### Update your boating safety knowledge

### Life Jackets save lives—especially in colder water

In water under 49 degrees, half of boating accidents are fatal

Ask some boaters why they don't wear a life jacket and they'll most likely say they don't need one because they are a "strong swimmer." But in open water under 49 degrees, it doesn't matter how good a swimmer you are, without a life jacket you are more likely to drown.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department reminds winter boaters that their life iackets are even more important in the colder winter months. According to U.S. Coast Guard statistics, when the water temperature is 49 degrees or less, fifty percent of boating accidents are fatal. Sixtysix percent of those who drown were thought to be "good swimmers," and 55 percent of open water drownings occur within ten feet of safety.

'Wearing a life jacket before you end up in cold water and knowing what to do in the first few minutes can make the difference between becoming a statistic or a survivor," said Paul Newman, recreational boating safety specialist for the U.S. Coast Guard Eleventh District, which includes Arizona. "A life jacket can buy you time and increase your chances of survival."

The first minute in cold water can be especially deadly because the human body reacts to the cold temperature by gasping deeply. Swimmers who gasp while underwater can take more than a liter of water into their lungs, making it impossible to reach the surface to breathe. If they survive the next ten minutes, the cold water saps the body's ability for meaningful motion, making it difficult to swim, tread water, climb out or signal for help.

After an hour in cold water, hypothermia sets in, the swimmer loses consciousness and drowns. Wearing a life jacket can help keep your head above water, help keep you warm and keep you afloat even when you're exhausted. Newman said there are plenty of good reasons to always wear your life jacket, especially in the winter months.

"A life jacket can buy you time and keep you alive in cold water, but it won't help unless you're wearing it," said Newman. "Getting into the habit of always wearing your life jacket, especially when the water is cold, is the very best way to reduce the chances of drowning.3

### Alcohol and Boating: A Deadly Combination

Arizona law prohibits anyone from operating a power-driven vessel while under the influence of alcohol or any drug that causes the person to be even slightly impaired. Alcohol and drugs can cause impaired balance, blurred vision, poor coordination, impaired judgment and slower reaction time. These contribute to nearly one-third of all fatal boating accidents

If convicted of OUI or "Extreme OUI," a person can be fined up to \$2500 and jailed for up to six months. Subsequent convictions and "Aggravated OUI" may carry even more severe penalties.

By operating a vessel on Arizona waters, you have consented to be tested for alcohol or drugs if arrested by a law officer for alleged violations under Arizona Watercraft Statutes. Just remember this simple rule: Don't Drink and Boat!

### No Keys, No Problem: Kayak-Fishing At Canyon Lake

As Arizona Game and Fish public information officer Nick Walter found out, the Boulder Creek area of Canyon Lake, because of its no-wake restrictions, is an excellent spot for beginning and expert kayak

Undulating water that rippled across Canyon Lake in November, gently rocking the kayak, was felt from head to hips

Paddling a new Ocean Kayak Tetra 10 Angler for the first time, and during what was this angler's first time fishing this desert dandy, made for excitement that filled the head and heart with ideas of possible thrills — catching a monster largemouth bass on a 6-inch rainbow trout swimbait, carving open water, and endless other adventures.

Losing the truck keys, however, wasn't supposed to be one of them.

### A Community Of Paddlers And Anglers

A "thank you" is in order. Four gracious (and sympathetic) kayakers offered this nearly stranded stranger, who somewhere among kayaking excitement lost the truck keys, a ride from the Salt River-chain lake in the Tonto National Forest to their mobile home in Mesa.

Then, a party invitation. A full-moon bash would be happening that night at the swimming pool of their 55-and-over senior community - karaoke, conversation and

### The Lesson: Fishing Can Be The Doorway To Any Adventure

All you need is to purchase a license some tackle and poles, and maybe a kayak,



which is cheaper and more stealthy than a boat. Fish rarely are spooked by a 'yak it's cheating

Anyway, the party didn't happen this writer was able to find a ride from the senior community back to his north Phoenix home. But still in order was a cold Bud Light and some macaroni and cheese at the courteous kayakers' Mesa mobile home. Almost made up for not catching a lunker bass

What did redeem this whole mess two days later? Four, fresh fish tacos.

