#### **SWIMMING HOLES**

## Hop In; The Water's Fine

It may be a desert state, but Arizona has many great swimming holes.

Nestled here and there near mountain springs and along tributaries of rivers, these natural spas are popular with hikers, picnickers and just about anyone who enjoys time in and around the water.

Some of the following entail a drive; others require a short walk or a bit of a scramble. A few can only be reached after a long, hard hike

Keep in mind, though, that you are not the only one who wants to cool off in the water; there may be crowds at any of these spots — especially on a summer weekend. Be ready for "company."

#### Water Wheel

The Mogollon Rim country north of Payson — laced with many creeks and canyons — is excellent for swimming holes. Some of the most popular ones are just east of the Water Wheel Campground, a recreation area off Forest Road 199.

As you hike east along the creek, you'll discover a series of swimming holes. The first few are wide and shallow; the ones farther east are narrower and fairly deep. The farther upstream you go, the fewer people

About a quarter-mile from the road is a series of small waterfalls and pools at the



base of a narrow granite gorge, polished smooth by water and time

From Phoenix, take Arizona 87 (the Beeline Highway) north to Payson. About 2 miles north of Arizona 260, turn east (right) onto Houston Mesa Road and continue 7.6 miles to a large camping/picnic site on the right. Park here and walk up the creek

Whether it's the way our skis or wakeboards are shaped, the variables that affect our boat waves, or even how our boat hull, engine, and instruments come together — we are riding on the backs of years upon years of research and development all dedicated to giving us the best riding experience.

As much as I dislike science classes. there is no doubt in my mind that taking the time to understand the various anatomic makeup of our watersports tools can help us become better riders.

So, next time you are riding in the water, look down at what's under your feet and think about the shape and the contours and all of the variables that came together to put you in your riding position. It's a sobering thought, but the illumination it can provide to your riding skills is limitless


tire waterskiing story begins. Samuelson is credited with inventing the sport of waterskiing in 1922. He created the first waterskis with a pair of pine boards and first rode them on Lake Pepin in Lake City, Minn. Then three years later, Samuelson created the first waterski jump.

#### Warren Witherell

It didn't take long for waterski jumping to catch on, and the bar quickly kept growing. The first ski jump record clocked in at 49 feet and was set by a man named Chuck Sligh. His record stayed for a while, but it was soon broken.

Then finally in 1954, a man named Warren Witherall broke the ultimate bar by jumping over a hundred feet. Unfortunately, his record was broken by 102 and then 104 feet at the exact same event. However, Warren will still go down in history for being the first person to break the 100-foot barrier.

Unfortunately, Mr. Witherall died on



May 26, 2014.

Freddy Krueger
No, I'm not talking about the horrormovie villain; I'm talking about the Illinois born Freddy Kreuger who holds the

current world record for waterski jumping. Yes, Krueger has set and beat his own record a few times but the bar is currently set at 250 feet. He will continue to push the sport as he still strives to keep beating

Andv Mapple

To tell someone about a slalom ski record, it wouldn't sound all that impressive. However, if you were to show some-one a slalom ski record being set, their mouths would most certainly drop. Andy Mapple of Great Britain held one of the longest-standing slalom ski records with 3 at 41 off.

His record stood for years until Nate Smith was finally able to break it. Even so, Mapple's long-standing legacy of skiing excellence makes him a worthy person to go down in waterski history. In 2005, Mapple retired from competition skiing

#### Herb O'Brien

Herb O'Brien is undoubtedly the godfather of waterskiing. Suffice to say, no single person has done more to progress the sport than O'Brien. Ralph Samuelson may have invented waterskiing, but O'Brien reinvented it. He completely innovated the shape of modern slalom skis.


In his relentless pursuit of perfection, he started three very influential waterski companies, all of which are still wildly successful and he even inspired one of the greatest wakeboard companies, Ronix, which is currently run by his son. Sadly, O'Brien passed away in 2012 but his impact on the sport will remain forever.

#### The Future Of Waterskiing

This list isn't meant to negate all of the other amazing people who have made this sport what it is today. However, these five are the standout players in the history of

waterskiing.

As a sport that is less than a century old, waterskiing will still continue to grow and evolve. Perhaps the next greatest waterskier hasn't even been born yet. Regardless, it's important to remember where we came from, and these five riders remind us where we were and where we are going.

