Alcohol and Boating: A Deadly Combination

Arizona law prohibits anyone from operating a power-driven vessel while under the influence of alcohol or any drug that causes the person to be even slightly impaired. Alcohol and drugs can cause impaired balance, blurred vision, poor coordination, impaired judgment and slower reaction time. These contribute to nearly one-third of all fatal boating accidents

If convicted of OUI or "Extreme OUI," a person can be fined up to \$2500 and jailed for up to six months. Subsequent convictions and "Aggravated OUI" may carry even more severe penalties.

By operating a vessel on Arizona waters, you have consented to be tested for alcohol or drugs if arrested by a law officer for alleged violations under Arizona Watercraft Statutes. Just remember this simple rule: Don't Drink and Boat!

BoatUS Urges Boaters To Speak Up Now

Boaters and ethanol gas: new legislation would fix renewable fuel standard.

New bipartisan legislation recently introduced would help ensure recreational boaters don't put unsafe fuel in their boats, according to Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS).

Rep. Bob Goodlatte (R-VA), with 30 co-sponsors, introduced the Renewable Fuel Standard Reform Act of 2015. BoatUS is urging all boaters to contact their US Representative to support the bill.

Recognize The Failure

The new bill would recognize the failure of the current Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS) and its out-of-date ethanol-mandate, and make the necessary changes so there is a safe fuel for all gasoline powered engines," said BoatUS Government Affairs Program Manager Nicole Palva Wood

According to Wood, BoatUS supports the bill because, "The RFS Reform Act acknowledges the reality of America's declining fuel consumption, allows for the investment in other more compatible biofuels, and erases the twisted math that forces more ethanol onto a marketplace that neither demands it, nor can physically absorb it at safe levels."

Currently, there are no marine engines

in the US warrantied to run on any gasoline blend greater than 10 percent ethanol (E10). According to AAA, only about 12 million out of the more than 240 million light-duty vehicles on the roads today are approved to use E15 gasoline, based on a survey conducted by AAA of auto manufacturers.

Damage Voids Many Warranties

Any damage from the use of higher ethanol fuels (E15 or greater) in cars and

trucks will void many manufacturers' war-

When the RFS was written in 2005, it assumed that Americans' gasoline use would continue to rise and mandated escalating amounts of biofuels to be blended with our fuel. However, since 2005, gasoline usage has actually dropped steadily.

The unintended effect is now the law that forces more ethanol into the nation's gasoline supply, and to maintain adherence with the RFS rules, in 2010 the EPA permitted fuel containing up to 15 percent ethanol (E15) into the marketplace fuel many gasoline engines cannot use.

It is illegal to use E15 in boat engines, snowmobiles, motorcycles, small engines such as lawnmowers and leaf blowers as well as any vehicle made before 2001. However, this fuel can now be found at over 100 gas stations in 16 states at the same pumps as E10 and ethanol-free gaso-

Potential Great For Misfueling

The potential for misfueling is significant. In the US, nine out of every ten boaters own a trailerable boat that is most often filled up at a roadside gas station. Additionally, these higher-blend ethanol fuels are often the cheapest fuels at the

The new bill would cap the ethanol requirements at E10 (10 percent ethanol), would effectively prohibit the use of cornbased ethanol in the RFS, require more advanced biofuels and take into account actual, real-world production of biofuels when setting requirements.







This Year, Fish In The Canyons

PROJECT LEADER, LAKE POWELL FISHERIES

Sport fishing at Lake Powell enjoyed a great year in 2014. Threadfin shad came back in record numbers, allowing all fish species a seat at the banquet table. Fish responded by growing rapidly in the warm water during fall 2014. Now, over winter, feeding continues for striped bass.

Fish health and condition is remarkable. Striped bass have not been this healthy since the backs of the canyons where shad spend the winter.

It looks as if 2015 will be a year to fish the backs of the canyons instead of the main channel.

Ray Young, Page, Ariz., confirmed that recently by catching 1993. When shad are at a low point in the spring, stripers typically head to the main channel by the dam in the southern lake or Moki wall near Bullfrog. When shad are thick, stripers stay in a 12.1-pound, 32inch striped bass trolling near Lone Rock in Wahweap Bay. Fishing was not fast but five smaller stripers were caught along

with the big one. The other angler in the big-fish picture is holding the fish: Dana Andrus, also from Page. (Young is wearing a neck brace so he needed help to

The fishing pattern was very similar to successful techniques that produced well in November and December. The big fish was caught on a Lucky Craft XD100 Pointer trolled behind a one-ounce weight to gain more depth. Bottom depth at the capture site was 30 feet. The 30-45 foot strata has been the prime holding depth for striper schools and that did not change in the dead of winter.