#### **Fishing Trout Swimbaits**

Canyon Lake is the "land of lunkers," and after our first winter rainbow trout stocking, some ambitious anglers begin to throw big rainbow trout swimbaits (usually 4-10 inches) in an attempt to catch one of those plus-size bass that occasionally feed on trout.

It can be absolute hit-and-miss fishing; maybe an angler can catch one during two or three full-day trips

No luck this day. Didn't sound like any other anglers fishing the Boulder Creek

area that day had big bass luck, either. But, one pesky bass was on the full moon feed.

#### The Technique

A 13-inch largemouth bass hit a 3-inch Kamlooper orange-and-silver spoon tied to 8-pound test monofilament line kayaktrolling the Boulder Creek area of Canyon

The setup for monster bass included a 6-inch Huddleston rainbow trout swimbait tied with a uni-knot to 50 yards of 17pound Stren fluorocarbon line (a roll of 200 yards was just \$13 at Sportsman's Warehouse), connected with a double uniknot to 20-pound braided line as backing.

Go with a medium-heavy action rod of at least 7 feet. Purchasing components for this rig is like buying a really expensive scratch ticket (but a lot more fun.)

Canyon Lake, with its sandy-colored, arcing shoreline features, is one of the most unique fisheries in the country.

### Fishing From A Kayak

Fishing from a kayak on such an expansive and deep lake, and its being this angler's first time at Canyon Lake, trolling a spoon or crankbait and the swimbait from the kayak's two rod holders seemed to be the most effective method to cover water and possibly figure out a pattern or location of congregated fish. (Tip: Put one line out about 10 yards farther than the other to avoid lines crossing.)

The 10 1/2-foot Ocean Kayak Tetra 10 Angler, a sit-on-top, is narrow and weighs only 50 pounds, and so is easy to transport. Stealthy and smooth on the water, it's designed for those with small-to-medium builds (the kayak has a weight capacity of 225-275 pounds.) Well worth buying if on clearance or marked down on craigslist.

Trolling from this 'yak with a 3-inch. orange-and-silver Kamlooper spoon produced the above 13-inch largemouth bass around 2 p.m. in about 20 feet of water in Boulder Creek near the fishing pier.

The bass skyrocketed from the water four or five times, a memory-making sight. Then, Mr. Bass went from the water to the table.

### **Taco Time**

Two days later, the bass was filleted into 1/2-inch-wide chunks, soaked in cold water, rolled in white corn meal, and fried in a shallow amount of peanut oil - then laid to rest on paper towels and sprinkled with salt and pepper - ... then finally dropped into plus-size corn tacos shells (25-percent larger!) along with shreds of Tillamook sharp cheddar cheese and homemade medium salsa (thanks to the mom of Mary at Game and Fish). Few ingredients helped highlight a fresh fish

Maybe the best part of fishing is the eating!

And at this point — what keys?

## What To Do In A Boating Emergency

For wakeboarders and all boaters, a few safety procedure could prevent a tragedy.

It's not really a subject that I like talking about, but it would be foolish not to address it. The fact is, emergencies do happen on the water. And I'll be the first one to admit it, nothing's a bigger buzz kill than reviewing safety information, but if and when disaster happens, you will be very glad you did.

It would be impossible to prepare for every single emergency that could happen on the water, but having a few safety procedures in mind could prevent an emergency from turning into a tragedy.

### **Retrieving An Injured Rider**

The first and most important safety plan you should have is a method for retrieving an injured or unconscious rider. It usually only takes about 3 seconds to realize that something is wrong when a rider goes down.