## Update your boating safety knowledge

#### **Arizona Game** and Fish: boaters must "Clean. Drain and Dry"

#### Citations issued to stop the spread of Aquatic **Invasive Species**

PHOENIX - To protect Arizona lakes, rivers and streams from the devastating effects of invasive species, Arizona Game and Fish laws require boaters and anglers to "Clean, Drain and Dry" their boats and pull the boat plug when leaving any affected waterway. Failure to do so may result in a citation for the boat owner and possible fines

Game and Fish has stepped up enforcement because invasive species such as quagga mussels, New Zealand mudsnails, didymo, giant salvinia, apple snails, whirling disease and Largemouth Bass Virus have found their way into several Arizona lakes and rivers. To help stop their spread, it is illegal for boaters and anglers to transport water, live fish or fish body parts from one body of water to another. Law enforcement officers will cite boaters who fail to wipe down their boat, pull the plug, and drain all water whenever leaving an AIS-affected water.

#### Summer weekend boating means bigger crowds, increased need for safety

If you love being on your boat on summer weekends, you're not alone ... summer weekends are traditionally among the busiest boating days of the year in Arizona, and Arizona Game and Fish Department law enforcement personnel are out in force to keep boaters safe.

The Game and Fish Department reminds boaters that wearing their life jackets is especially important when conditions are crowded. Having more people on your boat can make it harder to maneuver, steer and stop, and with more boats on the water, there is less margin for error. Making sure everyone on your boat is wearing a life jacket can help ensure their safety.

"Wearing a life jacket before you end up in the water and knowing what to do in the first few minutes can make the difference between becoming a statistic or a survivor," said Recreational

Boating Safety Specialist Paul Newman of the U.S. Coast Guard Eleventh District, which includes Arizona. "A life jacket can buy you

time and increase your chances of survival."

State and federal boating laws require boaters to have a lifejacket for every passenger, a whistle, horn or other signaling device, a fire extinguisher and at least one throwable flotation cushion. Children under 12 on board must wear a life jacket whenever the boat is underway.

The important thing for summer boaters to remember is to avoid taking unnecessary risks," said AZGFD State Watercraft Investigator Reuben Gonzales. "Operating your boat recklessly on a crowded waterway is a recipe for disaster. Take it easy, use good judgment, obey the laws and get home safely.

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## Lake Powell Rises Significantly

This is good news for boaters as there are now safe passages for craft of larger sizes.

Lake Powell is rising a foot per day as abundant snowpack in northern Colorado and Wyoming continues to feed the Colorado and Green Rivers.

Runoff into Lake Powell that began in earnest in the middle of May and at the beginning of June had reached 60,000 cfs leading to a rapid rise in lake level.

That is good news for boaters. The rising water has opened the Castle Rock Cut near Wahweap Marina. There is now safe passage for boats of all sizes including tour boats destined to Rainbow Bridge and Navajo Canyon.

Three concrete launch ramps near Page are also open. The marina launch ramps at Wahweap, State Line and Antelope Point provide boaters with plenty of parking and

The Bureau of Reclamation projected that lake elevation will have peaked near 3,616 feet in early July and end the water year on Sept. 30 near 3,610 feet. That is an elevation 26 feet below Lake Powell's 50year average for the date.

The most probable inflow scenario provided by the Bureau projects that Lake Powell could rise an additional 10 feet in 2015 even if water releases downstream to Lake Mead increase to 9 million acre-feet as is being anticipated for water year 2015 beginning on Oct. 1, 2014.

Some additional good news is that there

are climate indicators that could signal a return to more normal Colorado River runoff patterns following 14 years of ex-treme drought, said Paul Ostapuk, Friends of Lake Powell spokesperson.

"The eastern Pacific Ocean is begin-ning to warm significantly and Nature magazine recently reported there are signs of changes in the Atlantic Ocean too. If the Gulf Stream continues to weaken," he said, "it would cool the North Atlantic.

Fluctuations in climate are largely influenced by oceanic currents so changes in one or both oceans could help drive a reversal of the persistent drought conditions across the Southwest U.S. that began abruptly in 2000."



## The Most Expensive Ship Ever

It cost 14 billion and they call it a Ford.

The United States' next generation of aircraft carrier is the FORD-class carriers — the first-in-class USS Gerald R. Ford has been being built at Newport News Shipbuilding, Va.

The numbers behind USS Gerald R. Ford are impressive: about \$14 billion in total cost, 224 million pounds, about 25 stories high, 1,106 feet long, and 250 feet wide. But, the sheer enormity of the ship and construction operation is hard to grasp until you're nearly face-to-metal with the massive military beast.

#### 100 Years Of Carrier Design

At Newport News Shipbuilding, the power of new technology and 100 years of carrier design are built into every facet of the new ship. The Ford will handle up to 220 takeoffs and landings from its deck every day

Part of that quick turnaround is because, when aircraft like the new F-35 return for maintenance, the plane's network will already have alerted ground crews as to what's needed so they can get the aircraft on its way faster than ever before.

The new FORD-class aircraft carrier will be the largest, most-lethal ship ever when it joins the US fleet in 2016.



