#### **History of Dragon Boating**

Dragon boat origins: Dragon Boat rac-ing as an amateur water sport has its roots in an ancient folk ritual of contending villagers held over the past 2,000 years throughout southern China. While "competition" has taken place annually for more than 20 centuries as part of religious ceremonies and folk customs, dragon-boat racing has emerged in modern times as an international sport, beginning in Hong Kong in 1976

Chinese Dragon Boat-Shanghai: However, the history of dragon boats in competition reaches as far back as the same era as the original games of Olympia in ancient Greece. Both dragon-boat racing and the ancient Olympiad included aspects of religious observances and community celebrations along with competition.



unlike competitive rowing and canoe racing, dragon boating has a rich fabric of ancient ceremonial, ritualistic and religious traditions. In other words, the modern competitive aspect is but one small part of this complex of water craftsmanship.

#### **Learn About Dragon Boats**

IDBF 20 Paddler Dragon Boat: The boats are constructed with a two-part mold. This allows for molded interior features such as non-skid decking, fore/aft foot rests and deep interior hand holds to safely lift the boat.

#### Construction

The boats are constructed using fiberglass and polyester resin for durability and low maintenance. All boats are made with a \*Coremat layer for additional stiffness. Core mat is a layer that is sandwiched between the inner and outer hull.

Asian hard woods are used for the seats and gunwales. This rich and beautiful wood is sustainable and easy to maintain.

Each bench consists of two parts. The bottom layer is molded construction of fiberglass and polyester resin with the actual seating surface constructed of Asian hard wood. The face is angled 5 degrees forward for a more aggressive posture and is fastened with stainless steel screws which allows for easy maintenance.

Swift Racing dragon boats are designed to be fast and stable in the water. They are lightweight, about 550 pounds for the 20-

## Update your boating safety knowledge

#### **Wear Your Life Jacket**

All vessels except sailboards and certain racing shells or rowing skulls must have at least one wearable Type I, II, III or V life jacket that is U.S. Coast Guard (USCG) approved and of the proper size for each person on board. Life jackets, or "Personal Floatation

Devices" (PFD) must be readily access sible, in good and serviceable condition and the right size for the intended wearer. On Arizona waterways, vessels 16 feet in length or longer, except canoes or kayaks, must have one Type IV USCG approved throwable flotation device on board and readily accessible.

#### **USCG Approved Flotation Devices**



USCG USCG USCG Type IV Type II Type III

All children 12 years of age and younger must wear a USCG approved Type I, II, or III life jacket (PFD) anytime while underway on any vessel. The life jacket must be worn according to the manufacturer's recommended use and must fit the child properly. All snaps must be snapped, zippers and fasteners closed.

Each person on a personal watercraft (PWC) such as a Jet Ski or Wave Runner must wear a USCG approved Type I, II, or III PFD (life jacket) with all fasteners and closures secured according to the manufacturer's design and recommended use. Further, the life jacket must be adjusted for a snug fit.

Each person being towed behind a ssel on water skis, wakeboard or similar devices must wear a life jacket or buoyant belt. Note however, that buoy ant belts are not approved by the USCG.

Life jackets can keep you afloat long enough to be rescued... but only when you wear them!

#### **Pre-Departure Checklist**

You can help assure a good time while operating your vessel by performing this pre-departure check

- Check the weather forecast for the area and timeframe during which you will be boating.
- Make sure that the steering and throttle controls operate properly and all lights are working
- Check for any fuel leaks from the tank, fuel lines, and carburetor
- Check the engine compartment for oil leaks.
- Check hose connections for leaks or cracks, and make sure hose clamps are tight.
- Drain all water from the engine compartment, and be sure the bilge plug is replaced and
- Check to be sure you have a fully charged engine battery and fire extinguisher
- If so equipped, make sure the ignition safety switch and wrist lanyard are in good order.
- Make sure you have the required number of life jackets (personal flotation devices or PFDs), and check that they are in good condition.
- Leave a float plan with a reliable friend or relative.