Within that moment, you should reduce the speed immediately and turn the boat around, ensuring that you don't generate a lot of wake which could exacerbate the situation for the rider.

As you approach the rider call out and ask what's wrong. If the rider is conscious, remind him or her to stay calm and to minimize movement. This will prevent furthering the injury.

When the rider is within three or four feet of the boat, turn the engine off and reach out to gently pull the rider by the life jacket and slowly pull the person toward the swim platform. If you have the help of other passengers, slowly roll the rider onto the swim platform and examine the injured area(s).

Ensure that you have antiseptic spray and bandages on board to treat scrapes and cuts; if you don't, then now is a good time to refresh your first aid kit. If the injury is a dislocated shoulder or suspected broken arm, you can do your best to create a makeshift sling with a towel or lifejacket — anything to give the afflicted limb support until proper medical attention can be reached.

If the rider is unconscious, make sure you get to the victim as quickly as possible and ensure the person is floating face up in the water. Once again, gently and slowly pull the rider over to the swim platform. Check to see if the rider is breathing. If the rider isn't breathing, call 911 and start CPR.

If the rider is breathing, give him or her space and try fanning the face. If the rider doesn't come to in about 30-40 seconds then call 911.

Whether a rider has lost consciousness or has sustained a serious injury, the patient will need proper medical attention. Do your best to surmise the situation to determine if you can get to a medical facility in a fair amount of time. When in doubt, call 911.

### In Case Of Fire

If there is going to be a fire on a boat, there is a 90 percent chance that the fire will originate from the engine bay. Most of the time, fire or even explosion can happen when gas fumes have collected in the engine compartment and haven't been fanned out when starting the engine.

Therefore, make it a habit to run the blower on your boat for at least 30-40 seconds or open your engine compartment before starting the engine. However, if you do find that your boat has caught fire, then make sure you have an action plan and escape plan.

The action plan: If you catch the fire quickly enough, grab your fire extinguisher and release the pin. Spray directly onto the fire, aiming for the base of the flames. Keep

a constant flow until all the flames have disappeared and there is no more sign of spark.

The escape plan: If the action plan fails, then it's time to move to plan B— escape. If the fire grows to an uncontrollable scale, then immediately jump off the boat and swim away. Keep swimming until you are at least 50 yards away from the boat.

Do your best to flag down another boater and call for emergency services. It is much better to let the boat go, than to try to fight a losing battle — boats can always be replaced.

Disaster strikes when we least expect it, so don't let an emergency catch you off guard. Do your best to have plan and always stay calm. A cool head and a decisive plan can make all the difference.











### **Trout Are Back In Tucson**

Trout stocking has resumed at Lakeside Park in Tucson now that water-quality issues have been resolved. Kiwanis in Tempe was stocked on Nov. 24.

Operation Game Thief callers are making a difference Following a recent stocking of trout into Silverbell Lake in Tucson, the Department received several reports of unlawful netting.

An officer responded twice to separate

calls, and on the second response located a person who matched the description. The officer conducted surveillance and witnessed the person committing violations. Subsequently, the person was contacted and issued a citation.

Although officers may not be readily available to respond to each call, the information is vital. Your information will be recorded into our database, which will be used to look for patterns of reported violators so that we can catch the poachers and issue citations.

Another thing to keep in mind: Just because you don't see officers at the lake doesn't mean they aren't working with that information. Many times officers will catch violators after they leave the lake or even at their homes. Your calls are vital to assisting enforcement

### **Check The Roads Before You Go**

Of course, winter weather can be detrimental to travel. Motorists traveling in Arizona's high country need to be aware of some annual closings. Be sure to check the Arizona Department of Transporation Web site for the latest road closures

### Crappies Worth A Shot

In the desert impoundments, consider targeting sporting crappie populations at Bartlett and Roosevelt. Doesn't sound like banner crappie-fishing conditions yet — but it's worth a shot.