#### **Hard To Fathom**

The scope of the ship's construction is hard to fathom, but its chain alone is made up of links weighing 360-pounds each. It's the weight of the chains that immobilize the 224 million pound carrier, not the anchors like those seen on USS Abraham Lincoln.

All that weight starts in the "Bulbous Bow" that displaces the ship's center of gravity, allowing her to cruise on just the energy required for a much smaller ship. Her bow alone is more than three stories tall and weighs 116,000 pounds.

Using the largest crane in the Western Hemisphere, which towers 235 feet above the shipyard, "Big Blue" can lift nearly 2.5 million pounds at a time and is essential for

assembling the new class of ship. Ships this big have to be built in dry docks with dimensions that measure twenty-two-hundred-feet long and 250 feet wide.

Replacing the 50-year-old Nimitz-class carrier, engineers at Newport News Shipbuilding designed the Ford to accept technology that won't be seen for decades. Some of those advancements are expected, but most are as far-fetched as the Navy's newest drones were in 1963.

#### More Power, More Planes, More Months

Regardless of what the future brings, all of it will require more power, which is why the Ford will generate three times the energy of Nimitz-class carriers

Moving the island house (the control tower) back farther on the ship will accommodate an increased launch rate for the 75plus planes that will live aboard the carrier The Ford will be capable of launching and receiving up to 220 planes a day.

That increased rate comes in part from replacing the steam-generated catapult systems like those on USS Abraham Lincoln with an electromagnetic system that's more efficient and gentler on the multimillion-dollar jets.

Even with the extra fuel and weapons needed to keep that pace, the Ford is equipped to remain at sea without replenishment for months at a time.

#### Time Frame

The Ford was launched in November 2013, to remain in Newport News' shipyard at Pier 3 for the following 28 months to undergo additional outfitting and test-

The US Navy's program CVN 21 for the future generation aircraft carrier program was previously known as the CVN(X). Several years ago the U.S. Navy announced that that the new class would be called the Gerald R Ford Class; the first-in-class is USS Gerald R. Ford (CVN 78) — to be commissioned in 2015. Following will be USS John F. Kennedy (CVN 79) — to be commissioned in 2019.

It is projected that further ships of this class will enter service at intervals of five years. A total of 10 Ford-class carriers are planned, with construction continuing to 2058

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

## It Is Time To Take A Kid Fishing

Lake Powell has topped out at 3609 MSL after rising 35 feet this year. That means Castle Rock Cut is 27 feet deep and should remain passable for the rest of

Fish are more concerned about habitat. New green brush went under water at 3603 and will provide bass habitat and shad shelter for much of the summer. The shad crop is a bit above average. Adult shad continue to spawn in July when in some others years they would have finished spawning by now.

That is a positive occurrence. The size of the shad population will be determined with trawl sampling during dark moon phase later in the month.

#### **Daily Routine**

Blue collar stripers in the southern lake have settled into a daily routine. They go to work at first light and chase shad for an hour or two. Then they take a break until

mid day when the most serious shad chasing occurs.

On calm days, surface feeding action is common in the main channel as small striper schools are consistently seen from Padre Bay to Rock Creek and Dungeon Canyon. Surface boils settle down again in the afternoon and then are repeated briefly in the evening.

The imminent arrival of full moon will push most feeding activity into late afternoon and evenings with quiet mornings.

Full moon will have less impact in the northern lake where water is clearing as runoff diminishes. Surface feeding is ramping up in the backs of canyons as shad are becoming visible to stripers.

Best striper fishing will now be in the northern lake with good striper fishing lakewide. Expect increasing surface feed-

ing activity in Good Hope Bay during July. Stripers are susceptible to trolling while relaxing at depth between surface excursions. A few fish can be caught while waiting for the next surface explosion. Trolling success is about two to three fish per hour

in the southern lake compared to 10 fish an hour in the north.

#### Success Increasing

Bass fishing success is increasing lakewide as water level stabilizes. Lots of fish are caught with plastic grubs and tubes but the average bass size is small. Both bass and striper populations are rebuilding after low water and poor habitat during the

past two years.
Catfishing success is increasing as spawning concludes. Catfish are pa-trolling the beaches in the evening looking for an easy meal. It is easy to invite them to dinner by putting a few table scraps on

a hook which are then cast to the sandy bottom behind the boat.

#### Teaching The Kids

Surface fishing for stripers combined with small bass along the shore and catfish on the beach provide ideal conditions for teaching children how to fish. The key element in fishing instruction is to actually include fish as part of the training. Fish are now available for kids to catch while visiting Lake Powell on a family vacation.

Make sure to bring fishing equipment for another fun activity while at the lake. At press time, lake elevation was 3609,

and water temperature was 75-80F.