or upgrade takes a long time, but delays are often a simple result of supply and demand. "Spring and summer can be the most challenging times to get work done on a boat because everyone else wants their work at the same time," said BoatUS Director of Consumer Affairs Charles

But, with a little foresight boaters can get the services they need — sometimes at a better price — now. And, some things on "to do now" list don't require outside help. Here are some common projects boaters should be looking at doing now, before the spring rush:
Engine and Prop: Getting your boat's

motor worked on in June is like waiting to

## Additional Adult Quagga Mussels Found In Lake Powell

The National Park Service and Utah Division of Wildlife Resources (UDWR) have recently detected additional adult quagga mussels in Lake Powell. Since this time last year, the water levels at Lake Powell have dropped which has exposed shorelines that were previously underwa-

Thousands of adult quagga mussels have been found in various locations, such as canyon walls, Glen Canyon Dam, boats, and other underwater structures. The majority of mussels found are isolated adults, with additional groupings of small clusters. One adult mussel was found on the south canyon wall of Bullfrog Bay.

Boat inspections and decontamination of high-risk boats are still required for incoming vessels at Glen Canyon. Continued mussel education and prevention activities, including boat inspections, will minimize the chances that mussels will colonize other areas of the lake. It may also prevent the introduction of other aquatic invasive species

It is crucial to keep the mussels from moving from Lake Powell to other lakes and rivers. When leaving Lake Powell, all watercraft are required by Utah and Arizona state law to be decontaminated (Clean, Drain, and Dry) before being moved to another water body

Regulations vary depending on the state, so all boaters should review the regulations of any states they will enter with their watercraft after being at Lake Powell, including Arizona and Utah.

## To Help Stop The Spread Of Mussels

You must clean and drain your boat be-fore you leave the vicinity of the lake.

You must dry your boat the required amount of time before moving it to another body of water.

OR you can have your boat professionally decontaminated.

"Park staff, partners, and the public

have worked hard to keep Lake Powell mussel free for the last ten years," said Superintendent Todd Brindle. "It's very disappointing that mussels are in the lake, but most visitors will not notice them. The important thing now is to keep them from being transported to other lakes and

A planning effort is currently underway to develop a Quagga/Zebra Mussel Management Plan (QZMP) to help the National Park Service decide what tools are appropriate to support the ongoing management of invasive mussels in Glen Canyon now that quagga mussels are present in Lake Powell. The QZMP will consider changes to the existing prevention and monitoring efforts, and will include analysis of potential control, containment, and other park management actions.

## It's Time To Start Angling Lake Powell

Weather is warming and trees are budding in the high desert. Its time to start thinking about fishing and what to expect from Lake Powell in 2014.

The lake has dipped to the lowest point since 2005 leaving brushy cover high and dry on the shoreline. Fortunately, there has been modest precipitation in the Colorado River drainage. When runoff starts, the lake should rise from the currently level of 3575 MSL back to 3600 MSL or perhaps a bit

Also fortunately, the Castle Rock Cut is being deepened and will be accessible to uplake travel by June 1. Rising water will rejuvenate many of the launch ramps that are currently closed including Antelope Point Public and Bullfrog Main ramp.

#### Rising Water: A Good Thing

Rising water will be good for fish. The old brush line came out of the water and left brush high and dry when the lake dropped below 3604 MSL. Lake level exceeding that point will provide cover for bass, crappie and shad that is needed for good survival of the new-year class.

Unfortunately, bass and crappie spawning occurs in late April and May when the lake will be below the brush line. Therefore, survival of young fish that use brush for cover will be minimal. Smallmouth bass walleye and striped bass will have good

production but their population density will depend on how many shad are produced.

After two seasons of low water levels. total fish numbers are down. Largemouth and crappie have taken the biggest deduction. Adults remain but there have been very few young fish recruited to the various fish populations that anglers seek.