As the water temperatures lower, the crappie will congregate into large schools in open water that can be up to 50 feet deep or so. The crappie formations, or schools, look like inverted pyramids (or Christmas trees if you like), with the most active fish at the top, around 15 or 20 feet deep. Catch a window of stable weather for crappie fishing.

The two primary strategies for catching

these crappie are to use your fish finder, lo cate a school, sit over it, and slowly jig a 1/16- or even a 1/32-ounce jighead with curly tail or other small grub, Roadrunner or maybe a marabou jig.

The other is slow trolling (1.5 mph)

crappie jigs or even small crankbaits. Or combine the two — trolling until you get a bite, then vertically jig.



### At The Salt River-Chain Lakes

At the Salt River-chain lakes (as in this Canyon Lake photowhere an angler on braves a cold, windy day in mid-November), there's a shot at catching a lunker largemuth bass on a rainbow-trout swimbait.

### **Respect The Bald Eagles**

Finally, outdoor recreationists are reminded to avoid bald-eagle closure areas during breeding season.

Each year as part of its highly successful program to manage and conserve bald eagles in the state, the Arizona Game and Fish Department asks outdoor recreationists and aircraft pilots to help protect important eagle breeding areas by honoring the closure of 23 areas across the state



Various land and wildlife management agencies close the breeding areas for part of the year to protect the state's 55 breeding pairs of bald eagles. Some of the closure areas are located near popular recreation sites, or in the airspace above.

In December, Arizona bald eagles begin rebuilding nests in preparation for laying eggs. Bald eagles nest, forage and roost at the rivers and lakes that have become some of Arizona's most popular recreation spots, and this time of year can be challenging for the birds. Leaving the nest for only a short time can render the eggs not viable.

### Poor Man's Beer Batter Fish

It's ready in nine minutes.

This is a super easy and fast not to mention inexpensive and no-mess way to make a beer batter for your fresh fish while camping. Using only beer, your freshly caught fish, some oil for your skillet, and shake-and-pour buttermilk pan-cake mix containers found in your local supermarket. Great for camping!

### Ingredients

(Original recipe makes eight servings)

- 1 cup beer, or as needed
- 1 (7 ounce) container shake-and-pour buttermilk pancake mix

- 1. Heat oil in a large skillet over medium heat.
- 2. Pour beer into the pancake mix container in place of the water it calls for. Make the batter as thick or thin as you prefer. Close the lid, give it a few shakes, and boom it's done
- 3. Dip fish into the batter using a pair of tongs, or if you want to dirty a dish, pour the batter in a bowl first. If you cut your fish into smaller pieces, you can toss them into the container, close the lid and shake it a couple of times, then carefully remove the coated pieces.
- 4. Remove the fish from the batter using tongs, and place into the hot oil. Fry the fish until golden brown on both sides, 3 to 4 minutes per side



### **Oven Roasted Trout** With Lemon Dill Stuffing

Nothing beats fresh fish, especially when it is filled with a fresh dill and lemon bread stuffing. The fresh flavors of this dish will leave your mouth begging for

### Ingredients

(four servings)

- 1 cup soft bread crumbs 1/2 sweet onion, minced
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh dill2 teaspoons grated lemon zest
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/4 cup olive oil, divided
- · salt and pepper to taste
- · 4 trout, cleaned and head removed

- 1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees F (200 degrees C). Line a baking sheet with aluminum foil.
- 2. Toss bread crumbs with onion, dill, lemon zest, garlic, and half of the olive oil. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Press stuffing into the trout, then brush the trout with the remaining olive oil, and season with salt and pepper. Place trout onto prepared baking sheet.
- 3. Roast in the preheated oven until the skin of the fish begins to brown, and the flesh flakes easily with a fork, about 20



### Pan Fried Whole Trout

There couldn't be a better way to preare freshly caught wild brook trout. Serve with a side of creamy mashed potatoes and steamed Swiss chard."