If fishing for stripers during the next two months, head to the back of any canyon and troll while graphing, looking for striper schools. Target the area where bottom depth is 30-45 feet.

If only single fish are seen, troll over them hoping to catch a bass, walleye or striper. If a fish school is seen, stop the boat and jig with spoons or marabou jigs to catch stripers.

Fish quality at Lake Powell will be superb in 2015. Fewer fish will be caught because there is much more food than normal. However, the end result will be higher satisfaction with each fish caught because of the size and quality of the

Top Picks For Crappie Are Bartlett And Alamo

Tip Of The Week

Alamo Lake has possibly the best crappie fishing in the state right now. Bartlett is also noteworthy.

MORE STRIPPER SUCCESS — Inspired by Ray Young's catch, Mike McNabb and his son Paul tried fishing close to the Lake Powell Lone Rock Canyon walls, and voila, two big strippers! McNabb said they only caught three fish in three hours but it was definitely worth the trip.

Mark Knapp from Alamo Lake State Park said these "specks" are fishing up by the north end of the buoy line. Anglers are using a road runner with a white jig head and minnow trailer

The fish are in approximately 25 to 30 feet of water.

The Reel Deal

Bass fishing in the desert regions could pick up in the next weeks, maybe a few days after the recent cold front has run away and some expected weather with steady high temperatures in the 70s and even low-80s roll through.

The top early birds for bassin' that can have rapidly warming water temperatures are Alamo, Havasu, and Martinez,

Another top pick for bucketmouths will be Saguaro. Although it is a little deeper than Alamo Lake and not quite the solar bowl, Saguaro can heat up as well in more ways than one.



Trout and yellow bass are options if the largemouth bass are finicky. It's also the early bird for channel catfish that like to feed on shad. Plus, Saguaro is just downright gorgeous.

Considering Canyon? If you want decent catch rates, avoid it. If you want one or two wall-hangers, you might want to go exercise your swim baits.

Some anglers' favorite fishing/camp-

ing spot is Apache Lake. The smallmouth are still on the comeback, while the large-mouth bass and yellow bass populations are superb. You might even catch a delectable walleye or two.

The early walleye bite should be com-

ing up at Lake Powell. Stay tuned for up-

AZGFD Suspends Wildlife Rehabilitation License

Forever Wild denied wildlife-holding license due to insufficient animal care.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department recently suspended the wildlife rehabilitation license and denied the wildlife holding license of Forever Wild and owner Darlene Braastad of Tucson due to substandard care and conditions of the wildlife in her possession and failure to allow full inspections of her facility, a condition of her license.

Action was taken after multiple repeat violations were documented in a December 2014 inspection of Braastad's facility. The department requested that Braastad transfer all restricted wildlife in her possession to the department, including two Harris' hawks, a red-tailed hawk, an American kestrel falcon and a bobcat.

The department, as the trustee of all of Arizona's wildlife, took these actions to protect the health, safety and welfare of the wildlife in Braastad's custody. The depart-ment believes her failure to meet the minimum care and captivity standards required of special license holders poses an immediate threat to the wildlife held at

During an administrative inspection in December 2014, department staff noted numerous hazardous conditions and wildlife requiring veterinary treatment.

"All wildlife held under special license is the property of the state and subject to surrender at the department's request,' said Raul Vega, Tucson regional supervisor for Game and Fish.

"The Arizona Game and Fish Department relies heavily on its network of wildlife rehabilitators throughout the state, but the department has a trust responsibility to ensure that wildlife is housed in appropriate enclosures and receives any necessary medical treatment as required by state policy."

In order to possess or handle most live native and/or restricted wildlife in Arizona, a special license is required. For more information, visit www.azgfd.gov/eservices/special licenses.shtml.

Wildlife Habitat Already Being Conserved

Arizona Game and Fish Commission continues to have concerns over potential national monument designation by president.