#### A 'WHALE OF A TALE'

#### **Lessons Learned From A Trophy Striper**

Early one Saturday morning, a call came stating a big striper had just been caught at the mouth of Warm Creek. It took about 20 minutes to get there but we soon found a boat at the corner of Warm Creek and the main channel

Adam Jones and Deborah Williams were right there and when we got in range, Adam held up a huge striper. We got out of the wind and headed to shore where we could get the full story.

#### Death Of A Big Fish

Adam and Deborah were out at dawn fishing along Warm Creek Wall on June 14, when they noticed a surface disturbance. As they got closer, it proved to be a giant striper thrashing on top. They got close enough to net the fish and then tried to resuscitate the fish and release it.

But it was to no avail; the big fish succumbed within minutes of capture. They measured the fish using hand widths and came up with 45 inches. That's when I showed up and began discussing options.

#### **Determining The Cause**

Adam would like to have had the fish mounted as it was the biggest fish he ever "caught." But, it is entirely possible to make a fiberglass mount by just supplying dimensions and a picture to the taxidermist.

It was determined that I would take the fish, determine exact measurements, and perform a necropsy to determine cause of death. I put the big fish on ice and headed back to the lab.

This fish was 44 inches long and weighed 28.75 pounds (certified scales) with a girth of 25.5 inches. Most striped bass of this length exceed 30 pounds but this one had an empty stomach except for three carp spines.

It had been eating recently but the mostly empty stomach, which was 14 inches long, did not add an extra pound or two which is common when the stomach is full. That also explains why the girth was 2 inches smaller than other stripers of this length.

The cause of death was likely spawning stress. The 10-inch long ovaries were

## Get Rigged, Ready For 'Hot' Fishing

Try Apache Lake for something different. Here, crappie and walleye are other tasty options. Fish some of Apache's heavy breaks where shallow water quickly becomes deep. It has really become a tremendous largemouth bass fishery. There are also plentiful yellow bass, which are a lot of fun to catch on light tackle.

Apache Lake also has a healthy herd of bighorns. So be sure to take a camera this is one of our most photogenic lakes.

#### The Reel Deal

Summer is hot and sticky and dizzying in the daytime, but its sounds and weather rhythms can get fish whacking baits. Cicadas are singing high-Cs at Lees Ferry, anglers are reporting flurries of trout feeds at various honey holes, and more highcountry weather fronts will have fish feeding aggressively as the thunder bumpers

Rigged and ready? Check the summer trout stocking schedule.

Up at the Ferry, the cicada bite is on.



This should continue through August. As terrestrials such as the cicadas awaken. fish look for cicadas and other surfacedrifting terrestrials by shoreline vegeta-

#### **Nighttime Fishing**

Overall, fishing can be tough in July, but with hot daytime temperatures and a weekend full moon, nighttime fishing becomes an even better, and cooler, option.

Plus, fish tend to feed better on the full moon (a universal fishing law, if there ever were one). Although submersible lights gather small bait fish, and, in turn, the predators you want peeling your line

Some anglers load up on striped bass even though the moon phases aren't agreeable, especially at Pleasant, Mead and Powell. Not hearing much on the crappie angling right now, but Alamo, Roosevelt and Bartlett should all be decent. Also try fishing near the old river beds of these

The old summer pattern holds true: Fish are most active at sunrise and sunset, or at night. At sunrise, begin in the coves and switch to main lake points, humps and islands. As the sun sinks into its hammock, try main lake points and secondary points in coves.

#### **Fire Restrictions**

The Coconino and Kaibab National forests have lifted their fire restrictions. Due to significant and widespread rain and rapidly decreasing fire danger, the Coconino and Kaibab National Forests in

#### **Senate Strangles** The Bipartisan Sportsmen's Act Of '14

Senate dashes hopes for sportsmen bill that benefits conservation.

July 10, the U.S. Senate effectively killed the Bipartisan Sportsmen's Act of 2014 when it failed to pass a vote that would have moved the bill forward. After 81 amendments were offered to the bill, many of which were not supported by the sporting community or germane to the original bill, the vote reflected the partisan animosity of the mid-year elections

The bill had 46 cosponsors and had the strong support of most hunting and angling organizations and many conservation organizations.

#### A Disheartening Vote

"Upfront, we wish to thank the bill's sponsors Senators Kay Hagan (D-N.C.) and Lisa Murkowski (R-Alaska) for working with us to craft a bipartisan bill that we, and others in the sporting community, believe should have passed," said Ameri-can Sportfishing Association Vice President Gordon Robertson.

"It's very disheartening that the Senate process and partisan politics pulled down, for the second time in two years, a comprehensive sportsmen's package that would have benefited this nation's fish and wildlife resources as well as hunters and

Robertson further said, "The failure had nothing to do with the merits of the bill and much to do with mid-term elections this year. Neither party wants to give an advantage to the other. Although we understand that this has always been the way of politics, but we also understand that good public policy requires discipline to do what is right for the nation. The former is what killed this legislation and other recent bills in the Senate.