The bright spot for shallow shoreline fishing will be smallmouth bass. They rely on rocky structure for protection and crayfish for nutrition. In current brushless, low

lake conditions smallmouth bass have the advantage and will be the fish to pursue from March to June

#### **Subtle Smallmouth Strategy**

Smallmouth bass fishing strategy is subtle. With no obvious woody habitat to target, look for rocky structure with a slope that drops quickly to deep water or broken rock pile along a slick rock shore. Perhaps the most important key is to find murky water created by wind or wave action. Most canyons have muddy water in the back dur-

ing spring inflow.

Look for the color transitions from clear, to green, to colored, then to muddy. Smallmouth bass will be found most often between the green and murky water sections in each canyon. Then look at the rock structure in the green/murky zone and fish on the shady side of the rock. Yes, I said it was going to be subtle.

#### Walleye Have Different Schedule


Walleye occupy the same habitat as smallmouth but they feed on a different schedule. Walleye will be on the shady side of rocks in the muddy/ green zone but they feed best just before first light and after sunset. They must have signed a joint use agreement with bass that prevents both from using the same structure at the same

#### Stripers: Look Ahead

Striped bass were literally jumping in the boat last year looking for the last anchovy in the bait bucket. A huge population of adult stripers was trapped in deep water looking for anything to eat. Shad were on the surface and stripers were in deep water. Those were good memories but put that in the scrapbook and look ahead.

Now that huge population of adults has gone on to bluer pastures and been replaced by their young offspring. Young, vibrant

#### Spring Fishing Can Be Excellent; It's Time To Get Catchin'

Tip Of The Week

Spring bass fishing can be excellent,

and there's one technique that can turn average bass days into exceptional ones.

During the pre-spawn (generally water temperatures of less than 55 degrees),

when targeting big, transitioning bass in the shallows, try dyeing your soft plastic bass lures orange. Water clarity is generally limited in our warm-water fisheries right now, and an orange tail can help trigger bass feeding on crawfish.

During a spawn (when water temper-atures are at least 55-60 degrees) chartreuse dye on the tail of a plastic bass lure resembles bream. Bedding bass will protect their eggs from such hungry predators and likely snap at the bait.

In addition, if using dark-colored plas-tics in murky water, the added color can also help an angler detect bites faster.

Consider picking up a bottle of dye from your local tackle shop, but wait until you're on the boat to dye the tail. There's a risk of staining furniture, tables, and vour clothes

#### The Reel Deal

Hello, anglers,

Rainbow trout received a much-needed cool off last weekend's storms. After a particularly warm winter, that brief rain and wind should have con-vinced the trout to bite often after a tough winter for trout anglers.

The weather whipped the waters just in time for one Big Fish of the Year nominee: Nancy Russell for a 7-pound, 2.88ounce rainbow trout she caught March 3 in Pioneer Lake.

Bass continue to get ready for a major spawn. At Roosevelt Lake, for example, water temperatures hit 60 degrees and largemouth bass are in 10-20 feet of water, chasing bait outside of spawning coves. If nothing else, the week before full moon that began March 16 could be a great time for bedding fish.

You've heard it before – please quickly release these fish so that they will live and spawn or our future fish populations will not suffer.

Finally, some news from Arrivaca Lake. The boat ramp and vehicular access to the lake shore will not be available

The department has hosted five of six public forums to meet with constituents about developing the 2014 fall hunt recommendations for deer, bighorn sheep,



Semper paratus (always ready): As members of the Coast Guard Auxiliary, we are trained to react to situations, take charge and make things happen. That is what took place on Feb. 22 at the International Sportsman Exposition (ISE) in Glendale, Ariz..

The circumstances of that day still run through my mind as I think about how that day could have ended for one gentleman. As volunteers, we take time out of our busy schedules to stand watch at events such as this one — to educate the public on safety around the


On this particular Saturday, I was supposed to be at a meeting with the rest of my staff, in Tempe. Having discovered that there was no one else available to stand watch at the Expo, I cancelled and rescheduled that meeting. Since there was no longer a meeting, one of my staff officers, Robert Rodriquez, joined me at ISE. This was his first time there, so I decided to give him a tour of the show, taking a break from our booth on the other end of the sta-

While walking around, we heard a cry for help "medic." We reacted as we are trained to do and made our way to the sound of the cry for help. Approximately 30 feet away we found a gentleman on the floor, lifeless. We jumped to action and immediately started CPR.