The Arizona Game and Fish Commission continues to have concerns over the prospect of an executive order by President Barack Obama to proclaim 1.7 million acres of land in northern Arizona as the Grand Canyon Watershed National Monument, a unilateral action that could bypass public input and participation.

The commission, in 2012, voted to oppose creation of the monument, pointing out that the vast majority of the lands in question are already public lands currently managed and conserved under multipleuse concepts, primarily by the U.S. Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management

Conserving these lands and associated

wildlife habitats is already being done very effectively, which has led to the largest unfragmented block of wildlife habitat in Arizona

The commission expressed concern that the proposed monument was to "preserve" and in some cases lock away these lands rather than conserve them.

National monument designation could impose unreasonable restrictions greater than what is actually needed to protect the resource, adversely impacting public access, traditional recreational uses, and the ability of the commission and department to properly manage wildlife and habitat.

The commission also expressed con-

cern that a presidential executive order to create the monument would require no process for public input or participation from communities that would be directly impacted by this proclamation.

During its most recent public meeting, the commission heard a presentation on an innovative, collaborative approach to public land use planning in Utah, the Utah Public Lands Initiative.

AZGFD Receives Grants For Grassland Habitat, Irrigation Projects

Public-private partnerships are keys to securing grants.

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack visited Arizona in mid-January to announce grants to the Arizona Game and Fish Department and four other groups to restore more than 15,000 acres of grassland habitat in Arizona and to improve water conservation in the Verde River Valley. The projects receiving grants are part of the new USDA Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP).

Three Focus Areas

The RCPP projects in Arizona announced by Secretary Vilsack will help restore habitat for fish and wildlife along the Verde River and improve irrigation on

1,000 farmland acres. Arizona Game and Fish will work with The Nature Conservancy, Friends of Verde River Greenway, Verde Natural Resource Conservation District and Tamarisk Coalition to enhance 6,000 acres of riparian habitat and encourage more sustainable use of water in the

The department also will work to restore grassland habitat for pronghorn and other grassland obligate species in three focus areas: Central Arizona, Eastern Arizona and Northern Arizona.

New Approach

"This is an entirely new approach to conservation efforts," said Secretary Vilsack. "These partnerships empower com-

Grand Canyon Advocate Honored On Anniversary Of Park Enlargement

On the 40th anniversary of the enactment of the Grand Canyon Enlargement Act, four outdoor recreation and conservation groups presented 78-year-old Jeff Ingram of Tucson, Ariz., with a lifetime achievement award.

The award, with a cash value of \$4,000, was presented to Ingram by the Coalition of American Canyoneers, Living Rivers, Grand Canyon Hikers and Backpackers Association, and River Runners for Wilderness, in recognition of his efforts to preserve one of America's nat-

First View Of The Canyon

Ingram grew up in Hamilton, N.Y., and studied mathematics and political science at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. After graduating from MIT, he received a fellowship from Columbia University

In 1962, Ingram, his wife and first daughter headed west and stopped at the Grand Canyon. That first visit to Mather Point with his one-year-old daughter in his arms set the course for his life. Of that first view, Ingram noted in a recent interview that "it was inexpressible beyond words. The intensity of that vision is one of the things that defines the Grand


Canyon as the iconic place it is."
In 1964, Ingram met David Brower, then executive director of the Sierra Club, and two years later made his first river trip through the Grand Canyon with Brower, Martin Litton, and others

Following this trip Brower hired Ingram as the Sierra Club's Southwest Representative to lead efforts to oppose construction of two massive dams on the Colorado River within Grand Canyon. Increased awareness of the plans galva-nized public opposition, ultimately leading the Bureau of Reclamation to abandon the projects.

Ingram Championed Efforts

In order to cement enduring protection for areas threatened by the dams, Ingram and others championed efforts to expand the boundary of Grand Canyon National Park. Not long after being evacuated from the bottom of the Grand Canvon following a rattlesnake bite, Ingram was in Washington, D.C. for Congressional testimony on enlargement legislation. On Jan. 3, 1975, President Gerald Ford

signed the Grand Canyon National Park Enlargement Act into law, nearly doubling the Park's area to its current bound-

His History Book
In 1998, Ingram wrote Hijacking A River: The Political History of the Colorado River in the Grand Canyon. In 2009, Ingram started a blog at http://gcfutures.blogspot.com/ Ingram states his

blog entries are aimed at bringing more light to the dark corners of Grand Canyon management, celebrating the entire Grand Canyon and its place as an icon of our environmental consciousness into the future.