#### **Bill Could Return**

The sportfishing community had expected that germane and bipartisan-supported bills such as the National Fish Habitat Conservation Act, solutions to the



## **Voluntary Programs More Successful Than Mandatory Bans**

Arizona Game and Fish believes voluntary non-lead ammo program more effective than a regulated ban for endangered condors.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department disagrees with a recent appeal filed by environmental litigants to regulate lead ammunition on the Kaibab National Forest as the solution to lead poisoning in endangered California condors.

Three groups that want the U.S. Forest Service to place a mandatory ban on hunting with lead ammunition in northern Arizona lost their original lawsuit against the Kaibab National Forest filed in 2012.

Game and Fish intervened in the original lawsuit by the Sierra Club, Grand Canyon Wildlands Council and Center for

Biological Diversity. The appeal challenges the Kaibab National Forest Land and Resource Management Plan that was recently finalized and its associated Environmental Impact Statement.

#### Conservation Through Partnerships

"Arizona Game and Fish has purposefully chosen wildlife conservation through partnerships, and education of its hunting constituents, not regulations," says Assis tant Director of Wildlife Management Jim deVos. "The appellants falsely argue that



condor's core range.

California banned lead ammunition in condor range in 2008, but a recent study by the University of California/Davis concluded that condor lead poisoning has not been significantly reduced in that condor population.

'Lasting change takes time and partnerships, but results in lasting cooperation. It is naïve to think a regulation or lawsuit will fix the problem of ingested lead in condors," said deVos. "Even with a complete ban on the use of lead bullets in the condors' California range, birds continue to die from ingesting lead, demonstrating the ineffectiveness of a mandatory ban of lead ammunition in condor range

#### Voluntary Program Begun in 2003

Arizona Game and Fish began its voluntary, hunter-supported non-lead program in 2003 to reduce the amount of lead available to condors. Before the depart-

## Lake Havasu City Fights British Attack On London Bridge

Visitors Bureau demands immediate retraction from U.K.'s The Sun newspaper and seeks volunteers to counter false story.

Imagine being the mayor of Lake Havasu City, Ariz., and coming to work one day to learn that your city's iconic bridge, shipped to this desert oasis and painstakingly reconstructed stone-by-stone in the late 1960s to become Arizona's number-two tourist attraction and reading in a London newspaper that it was, in fact, falling down — just like the nurs-

Such was the case when a concerned citizen returning from a visit to London gave Mayor Mark Nexsen a story in the U.K.'s The Sun that said the famed bridge is scheduled to be "bulldozed."

While the English Village built beneath London Bridge has seen higher visitation in the 1970s and 1980s and is currently being revitalized, the bridge itself is as solid as ever, save for a few ghosts said to have been transported within the stonework in 1969

#### **Apology Demanded**

To counter the story, the city's Visitors Bureau demanded that *The Sun* print a front-page apology and retraction for hav-

ing published a complete fabrication.

"An article like this is a stain upon our honor," says Doug Traub, president and CEO of the Lake Havasu City Convention & Visitors Bureau. "For over four decades we have been dedicated custodians of British history

"We stand to lose millions of dollars in tourism revenue if our friends in the United Kingdom stay away out of spite.

"The Sun claimed bridge maintenance stopped," Traub continues. "We invite them to return to write another article – on top of their retraction — as we invest \$624,000 more this year in bridge maintenance, in addition to the \$2.5 million in bridge maintenance we've invested over the past 10 years.

"We are a small town and our hard-earned taxes pay for all of this upkeep. We can't afford a hit like this. It's just awful to us, a slap in the face."

#### Volunteers Can Help

The Bureau is not stopping with just a strong demand for a retraction. It has begun reaching out to volunteers for help in spreading the word that the London Bridge is well maintained.

Starting June 29, the plan was that any-

one with a U.K. passport, or anyone else with confirmed airfare to the U.K. in July or August, would be provided with a thumbnail-sized piece of the bridge and a brochure about the historic structure. The idea is to have returning residents of Great Britain, and Americans traveling to London on work or vacation, testify that all's

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
well with what's been called the "world's largest antique.


Says the City's Mark Clark, PE, PTOE, Maintenance Services Division manager, "All these improvements that we continue to make keep the bridge intact to avoid any major failures. Once our work is completed this summer, we should have a bridge that lasts another 40 years or more."

#### Repairs In The Works

The bridge has been holding up well these 43 years, but water has leaked into one of the support piers and now needs to



f you're looking for a cool getaway in Arizona that is a bit off the beaten path (and therefore not quite so packed with human beings), you should give the

Pinaleno Mountains a try.