Because of the large crowd that day, the paramedics on call were delayed 20 minutes in making it to our aid. We continued CPR up to the point that they were ready to take over. During the CPR chest compressions that we were administrating, the gentleman came back to life, breathing and kicking on

I received a call the next day from the Glendale Police Department, letting me know that we had indeed saved this man's life. If we had not been there, and we were not supposed to be, he would not have been alive by the time the paramedics arrived

Any day that ends with a life saved is a great day. Semper paratus.

## Adobe Mountain Wildlife Center **Receives Baby Bighorn Sheep**

#### Public advised to leave wildlife "wild."

The Arizona Game and Fish Department's Adobe Mountain Wildlife Center received a baby desert bighorn sheep lamb on Feb. 25 that was confiscated from a Salome-area resident. The one-month-old lamb was removed from the wild for unknown reasons and lived at two residences, one of which was a domestic goat farm, before Game and Fish was notified.

#### The End Result

While we don't know why this lamb was taken from the wild, the end result is the same. It can no longer be placed back into the wild population because of potential disease risks that can be passed to wild bighorn sheep," said Mike Demlong, Ari-zona Game and Fish's wildlife education program manager.

"Thankfully in this case, the lamb is in good condition and we have found a home for it at Bearizona in Williams, but it is usually difficult to place wildlife at zoos and sanctuaries because they typically don't have the room.'

#### Best, Kindest Option

It is illegal to keep wildlife as pets. It also is not a good idea to "rescue" wildlife that you believe has been orphaned or abandoned. The parent is usually nearby feeding and will return to her young after a period of time. The best and kindest option is to leave baby wildlife

Spring is the season for young wildlife: Baby rabbits and birds abound, and elk calves and deer fawns hide in the brush while the mother forages. As hard as it is, usually the best thing to do the next time you see baby wildlife that appears orphaned is to leave it alone.

Stand back and observe the situation, but most of the time the human desire to help or "rescue" baby, orphaned, or injured wildlife can have unintended consequences for the animal, including

#### Contact AZGFD

Removing a wild animal from its habitat and rearing it in captivity should only occur if absolutely necessary, like in cases where the animal is injured or attempts to encourage parental care have failed. Al-



though it may seem more humane to "rescue" an animal, wildlife reared in captivity or babies raised without the benefit of learning from their parents, have a greatly reduced chance of survival when and if

they are released back into the wild.

## AZGFD Comments On Recent Jaguar Critical-Habitat Announcement

On March 4, 2014, the Southwest Region of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) notified the public that the Service had designated 764,207 acres of land in southern Arizona as critical habitat for the rarely-present jaguar. This action com-pleted the third review by the Service that examines the need for jaguar critical habitat in Arizona.

The two prior reviews found that designation of critical habitat in Arizona-New Mexico was not warranted. The Arizona Game and Fish Department does not support the latest finding of the Service that designating critical habitat is essential to the conservation of the jaguar.

#### Difficult To Justify

Game and Fish Assistant Director for Wildlife Management Jim deVos states, "I find it difficult to justify designating criti-cal habitat for a species that is so rarely found in Arizona. In looking at the available data on the presence of jaguars, there has been no documentation of a female jaguar in Arizona for nearly a century

"There have been long periods when no jaguar was even found in the state. Such designations should be based on good science and effective conservation, which are both lacking with this designation. This designation does nothing to further the



conservation of the jaguar."

#### Not A 'Population'

Based on the current information from Mexico, the closest breeding population of jaguars is approximately 130 miles south of the international border between Arizona and Sonora, Mexico. Further, for many decades, the observations of jaguars in Arizona have been individual males, which clearly do not constitute a "population" given the lack of females and/or breeding pairs.

The American public has a reasonable expectation that when the Service lists a species or designates critical habitat for a species that the restrictions posed by these designations are, in fact, essential to that species' conservation.