Grand Canyon National Park Is Replacing Portion Of Trans-Canyon Pipeline

Grand Canyon National Park began re-placing a portion of the Trans-Canyon Pipeline at Phantom Ranch beginning in late January. Ortega Plumbing and Heating of Albuquerque, NM has been awarded a contract for replacement of this section of

The project area will replace up to a half mile section of the Trans-Canyon Pipeline (TCP) including pipeline from the lower Campground Bridge north to the Phantom Ranch Cantina and a short section around the NPS mule corral.

Construction crews, supplies, and heavy equipment were transferred from the South Rim to staging areas near Phantom Ranch. To help reduce the number of flights, a Type 1, heavy lift helicopter, was utilized to assist with moving materials to the construction site. The heavy lift helicopter was used until the equipment transfer was complete.

Completion Estimate: July

It is currently anticipated that construc-tion will be complete by the end of July 2015. During this time period, all hikers and backcountry users should expect to en-counter detours, possible delays, and clo-sures while traveling near the construction zone. Visitors should follow all posted signs, detour routes, and verbal instructions of personnel on-site.

Hikers and backcountry users should be prepared treat creek water while in the inner canyon. Construction will require intermit-tent shutdown of the pipeline, temporarily shutting down the drinking water system along the corridor trails. All hikers should check in at the Backcountry Information Center, prior to starting their hikes, for upto-date information on trail conditions, construction detours, and water availability.

Phantom Ranch, the Cantina, and the Bright Angel Campground will all remain open during construction. Visitors to the Phantom Ranch area should be aware that work may take place between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. on any day of the week. Moderate daytime noise and dust impacts are expected due to the construction activities and associate equipment use.

Individuals who have campground reservations and have questions about impacts of construction work on their trip should contact the Backcountry Informa-

The Trans-Canyon Pipeline was built in the mid-1960s and feeds water to Grand Canyon National Park from Roaring Springs. Sixteen miles in length, the aging pipeline is constructed of 6-8" aluminum pipe that, over the past decade, has suffered numerous leaks, fissures, and breaks.

Full replacement of the TCP is currently estimated at \$100-150 million dollars. This current project replaces only a very small section and addresses immediate issues where breaks occur frequently with the highest risk to visitors and facilities at Phantom Ranch.

Frequency Of Breaks

Since 1978, major pipeline breaks have occurred anywhere from five to 30 times annually and the frequency of breaks continues to increase as the pipeline ages. A flash-flood in 1995 caused extensive damage to the pipeline, shutting it down for 28 days while it was repaired.


During that time, the park implemented emergency water hauling measures and trucked in 23 million gallons of water (85 trucks per day) from outside sources at a cost of approximately \$5 million dollars. More recently, multiple breaks along the TCP in late June 2013 required the closure and evacuation of guests and employees from Phantom Ranch. This past December another large break required the temporary

closure of Phantom Ranch for several days while crews dealt with weather related de-lays in repairing the pipeline.

Impacts Minimized


A few months ago I wrote about some hikes near Safford in the Pinaleno Mountains, and the hiking and fishing available at Roper Lake and Dankworth Pond. The Safford area has a lot to offer, and it's a great place to visit this time of year because the weather is gorgeous and it's the perfect time to hike or just camp somewhere beautiful.

Beautiful Scenery

If you take Highway 70 east from Safford for ten miles or so, you will come to Highway 191. Follow 191 to milepost 160, four miles south of Clifton, and turn onto the Black Hills Country Byway. If you want to take a nice day drive, you can fol-low this historical road for 21 miles and see some beautiful scenery.

hours for this drive, as the road isn't paved and it can be quite narrow. Also, there are places where there are abrupt drop-offs alongside the road, as well as places where there are steep cliffs on both sides.

You need a high-clearance vehicle, and if you plan to take any side roads you'll need a 4WD vehicle. There are lots of places where you'll want to take a few snapshots, so allow extra time and be sure

Float The Gila Box

Anyway, when you take the Byway from the east end, it's only about 4 miles to the Conservation Area. The road is well marked, and just before you cross the concrete bridge you'll come to Old Safford Bridge Gila River Float Boat Put In. If you want to float through the Gila Box, this is where you put in.