There are lots of excellent hiking trails, a lake to fish in, and plenty of good campgrounds whether you favor a tent or an RV. The tallest peak is over 10,000 feet, and you may be familiar with the name -Graham: the mountain with the famous

protected red squirrels

The Pinalenos are one of the "sky islands" in southeastern Arizona. Sky islands are mountains that are isolated by drastically different lowlands. In this case, the beautiful forests of these mountains are surrounded by desert. This gives them a unique ecology. You can find out a lot more about sky islands at www.skyislandalliance.org.

#### Arcadia Trail

The Arcadia trail has been designated a National Recreation Trail, so of course we had to check it out first. There are gorgeous views and lots of beautiful birds to see. If you're lucky, you may even see deer. When we went, there were still bright yellow and red leaves on some of the trees and bushes. This was in November and it was already getting chilly.

The Arcadia is a five-mile there and back trail (so, 10 miles round trip), but it goes from one campground to another. Most people go from the Shannon Campground to the Arcadia Campground because it's mostly downhill that way.

Since we were going to have to backtrack either way, we chose to park at the Arcadia Campground and go uphill on the way out and downhill on the way back. If you have someone to give you a ride, by all means take the downhill path.

If you park at the Arcadia, you actually

have to climb up a little ridge to get to the actual trailhead. You can't see it from the main campground

About a mile from the Shannon Camp-

ground trailhead you will come across Heliograph Trail. This one climbs to the top of Heliograph Peak and you can get quite

a fantastic view from up there.

If you have started at the Shannon and don't want to go all the way to the Arcadia Campground, you can take the Heliograph trail to the summit then go back to Shannon campground by following Heliograph Road, which is closed to motor vehicles. This makes about a 4-mile loop, but you'll miss a lot of really pretty trail.

Also, the Heliograph Trail is a bit steep so be prepared for some huffing and puff-ing. Near Arcadia campground you'll see the more colorful trees and probably wildflowers as well. This is where we saw a lot of birds, too — the trail crosses a little riparian area. This really is a beautiful hike and I highly recommend it.

#### **Grant Hill Loop Trail**

This trail is actually part of a system of trails for mountain bikes, made up of old logging roads connected together. They make for a great hike, especially the old road parts.

For easiest going, take this loop headed clockwise. It's just over four miles, and will give you some sweet views of Fort Grant and the Galiuro Mountains. There are a lot of loops and connecting trails, so if you don't have trail maps, make sure you take of photo of the one at the trail-

head so you don't get mixed up.

The forest is mostly pine, but you'll also find some nice stands of aspen. This is a really nice, not-too-difficult trail.

#### Riggs Flat Lake

This beautiful 11-acre trout lake is your reward for reaching the end of the Swift Trail. Alpine forest and meadows surround it, and there is a really nice, easy hike that goes around the lake. The trail is only a little over half a mile and is super easy, so it's great for kids. It can get a little boggy at the end of the lake, but kids love that anywav.

If you have a valid Arizona fishing license, you can try for the trout that are stocked in Riggs Flat. Try corn, cheese,

#### Slide Rock State Park

A hot summer day is perfect to enjoy the natural waterslides of Oak Creek. Kids and adults can enjoy the luxury of cool swimming holes and smooth rock chutes amid the exquisite scenery along Oak Creek Canyon.

Access is easy (check, though, for any restrictions following the Slide Fire) and there are restrooms, picnic tables and a small concession and gift shop, Slide Rock State Park is popular, especially on summer weekends.

When you are ready to "dry out," try a stroll along one of the short, scenic hiking trails. Bird watchers will delight in this rich riparian area.

A word to the wise, though: No pets or glass containers are permitted in the swim-

From Phoenix, take Interstate 17 north to Exit 298 (the Sedona exit), then follow Arizona 179 west and north about 15 miles into Sedona. Now take Arizona 89A north about 7 miles to the park.

#### **Bell Crossing**

There's some history here. Rancher Charles Bell built a cattle trail in this spot in the 1930s, but now it's a favorite among hikers

After a long, hot 3.5-mile hike across a slightly scenic landscape, the crossing — where the Bell Trail crosses Wet Beaver Creek - appears as an oasis, shaded by cottonwoods, sycamores, willows and ash.

To reach the swimming hole, also known as "the Crack," head upstream from the crossing to a series of wide and sometimes fairly deep pools along the creek — perfect spots for a quick, cooling dip.

Although it can be a bit of a challenge in places to get beyond the Crack, the farther you go, the fewer the people

From Phoenix, take I-17 north to Exit 298 (the Sedona exit). Turn east and follow Forest Road 618 about 2 miles southeast, then turn left onto FR 618A and proceed to the parking area.