### Ingredients

- (Recipe makes four servings.)
   4 whole (12 ounce) trout, cleaned with tails and heads on
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup cornmeal
- 1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 lemons cut into wedges, for garnish

- 1. Remove gills from fish and discard. Rinse fish under cold water.

  2. In a large skillet heat oil over medium
- 3. In shallow dish, combine the flour, cornmeal, salt and pepper. Raise heat to high. Dredge fish in flour mixture and fry in hot oil for about 4 to 6 minutes on each side or until meat flakes with a fork. Serve garnished with lemon wedges.



### Pecan-Crusted Trout

Freshwater trout coated in a delicious crunchy pecan coating. Serve this with a savory brandy or lemon-butter sauce.

### Ingredients

(Recipe makes four servings.) Cooking spray

- 1/2 cup crushed pecans

Each year as part of its nationally-recognized and highly successful program to manage and conserve bald eagles in the state, the Arizona Game and Fish Department asks outdoor recreationists and aircraft pilots to help protect important eagle breeding areas by honoring the closure of 23 areas across the state.

Various land and wildlife management agencies close the breeding areas for part of the year to protect the state's 55 breeding pairs of bald eagles. Some of the clo-



sure areas are located near popular recreation sites.

"Cooperation from outdoor recreationists has been a major reason that the population continues to grow, and now we're working to create more awareness among pilots of all aircraft types

Bald eagles can be very sensitive to even short durations of low-flying aircraft activity near their nests and just a few minutes of disturbance can lead to nesting failure," says Kenneth Jacobson, head of the Arizona Game and Fish Department Bald Eagle Management Program.

Pilots should maintain the FAA-recommended 2,000-foot above ground level advisory when flying over bald eagle habi-

In December, Arizona bald eagles begin rebuilding nests in preparation for laying eggs. During this time, land and wildlife management agencies enact the seasonal breeding area closures. Bald eagles nest, forage and roost at the rivers and lakes that have become some of Arizona's most popular recreation spots, and this time of year can be challenging for the

Game and Fish's bald eagle management efforts are supported by the Heritage Fund, an initiative passed more than 20 years ago to provide for wildlife education and conservation through Arizona lottery ticket sales.

Airspace Advisory

### Mount Graham Red Squirrel Population Remains Stable

As part of a conservation program for the endangered Mount Graham red squirrel, the Arizona Game and Fish Department, U.S. Forest Service and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service conducted an annual squirrel survey and estimated approximately 274 animals in the Pinaleño Mountains in southeastern Arizona.

This year's survey shows an increase of two squirrels over the 2013 estimate of 272 squirrels.

"After seeing considerable population growth in 2013, the recovery team is encouraged to see those gains have remained and the population is stable," says Tim



Snow, nongame specialist for the Arizona Game and Fish Department. "The team speculates that better cone crops are contributing to the stable squirrel population

The red squirrel survey is conducted each fall by visiting a random sample of known middens (areas where red squirrels store or cache their cones)

Mount Graham red squirrels live only in the upper elevation conifer forests of the Pinaleño Mountains and feed primarily on conifer seeds. Females produce two to seven young per year. The species was declared endangered in 1987.

The Mount Graham red squirrel population peaked at about 550 animals in the late 1990s, but typically ranges between 200 and 300 individuals. Habitat losses caused by fire and insect infestations and poor cone crops caused by drought are considered primary factors influencing population size.

Biologists continue to explore new ways to conserve the species, including habitat improvements, squirrel research and a pilot captive breeding program.

Conservation of the species is guided by the Mount Graham Red Squirrel Recovery Team, a partnership that includes the Coronado National Forest, Game and Fish, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, University of Arizona, Native American tribes and others.

### **Information Sought In Poaching Of Two Mule Deer**

Any wildlife violation, including poaching, should be reported.

Arizona Game and Fish is seeking information regarding the poaching of two mule deer bucks south-east of Kingman in Game Management Unit 16A. Officers with Game and Fish need the public's help, and Operation Game Thief is offering up to a \$750 reward for information leading to an arrest of those responsible for

the crime.

