recently has been heavy run-off and high water levels that have resulted in refilled lakes such as Kaibab Lake near Williams, which has filled for the first time in two years. Ashurst Lake, pictured, is full.

Another boat was found in the distance so we pulled up close to get a fish report. They were hovering over a striper school trying to spoon them up so we joined in. In short order, the school responded and we hooked 2-3 pound stripers regularly. Action was quick and intense while the school was active.

Occasionally we saw a single threadfin shad come to the surface and swim quickly away to avoid predation. The striper school was actively attacking a shad ball and we were lucky enough to be there for the action. After 15 minutes, the deep schools moved on and catching on spoons quit but not before we placed another 15 large stripers in the cooler.

Awesome To See The Attack

The other boat left to search for the striper school, but those shad swimming along the surface made me pick up the spinning rod and toss Pointers to shallow chasing stripers. There were a few stripers near the surface and an occasional catch was made with a long cast and a stopand-go retrieve. We even did the "figure 8 musky retrieve" with the lure near the boat and caught a few trailing stripers within 5 feet of the boat. That was awesome to see them attack the lure within plain sight.

While all this was going on, I heard

random splashes in the distance and thought gizzard shad must be jumping in the water that had warmed to 56 degrees in the back of the canyon. Another big splash sounded behind me and my focus switched from stripers swimming under the boat to the shoreline.

I looked up in time to see a pod of shad jump out of the water followed by a 3-pound striper within two feet of the shoreline. I could not believe my eyes. I had just witnessed a striper 'boil' in February. Unbelievable!

In The Perfect Spot

Later, I added up the events and realized that the school of shad the stripers were chasing below the boat went shallow with the striper school close behind. We moved 20 yards closer to shore and cast the same lures to the bank. Stripers hit the lures on every cast and hooked up half the time. We were in the perfect spot with the right lures and caught lots of fish.

I could not stand it any longer and put

on a top water lure. I really wanted to catch a topwater fish in February. After 20 casts, I knew it was not going to happen so I changed back and caught more stragglers on shallow-running crankbaits. The action slowed and we were "reely" tired from reeling in so many fish in a short

Watch The Weather

The weather forecast was for wind to blow in the afternoon and we were completely satisfied with an amazing fishing day, so we headed in. We filleted 55 stripers at the cleaning station.

Data for this report was collected on

the last sunny, warm day before a cold winter storm arrived. It was the lull be-fore the storm. Wait for the wind to stop blowing and temperature to rise again before trying to duplicate the events reported here.

Fishing at Lake Powell is incredible. At press time, lake elevation was 3, 594, and water temperature was 40-54F.



Kaibab Lake

Fishing likely will be unpredictable with changing conditions. Fish react to conditions and anglers must react to the fish. Anchor up to this rule: Find the bait, find the fish.

Water has been being let out of Horseshoe Lake, and Bartlett Lake is now full (or more).

With some stable weather, the time could be prime for great striper fishing at lakes such as Pleasant, Mead and Mohave. Finally, at Pena Blanca Lake, the lake is full and water quality problems have improved — trout stockings have finally been underway. It was scheduled to be stocked the week of Feb. 27.

Stocking Report

In early February, these lakes were stocked: Saguaro Lake, Canyon Lake, Fortuna Pond, La Paz County Park La-goon, and Pond, Cluff Res. #3, Roper Lake, Dankworth Ponds, - Goldwater (upper), Dead Horse Lake, and Verde River (middle).

More recently, the stocking schedule included the Dead Horse lakes. Goldwater Lake, Saguaro Lake, Red Mountain Lake, Cluff Pond, Dankworth Pond, Parker Canyon Lake, and Roper Lake.

Filling And Spilling: Flagstaff Area Lakes Highest In Years

A recent influx of snow and subsequent run-off is giving many Flagstaff area lakes a refill. During the past two years, water levels at Kaibab Lake near Williams had been far too low to stock fish. Thanks to recent heavy rains, the lake (pictured) is full and spilling.

All lakes in the Flagstaff region are ice

free. The Arizona Game and Fish Department will not be stocking all lakes, and the ones that will be stocked will not get fish until after March 1.