#### Hell's Gate

Just the opposite of its name, Hell's Gate Wilderness is a lovely place, with ragged rock walls towering hundreds of feet and a lush riparian corridor providing a green carpet through the desert.

There's no doubt that it's a long, hot, steep and heavy hike down to Hell's Gate, but it only makes arriving at the creek that much more rewarding. (And it cuts way down on the crowds.)

Not quite a clear path until you reach the creek, but a trail continues on the other side, winding west a couple of hundred yards to where Haigler Creek joins Tonto Creek. The banks are full of brush, but there are some good camping spots near the confluence, and the verdant areas along the creeks are inviting places

From Phoenix, take Arizona 87 (the Beeline Highway) north to Payson. Turn east on Arizona 260 and go about 11 miles. At mile marker 263, turn south onto the unsigned Forest Road 405A and drive half a mile to the trailhead.

#### **Havasu Falls**

The waters of Havasu Falls in the western Grand Canyon are an amazingly exquisite turquoise. Although a trip here requires a lot of planning, some money, and a long hike, the wonder of soaking in some of the most beautiful water ever is worth every plan, every dollar, and every

Whether you stay at the lodge in Supai Village or the campground beyond, you can explore Havasu, Mooney and Navajo falls. And, if you want even more water, you can hike all the way down to the Colorado River.

From Hualapai Hilltop, roughly 60 miles north of Seligman, it's a moderately difficult 8-mile hike to Supai Village and another 2 miles to the campground.

From Phoenix, take I-17 north to Flagstaff. Turn west on I-40 and go about 75 miles to Seligman. Take Route 66 about 28 miles northwest to Indian Route 18. Turn right and go about 60 miles to the parking area at Hualapai Hilltop. There are no facilities at the trailhead, but you may camp there. No permits or fees required.

salmon eggs, Power Bait, and worms. Fly fishermen often catch the browns and brook trout. You can even take a small boat on the lake (electric motor only).

There is also a one-mile trail (2.2 miles round trip) called the Jesus Goudy trail that simply dead ends at a vista point. It starts above Riggs Flat Lake. We didn't hike this trail, which by all accounts is very faint and rather difficult to follow. We'll try this one next time. And there

definitely will be a next time for us are totally in love with the beautiful Pinaleno Mountains.

#### So Many Hikes, So Little Time

There are many more hikes that we simply didn't have time to explore our first time out. Go to the Coronado National Forest Web site for information on trails, camping, water availability, etc. Some of the campgrounds are closed until fall this year because of dangerous trees, and since the road goes up up up, portions of it may be closed due to snow. We passed several gates that can be swung shut to close the highway.

#### **Scenic Drives**

If you're not into hiking, you may want to check out the Pinaleno Swift scenic drive. About 8 miles south of Safford, turn southwest onto AZ 366. The drive is just over 35 miles and will take you about 5 hours for the round trip (70 miles total).

You'll see everything from desert scrub to alpine forest and meadows on this drive. There are plenty of interesting things to stop and see, as well as trailheads and other recreation activities that might be too hard to resist. Allow plenty of time!

#### Camping

Campgrounds in the Pinalenos are Arcadia, Cunningham, Hospital Flat, Riggs Flat, Shannon, Soldier Creek, and Stock-



ton Pass. RVs under 22 feet are allowed at Arcadia, Riggs Flat, Soldier Creek, and Cunningham. You need to call ahead and make sure the campgrounds are open before you go. Call the Coronado National Forest Safford District at (928) 428-4150.


Getting There From Safford, drive south 8 miles on US 191 to AZ 366. Turn right (southwest) onto 366. This paved road is paved winds up the western end of the Pinalenos until just around where the Shannon Campground is. Then you follow FR300, which is a very well-maintained gravel road that will take you all the way to Riggs Lake.

#### Bonus Trip

If you're staying in Safford and are just exploring the area, take I-70 east from Saf-ford, then 191 up through Clifton and Morenci. The copper mines in that area are awesome to behold.

I have a very old Forest Service map of this area and it shows that highway 191 used to be Highway 666. There is a pretty interesting story about that. To check it out, visit www.fhwa.dot.gov/infrastructure/us666.cfm.

Safford, by the way, is a delightful place to stay. It's a very pretty town and the people are really friendly. It's big enough to have everything you need, but small enough to give you a down home feel. We loved it there. They also have some awesome Mexican-food restaurants

Arizona State Parks (ASP) will choose from eligible submissions located in Arizona. ASP staff will evaluate the submissions and the top two will be forwarded to NPS to compete in the national competition where between six and 12 proposals will be awarded.

If selected, additional information will

be required. Please note that only a total of \$3 million is available for the entire nationwide competition, with each state eligible to submit only two applications.