"At first the investigating officer thought it was a single buck, but found the second after returning to the scene the next day," said Zen Mocarski, public informa-tion officer for the Game and Fish Region 3 office in Kingman. "The second was hidden in some tall grass."

The bucks were unlawfully shot between Nov. 17-19 off Blake Ranch Road on the Cane Springs Ranch. Both animals were left to waste. If found, those responsible may face criminal charges, including take of big game wildlife during a closed season and waste of game meat. After the case is adjudicated, those responsible also face a potential civil assessment by the Game and Fish Commission and possible license revocation.

Mocarski said the investigating officer believes both animals were taken by the same individual(s).

"It is important to remember this is not the act of a hunter," Mocarski stated.
"Poaching is a crime. We are looking for additional information and are asking anyone with knowledge of this case to come forward. The eyes and ears of the public are critically important in bringing poachers to justice.

### **Tips For Visiting Eagle Areas**

If you are visiting bald eagle country, an advance call to the local land management agency (U.S. Forest Service district, etc.) or the Arizona Game and Fish Department may help you plan your trip to avoid disturbing bald eagles. By following these simple guidelines, we can all help ensure that our living wildlife legacy will last for generations to come:

· Enjoy bald eagles from outside the closures, which are marked with signs and/or buoys. Watch from a distance using a spotting scope, binoculars or telephoto

· Anyone approached by a nestwatcher

and asked to cease an activity or leave a closed area should comply. A few good places to see bald eagles without disturbing them (during December and January) are at Lake Mary and Mormon Lake near Flagstaff or on the Verde Canyon Train in

· Bald eagles protecting an active nest will let you know if you are too close. If a bald eagle is vocalizing and circling the area frantically, you are too close and need to leave the area quickly. Bald eagles incubating eggs or brooding small young should never be off the nest for more than 15 minutes.

· Pilots should maintain the FAA-recommended 2,000-foot AGL advisory when flying over bald eagle habitat such as along the riparian areas of the Salt and Verde Rivers and Lakes such as Lake Pleasant, Roosevelt lake, and Alamo Lake These areas are designated on the Phoenix Sectional Aeronautical Map. Special brochures for pilots regarding this advisory can be obtained by calling the Arizona Department of Transportation or the Arizona Game and Fish Department's nongame branch, (623) 236-7506.

 Help from anglers is especially needed. Fishing line and tackle have killed two nestlings and been found in two-thirds of all bald eagle nests in the state. Every year biologists remove these lethal hazards from nests and/or entangled nestlings. Discard of any fishing line properly in specially-marked recycling containers or at fishing stores. Also, use fresh line that isn't old and brittle. Use the correct test line for the fish you are trying to catch. Also, do not cut the line when an undesirable fish is caught and return it to the water with the hook and line attached.

You can help bald eagle research and recovery efforts by reporting any harass-ment or shooting of bald eagles. Call the Arizona Game and Fish Operation Game Thief Hotline at (800) 352-0700 or U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Law Enforcement at (480) 967-7900.

Fortunately, there are a lot of great hikes in and around Phoenix, and since the winter is such a great time to be outside in the desert, we do a lot of hiking close to home. Even if it's just a quick trip to Thunderbird Paseo Park to walk the dog, hiking in Phoenix is awesome this time of year.

### Thunderbird Paseo

Thunderbird Paseo is in Glendale, and it is a long (around four miles) narrow park that is actually a flood-control feature. Thunderbird Paseo has bike and pedestrian trails, disk golf, playgrounds, restrooms, and believe it or not -– wildlife I've seen up to five coyotes at a time at Thunderbird Paseo. Keep your dog on a leash!

I've also seen plenty of hawks, jackrabbits, tons of doves, ducks, and even snipe. There is a narrow waterway that meanders down the middle of the park, and there is almost always water in it somewhere, which is why the wildlife flourishes.