There is parking for your vehicle and a nice sandy area where you can launch

This is also a fabulous place for a picnic, with big shady trees, a pit toilet, and that lovely bridge to look at. There are plenty of birds, too. Riparian areas in Arizona are magnets for wildlife.

Floating the Gila Box can take a single day if the flow is high, but if you want to relax and look around, or the water is low, your trip will most likely take three days or so, and two nights. When the water is very slow you'll probably have to get out and walk it through a few spots.

There are also now two fences across

the river that you need to watch out for. They are not barbed wire, and they are easy enough to go under, but you should still keep your eyes open. The first one is 1.3 miles downstream from the Old Saf-ford Bridge, and the other is 2.7 miles downstream from the bridge. About seven miles downstream the San Francisco River flows into the Gila, and the water gets a lot higher and faster.

Know Before You Go

The river passes through a beautiful canyon and there are also some little side canyons you can explore. There are signs at the kiosk at the Old Safford Bridge Put In, and they explain what kinds of boats do best at various flow levels, but you need to know what those levels are before you go. The USGS has a website that will give you that information: water.usgs.gov/realtime.html.

The cliff walls soar up to 500 feet high along the route, and there are over 150 species of birds that take up residence here at various times of the year. Mostly, you will enjoy solitude and beautiful scenery.

There is a \$3 fee per person for floating the river, and there is primitive camping at Bonita Creek and along the river. Fees are paid at self-service stations at the campgrounds and at the put-in area at the

Visit The Bridge

The Old Safford Bridge Put In is a great place to visit even if you aren't planning to float the river, but you can also get in and enjoy the river from the west side of the Gila Box. From Safford, just go 5 miles east on 70 to the town of Solomon and turn left on Sanchez Road.

Follow this road to the end of the pavement and then just follow the signs to Bonita Creek and the lower end of the Gila Box. Here you'll find another kiosk and a great view of the river. This is also the place where floaters will get out of the water, and there is plenty of parking there.

An Easy Little Hike

If you fancy an easy little hike, the Cottonwood Trail is a 2-1/2 mile easy loop that links the Serna Cabin Picnic Area, Riverview Campground, the Fly W Group Day Use Area, and the Kearny Camp Monument. Campground fees are just \$5/day and you can have two vehicles at each site. There's a maximum of five days. You'll have to pack in all your own sup-

Even if you're not planning to float the river or camp, you will really enjoy a day trip that includes both of the areas I've just told you about. We actually visited the Old Safford Bridge area first, then headed north on Highway 191 and visited Clifton, Morenci, and the world's largest cypress tree, which I also detailed in the previous story about the Safford area

the event)





Who Is Lost Our Home?
Lost Our Home (LostOurHome.org)
Pet Foundation was founded in 2008 as a grassroots response to the thousands of pets in need as a result of the economic downturn and Phoenix-area foreclosure crisis in particular.

Animal Rescue Abandoned Pets

Temporary Care Program

She has researched Indian recipes for desert plants and "modernized" and developed recipes for today. Jean will discuss desert plants, seeds and fruit and share tasty recipes at the Palo Verde Ramada.

munities to set priorities and lead the way on conservation efforts important for their

region.
"They also encourage private sector investment so we can make an impact that's well beyond what the Federal government could accomplish on its own. We're giving private companies, local communities, and other non-government partners a way to invest in a new era in conservation that ultimately benefits us all."

The Arizona Game and Fish Department's projects will improve habitat for grassland-dependent wildlife species such as pronghorn antelope, Gunnison's prairie dogs, black-tailed prairie dogs, western burrowing owls, and Ferruginous hawks. Projects will restore native grasses and forbs to historic grasslands, which will improve food availability and cover, and reduce fragmentation for wildlife.

In addition to grassland habitat improvement, AZGFD projects will address resource concerns such as inadequate water and forage, soil erosion, water quality degradation and continued degradation of the watershed due to catastrophic wildfire.

Grants to AZGFD totaled \$3 million, while The Nature Conservancy received \$2.8 million. The grants represent nearly half the funding needed to complete these projects

While the announced projects will help the environment, AZGFD Landowner Relations Program Manager Al Eiden says they also will boost Arizona's economy.