"With the absence of any documented breeding pairs in the U.S. for many

decades and with an estimated population of no less than 30,000 jaguars and more than 99 percent of the jaguar's range oc-curring outside of the United States, the Service's recent declaration of critical habitat undermines the congressional intent for the Endangered Species Act (ESA)," says Larry Voyles, Arizona Game and Fish Department director.

#### **Comment Letters**

In the department's comment letters submitted to the Service in 2012 and 2013 (posted at www.azgfd.gov/jaguar), the department opposed this designation, based on several points, including the following:

- The ESA defines critical habitat as that which is essential to the conservation of the species.
- · Lone males that disperse to the edge of the species' range are not essential to species preservation, particularly in the absence of any documented jaguar breeding pairs in the region.
- · That designation of critical habitat is not warranted and indeed sets an unaccept-

able precedent of using poor science to designate critical habitat.

• To be declared critical, habitat should be occupied. However, in 35 of the 49 years between 1962-2011, no jaguars were detected in Arizona. In the other 14 years, no more than one or two male jaguars were detected per year, failing to demonstrate occupancy as required.

"The department has a long history of supporting endangered species, including designation of critical habitat, but designating critical habitat for the jaguar simply fails in both logic and biological foundasays Voyles.

"Further, recovery of jaguars is very important, so important that all conserva-tion efforts and use of precious limited resources need to be focused where most jaguars actually exist."

Arizona Game and Fish has long been involved in jaguar conservation and has been a member of the Interagency Jaguar Conservation Team since 1996. For more information on jaguars, www.azgfd.gov/jaguar.

The Arizona Wildlife Fund is a voluntary program that allows Arizona taxpayers to make a donation to specifically help imperiled and endangered wildlife, in-cluding majestic bald eagles, black-footed ferrets, California condors, Apache trout, Mexican wolves and desert tortoises,

among other nongame species.
"Since Game and Fish does not receive any general fund dollars, the Arizona Wildlife Fund provides important support for managing and conserving some of the state's most iconic native species," says Mike Rabe, nongame branch chief for the Arizona Game and Fish Department. "The fund goes only to nongame species that are not hunted or fished, and the cumulative effect of even a dollar can have a tremendous impact on conserving one of Arizona's greatest natural treasures

Arizona is one of 41 states that allow taxpayers to make a contribution to worthwhile causes. Since Arizona started the program more than 25 years ago, taxpayers have donated more than \$5 million to the conservation of nongame animals. Nongame are wildlife species that are neither hunted nor fished in a traditional

Last year, the average donation was more than \$21. The Arizona Wildlife Fund box can be found on line "40" of the state's long income tax form, or line "33" of the short tax form.

## Memorable Hiking Is Close To Home

By Margie Anderson

When conditions are right, you don't have to go far from Phoenix to see spectacular wildflower displays. We've had some decent rains this winter, so this might be one of those years.

One place you should definitely try is Cave Creek Regional Park. The park has over 11 miles of trails, and the hikes range from less than a quarter mile in length to almost six miles. We hiked the Overton Trail and part of the Go John in early April one year and the flowers were incredible — in places, the blossoms were waist high right up to the edges of the trail. Glorious!

The Overton Trail is just over two miles long and takes you around the base of a mountain until it meets up with the Go John Trail. You can go back the same way you came, but we took a right turn at this point and followed the Go John 1.3 miles back to the parking lot.

#### **Overton Trail**

The Overton Trail is fairly level and is rated moderate, but we were with a group that included several very young children and they had no trouble with it at all, even on the portion of the Go John that we took. would recommend that you take the Overton and head west if you are planning

to return on the Go John, because that way you'll be going downhill on the Go John.

The trails at Cave Creek Regional Park are very well marked, with trail markers at every junction. You can print out maps at http://www.maricopa.gov/parks/cave\_cree

To access the Overton Trail, you get off the Cave Creek Parkway at the trailhead sign. It's about a 500-foot walk to the main trail. If you take a right at the trail, you will pass a side trail that leads to the

stripers in 2014 will be able to feed on the surface and chase shad. Boils may happen in summer but in the spring look in the backs of main canyons in the colored water. Troll shallow, mid range and deep runners to find fish.