#### **Thunderbird Conservation Park**

My favorite time is when the city hasn't mown the tall grasses down and Rosie (my French Brittany) and I can "bird hunt." We walk through grass that is higher than my waist, and she points birds for me and chases them when I flush them. It's a blast. In fact, that's how I discovered the snipe there one winter. Rosie pointed them

The soccer fields are kept nice and short and green, but other areas can get quite wild and you can almost forget you are in town. There are plenty of trees and if you don't want to walk on the sidewalk trail, venture out into the center and you can follow the dirt trails. It's impossible to get lost, so go for it.

Thunderbird Paseo runs from 51st Avenue and Cactus northwest to 73rd Avenue and Greenway. It's open sunrise to sunset and parking is available at 59th Avenue

The address to the park is 22600 N 59th Avenue, Glendale. The best way to decide where to enter is to go to the website and find a hike, then enter the park close to the trailhead. They have a nice downloadable man on the website

### South Mountain Park

South Mountain Park in South Phoenix is a fantastic place to hike. Whether you like to stroll along fairly level ground or you want to test your knees on mountain trails, you're sure to find the perfect trail South Mountain has 70 miles of trails! It's an easy park to get to – just get on Central Avenue and head south. Central becomes the park road eventually. Even just driving through the park is fun.

You can visit the education center, have a picnic, watch the birds and animals, and just enjoy being outside in the desert. If you have out of state visitor, be sure to bring them here – they'll get a real taste of the desert, especially if you take them on a little hike.

If you're up for a bit more walking, try the Bajada Trail. It's about 3.5 miles, but it's out and back — so seven miles. Plan on at least two to three hours unless you



really like to walk fast. I prefer to ramble, and stop to take lots of photos.

The Web site lists all the trails and gives

difficulty ratings and distances. Beware, though — many of the trails start a ways down another trail. This means that you might have to walk quite a way before you even reach the 3-mile trail you are looking for. Plan carefully.

### **Be Prepared**

As always, even though the weather is cool, bring plenty of water. If you aren't strong enough to carry water you shouldn't be hiking. A walking stick really helps on the rough and downhill spots. I have a TrekPod, which is a walking stick that turns into a tripod simply by unfastening the Velcro strip at the bottom. On top, a round cork handle pops off to reveal a strong magnet that securely holds even a big camera

The TrekPod comes with two mounts that screw into the bottom of the camera. The mount swivels on a ball, so it's easy to get perfect framing. I absolutely love it. I can set it up in seconds because the camera just sticks on magnetically, set the timer, jump into the picture – and voila! Selfie! Check them out at http://www.trektech.com/products/trekpods.html.

### Some Things To Bring

Nothing ruins a hike like sore feet, so make sure your hiking shoes are comfortable and they fit well. On the trail is not the place to break them in. Just in case, bring along a few of those new special blister bandages — they are great. I carry a backpack even on short hikes, and although the family likes to poke fun, they are happy that Grandma always has sun-screen, Band-aids, granola bars, maps, water, etc.

I always throw a bandana or two in there as well — they come in really handy for lots of things. If you are bringing along your four-footed best friend, pack along a metal-toothed comb. It's just the ticket if your pooch steps on a piece of cholla. Just flick that darn thing right off.

### Grand Canyon National Park North Rim Now Closed For The Season

The North Rim of Grand Canyon National Park is now closed for the season. Arizona State Route 67, leading to the North Rim closed on Dec. 1. State Route 67 and all services on the North Rim are expected to re-open for the 2015 season on May 15, 2015.

The North Rim campground and yurt will still be available for winter camping and are accessible via inner canyon trails from the South Rim or by cross-country sking and snowshoeing — a 45-mile trip from Jacob Lake.

To stay at the North Rim during the

winter months, visitors will need a backcountry permit, which can be obtained from the Backcountry Information Center located at the South Rim of Grand Canyon National Park. Permit requests can be faxed year-round to (928) 638-2125

Backcountry permits for North Rim winter camping are also available at Pipe Springs National Monument in Fredonia, Ariz., and the Bureau of Land Management Interagency Visitor Center in St.