Governmental entities having populations of 50,000 or more and the counties they reside in as listed in the 2010 Census Urban Areas are eligible to apply for this grant program. Eligible projects include acquisition and/or development of public parkland and applicants can request between \$250,000 and \$500,000.

There is a required match from state, local or private sources. The anticipated award date is between January 1, 2015 and April 1, 2015.

over-the-ankle boots, and gloves. A helmet approved by the US Department of Transportation is required for those under the age of 18, and recommended for all riders. ALL riders are required to wear protective glasses, goggles or a transparent face shield unless the OHV is equipped with a windshield.

 OHVs are designed to be operated off highway, not on paved surfaces. Always ride on designated trails—never on paved roads except to cross when it's safe and permitted by law.

- Never carry a passenger on a singlerider OHV, and no more than one passenger on an OHV specifically designed for two people.
  - · Always ride sober. Never drink alco-

be pumped and dried out. Lake Havasu City also plans to create a maintenance entryway into the mainland side of the bridge to better ensure the safety of workers.

Also on the repair schedule: There's sand on the bearing pads that prevent the bridge from smoothly expanding and contracting in various temperatures. Those pads will now be cleaned.

The CVB's Traub continues, "The Sun story also says the bridge will be torn down to attract drug tourism. Last time we looked, this was illegal in Arizona."

#### 'Chips Off The Old Block'

The city's Visitors Center, located in the shadow of the bridge, regularly sells bridge fragments to tourists. The stones are literally "a chip off an old block" that was transported to Lake Havasu by founder Robert P. McCulloch, but never used in the reconstruction

U.K. residents and Americans heading to Great Britain can claim their souvenir fragments by visiting the Visitors Center at 422 English Village.

ment's program began, estimates showed that less than four percent of successful Kaibab deer hunters used non-lead ammu-

For the past two years, 88 percent of the state's hunters in condor range have taken voluntary lead-reduction measures even despite a nationwide shortage in non-lead ammunition in 2013.

In fact, this year's annual trapping and testing of condors from the Arizona-Utah population revealed a substantial decrease in the percentage of birds with

toxic blood-lead levels, the lowest in nearly a decade.

#### Success In Arizona-Utah

Condors are now frequently using lands in southern Utah for foraging, especially during the fall hunting season. With expansion of the condor's range, conservation management must adapt along with the birds. The Utah Division of Wildlife recognizes the role it plays in the conservation of the species and began a more aggressive voluntary non-lead program in

spent suggesting this fish had just completed spawning. Full, ripe ovaries can weigh 2-3 pounds which would add more weight and girth to this fish.

#### Temperature Makes A Difference

Striped bass are a marine fish that are adapted to life in the ocean. As they mature, they seek water temperature in the mid 60s. Juvenile stripers can survive well in warmer water. This genetic change with age, separates large and small stripers and protects small fish from predation by larger ones.

In fresh water, the opposite is true. When adult stripers mature and are forced into deeper, cooler water, it is adult fish that struggle. Shad live in warm water where juvenile stripers reside. When adults are forced to leave the warm zone, their food choices become limited leaving juvenile stripers on top with shad and the competitive advantage.

If adult stripers are not large enough to

eat 1-pound carp, and catfish then they become malnourished. This explains why there are so many large, lean fish in certain years

But, this trophy fish was healthy and well nourished. Striped bass are surface spawners so they must abide the warm water during spawning. If they stay in 75+ degree water for an extended time, lactic acid builds up in the muscles beyond the capacity of the fish to recover. This is the cause of death of most trophy fish that are found dead on the surface.

#### **Striper Life Spans**

My best guess is that this fish succumbed to post-spawning stress and excessive lactic acid buildup in warm water, which prevented the fish from diving into deep water.

Scales were read to determine age. This fish was similar to other trophy striped bass from Lake Powell. The age was 10 years, which seems to be the maximum life span of large stripers. Striped bass that do not leave the school seldom live longer than five years, while trophy fish live twice that long.

Large stripers are loners that hunt cat-

fish, carp, and walleye in the cooler water.
They do come into shallow water to eat shad on occasion when shad numbers are high and hunting forage does not require a



red snapper management problems in the Gulf of Mexico and the beach access problems at Cape Hatteras National Seashore would become amendments to the package.

Robertson further noted, "While these, and other beneficial amendments were filed, many other amendments served only as polarizing lighting rods. It's pos-

sible the bill could return in a lame-duck session, but it is too early to make that prediction."

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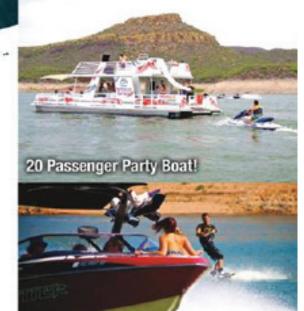




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