Other Updates From The Region
Dogtown Lake, near Kaibab on the
south side of I-40, should be full. Anglers who can get into Dogtown might catch some of the holdover rainbows and browns since spring fishing can be pretty good. The lake has probably picked up 10 to 11 feet of depth since December and so the fishing might be a little slow, but the

trout should be feeding.
Ashurst Lake is full. The road to Ashurst Lake remains closed and is very muddy and there are some heavy snow

Industry Angered

New U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service policy blindsides fishing community.

On the day before President Obama left office, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service issued an edict to phase out the use of traditional fishing tackle on the hundreds of thousands of square miles of public lands under its management.

FOUR GREAT OUTDOOR PLACES NEAR TUCSON

This Is The Perfect Time Of Year To Visit

This is the perfect time of year for an outdoor adventure in Tucson. The weather is great and the wildflowers should be amazing this year after all the rains we've had all winter. All four of these places offer nice hikes (or at least walks), and all four of them let you see different aspects of the glory of the outdoors around Tucson.



Madera Canyon

Saguaro National Park

Saguaro National Park is actually two districts — one to the east of Tucson called the Rincon Mountain District, and one to the west called the Tucson Mountain District. The eastern district encompasses elevations up to 8000 feet and has over 128 miles of trails. It's gorgeous, and even if you just take a scenic drive through it, make sure you stop at the visitor center and at least go to the little nature trail called the Desert Ecology Trail. This trail is handicapped and stroller accessible and it's very pretty and easy.

Thicker Saguaros, Great Views

The western Tucson Mountain District is lower in elevation and this beautiful desert has thicker saguaros and great views. If you are going to the Arizona Sonora Desert Museum and you are coming from the north, it's easy to take exit 246 or 248 and head east to the park, and you can drive through it on the way to the desert museum. That's what we did, and the visitor center was a lot of fun with a nice gift shop and a display inside. The

Arizona Sonora Desert Museum is actually directly south of the National Park, and the road through the park goes right to the museum.

Visitor Centers

The visitor centers at both districts are open every day except Christmas from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. There is no fee to enter the park. To see a map and directions to the two parts of the park, go to www.saguaronationalbark.com.



Mountains Around Sabino Canyon

Sabino Canyon

Sabino Canyon is a beautiful little area that is practically in town. It's just inside the boundary of the Coronado National Forest east of Tucson. There are tram rides that will take you up the canyon and there are nine stops along the way. We got off at the farthest point, opting to walk back down and enjoy the scenery.

Trams And Tours

Trams come along every half hour or so and you can just hop on if you get tired. There are lots of gorgeous trails, and Sabino Creek is beautiful. We saw all kinds of birds and lizards on our little walk and

we thoroughly enjoyed it.

There is a \$5 per vehicle fee to enter the Canyon, and the tram ride (2 miles) is \$10 for adults, \$5 for kids 3-12. There is also a narrated 45-minute, 3.8-mile tour into the foothills. Coronado Recreation passes are valid here as well as at Mt. Lemmon and Madera Canyon. They are \$5 for a day pass or \$20 for an annual pass. For seniors (62+ and a U.S. citizen), the annual pass is just \$10.

Strenuous Or 'Strollable'

Sabino Canyon offers some steep and

strenuous hikes as well as the stroll downhill along the road. They also have night-time tram rides three times a month from April through November. For more information about the night rides, call them at (520)749-2327. Sabino Canyon has a visitors' center with a gift shop, open 8 am to 4:30 pm every day except Christmas and Thanksgiving. They have restrooms and picnic grounds as well.

Madera Canyon

Madera Canyon is a must-see if you love birds. It's actually a world-class birding destination. It's just off I-19 east of Green Valley, which is south of Tucson. We stayed in Green Valley then went east at Exit 53 to White House Canyon Road, turning on Madera Canyon Road. The canyon is gorgeous — beautiful forests, a trickling creek, and lots of peace and quiet because it's inside the Coronado National Forest in the Santa Rita Mountains. A day pass is \$5, and there are lots of great trails — some strenuous — plus amazing bird watching. There are picnic tables and restrooms.

A Lodge, Cabins, Casitas

The easy trails are in the lower canyon and some are handicapped accessible, while the tougher trails take you up the mountain. There is also a campground, an amphitheater, and the Santa Rita Lodge which offers cabins and casitas. The Lodge also has a gift shop, so even if you're just there to hike, make sure to stop in for souvenirs. The Coronado Pass (see under Sabino Canyon, above) is accepted here, or a day pass is \$5 per vehicle.