### Grand Canyon National Park Seeks Input Re: Entrance Fees

Grand Canyon National Park is proposing to increase entrance fees into the park.

The proposed increase would change from \$25 to \$30 for a single vehicle for a seven day pass. The park's annual pass would increase from \$50 to \$60. The current rate of \$12 per individual or motorcycle would increase to \$15 per individual and \$25 for a motorcycle.

The additional revenue from the fee increase will be used to enhance visitor services, including repair and maintenance of park facilities, restoration and rehabilitation of visitor service buildings, additional park programs and transportation services, and increase resource protection. Examples of projects where fee revenue was used include the Bright Angel Trailhead renovation, the re-design of Mather Point, and the Grand Canyon Visitor Center. The park's free shuttle bus system, projected to have 6.8 million boardings in 2014, is also funded by entrance fee income.

A 60-day public engagement period on the proposed fee increase opened Nov. 7, and will close on Wednesday, Jan. 7, 2015.





#### **Master Eagle Falconer**

Ostwinkle is a master eagle falconer that is nationally known for his expertise in working with and rehabilitating bald and golden eagles. He is the volunteer eagle education and rehabilitation coordinator for Arizona Game and Fish Department's Adobe Mountain Wildlife Center in

He has been volunteering at the center for nearly 30 years and annually spends more than 300 days per year there. Among many other efforts, in early 2014, he helped rehabilitate three golden eagles and prepare them for release back into the wilds of Arizona.
"The Adobe Mountain Wildlife Center

is incredibly fortunate to have Jerry's expertise at hand and his willingness to vol-unteer so many hours towards helping rehabilitate and conserve Arizona's eagles," said Mike Demlong, Game and Fish's wildlife education program manager.

### Caring For Wildlife

Over thirty years ago, Arizona Game and Fish opened the first state-run wildlife rehabilitation and education center in the nation. Today, the center has provided wildlife triage, treatment and rehabilitation to more than 30,000 sick or injured animals and delivered wildlife education programs to millions of people at events and schools.

While the center still continues to provide care to wild animals, it also focuses heavily on educating the public about Arizona's diverse native wildlife. Ultimately, the center strives to rehabilitate wildlife for return to the wild, but in instances where an animal cannot be rereleased, the center may use them as educational wildlife ambassador.

2. Mix pecans, rosemary, salt, and black pepper in a shallow bowl. Place flour in a separate shallow bowl. Dip trout fillets in flour and shake off excess; dip fish into beaten egg, then into seasoned pecans, lightly pressing pecan coating onto fish. Arrange fillets on the prepared baking

tionship developed from the animal's point of view. All shows and habitats were designed to stimulate natural behavior. In the simplest terms, the animals can be themselves. This respectful approach allows visitors to discover how instincts, intellect, and feeling combine to form this spontaneous behavior.

At the Tiger Splash show, the staff interacts with majestic tigers as they "hunt'





colorful toys in a predatory/prey relationship and take breathtaking leaps in their aquatic playpen.

It can be found in southern Canada, through the eastern United States from Maine to Texas and south, including in parts of Arizona, and through Mexico. It is found in woodlands, gardens, shrublands, and swamps.

The northern cardinal is a mid-sized songbird with a body length of 21 cm (8.3 in). It has a distinctive crest on the head

and a mask on the face which is black in the male and gray in the female. The male is a vibrant red, while the female is a dull red-brown shade. The northern cardinal is mainly granivorous, but also feeds on insects and fruit.

The male behaves territorially, marking out his territory with song. During courtship, the male feeds seed to the female beak-to-beak. A clutch of three to four eggs is laid, and two to four clutches are produced each year.

It was once prized as a pet, but its sale as a cage bird is now banned in the United States by the Migratory Bird Treaty Act of 1918