Arizona Sonora Desert Museum

This amazing place deserves at least half a day to get the full benefit of all it has to offer. It's open every day of the year: October through February, from 8:30 a.m.-5:00 p.m., and March through September, from 7:30 a.m.-5:00 p.m. From June through August, the hours are Sunday through Friday 7:30 a.m. – 5:00 p.m., Saturdays 7:30 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. They suggest at least two hours to see the whole place, so they recommend you get there by 4:00. But, I'm sayin' be there in the morning! Most of the Desert Museum is outdoors and it gets pretty darn hot in summer

It's Like A Zoo

There are lots and lots of desert animals at the museum, so many that it's a lot like a zoo in some respects. But animals are smarter than people sometimes — if it's hot, they're going to hide in the shade and sleep. So if you want to see plenty of animals, make sure you're there when they are out and about.

Volunteers Can Help Spotlight Endangered Black-Footed Ferrets

Survey results shine light on recovery effort in Aubrey Valley, on Double O Ranch.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department is seeking volunteers to assist with spotlighting efforts to help document the population of endangered black-footed ferrets in Aubrey Valley and on the Double O Ranch near Seligman.

As part of the recovery effort, the department has scheduled two spring spot-lighting projects — March 9-12 and April 6-9 (the department also conducts two spotlighting projects in the fall). The spotlighting method involves using

high-powered lights to locate and identify black-footed ferrets. Their eyeshine is reflected by the spotlight and helps surveyors with identifying and locating these elusive, nocturnal carnivores

Volunteers must have the ability to stay attentive from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. while spotlighting for black-footed ferrets and use, or learn how to use, a Global Positioning System (GPS). Volunteers can sign up by e-mailing azferret@azgfd.gov

Over 25,000 Sandhill Cranes Now In Sulphur Springs Valley

The Arizona Game and Fish Department is estimating there are more than 25,000 sandhill cranes in the Sulphur Springs Valley in southeastern Arizona, with the largest concentration of 15,343 at Whitewater Draw Wildlife Area in Mc-

The Willcox Playa area has 8,291 cranes, the Safford Valley/Duncan area 846, Bonita 775, and there are less than 100 at Crane Lake and elsewhere in the area. Game and Fish conducted its annual crane count in the valley Jan. 6.

Whitewater Draw usually has the largest number of cranes, but a lack of runoff into the draw from the Mule Mountains as well as dense grass growth there resulted in the cranes seeking alternate

roosts elsewhere in 2016.

The bird-watching community and others recently contributed more than \$11,000 to helping maintain the draw, a natural drainage, as a wetland. To contribute, go to https://draw.azgfd.gov/ WhitewaterDonation

The cranes usually fly out as a group at dawn to feed, gleaning grain from farmers' fields. Most of the cranes follow this feeding pattern, but some linger in or near their roosts. They return from feeding between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m.

The cranes typically begin to arrive in mid-September to early October. They begin to leave approximately mid-February, sometimes departing all at once, but others may stay until the middle of March.

industry," said Gudes. Gudes further said, "In the limited instances where lead fishing tackle is demonstrated to harm local wildlife populations, the sportfishing industry supports actions to minimize or eliminate these impacts. However, unnecessary and sweeping bans such as this Director's Order will do nothing to benefit wildlife populations and instead will penalize the nation's 46 million anglers and hurt recreational fishing-dependent jobs.

Should Have Had Input

Gudes concluded, "A sound, sciencedriven and durable policy could've been crafted with input from industry and the

broader recreational fishing community. We are hopeful that new leadership at the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will repeal this Director's Order and develop public policy in a way that is open, inclusive and based on science."

- Authorizing a third-party vendor to process new watercraft registrations, transfers, renewals and duplicate registra-

- · Duplicate decal and certificate number fee to \$8



only completed surveys can be used in

the reporting process.
"There are nearly limitless riding opportunities and Arizona offers some of the best views available," said Nathan Gonzalez, AZGFD public information officer. "In addition to guiding future trail development, the results of this survey are vital to helping AZGFD anticipate current and future safety and education program needs. Our goal is to ensure

our education methods are adequate to meet the needs of our growing OHV community.'

The economic impact study was last completed in 2002 and found that OHV recreation in Arizona had a \$4.25 billion impact. In addition, the activity supported nearly 37,000 jobs, contributed to \$1.1 billion in household incomes and added \$187 million to annual state tax revenues.