When a striper is hooked trolling, drop spoons or cast lures as the fish is played in case the following school comes under the boat. If an inactive school is graphed while trolling mark the spot with a floating marker and return with jigging spoons to see if the school will cooperate.

#### **Best Trolling Lures**

The best trolling lures the past few years were Lucky Craft Pointers, Glass Shad Raps, and Storm Deep Thundersticks. It is good to have an assortment of lures but the real key point when trolling is to locate the fish-holding zone.

Stripers may hold at a spot on a shoreline where a point extends into the lake, or over a submerged hump at 30 feet in 60 feet of water or in a hundred other places. The important point here is to mark the location of each hookup and immediately return to the exact spot. Many times stripers can be caught at exactly the same spot while all the water in the immediate vicinity of the "sweet spot" seems fishless.


#### **During The Season**

If you are lucky enough to find a super fishing spot or a subtle key to catching fish, please report it to me and I will broadcast it in the next fishing report. Then anglers can use your spot and pay up with their reports as they leave the lake.



amphitheater and Nature Center.

Stop by the nature center to check out the critter-viewing center and look at the items available in the shop, which has things like books and cards and even bottled water for sale.

#### Clay Mine, Slate, Quartz, Jasper Trails

There are several very easy hikes in the park: the Clay Mine Trail is less than a mile long and the Slate Trail is just over a mile and half. These trails are mostly

smooth and wide, but not paved. Also, both these trails are out and back, so that doubles the actual distance you will hike.

There are no trails as of yet that are handicapped accessible. The Quartz Trail and Jasper Trail are listed separately, but they are simply little bits of trail that connect others, so they are added to a hike, not hikes in themselves.

You can put together a variety of hikes by getting a map and hiking parts of various trails to make a loop as long as you like. Almost all the trails are shared use, so you may encounter horses and/or

mountain bikers. Hikers yield to horses, and bikers are supposed to yield to hikers and horses.

#### Flume Trail

The Flume Trail at 2.3 miles is listed as moderate, but you have to hike a bit on the Slate trail to get to it, so it is longer than listed: you need to go about ¾ of a mile on the Slate Trail.

Also, the Flume is an out and back, not a loop. The Flume trail gets its name from the remains of a mining flume that used to transport gold ore.

#### Go John Trail

The only trail rated moderate-difficult is the Go John Trail, which is almost six miles long and is a loop. You can even get to the Maricopa Trail from the Go John, and head to Spur Cross Ranch. To do this, you would take the Overton west then north, and turn left when you reach the Go John.

You will come to the Maricopa Trail at the northernmost reach of the Go John. Turn right here and you will stay on the Go John. Turn left and you're headed for Spur Cross. Again, print out the maps available on the Maricopa Parks Web site to put together a killer hike to suit your abilities.

#### **Guided Hikes**

There are guided hikes available at the park as well. The park offers Spring Fitness Hikes, Photography Hikes, and hikes to the Clay Mine to learn and explore. In fact, if you want to go inside the Clay Mine, you can only do it on one of these guided hikes.

The entry fee to the park is only \$6 per vehicle, and the guided hikes are included in this fee. Just wear sturdy shoes and a hat, bring water, and be at the designated spot at the right time.

#### **Picnic And Camp**

The park has several picnic areas, including group areas that can be reserved. There is a playground and beach volleyball area, restrooms, and campgrounds including RV spaces. There are 38 campsites and each can accommodate up to a 45-foot RV.

The camping includes water and electric, dump station, picnic tables and grills, and fire ring. There are also very nice restrooms and showers with hot water.

You can reserve a site at http://www.maricopacountyparks.org/. Camping fee for developed sites is \$25 per night. If all the sites are full, there is an overflow area that is basically a big parking lot with access to water.

#### 'Away From It All'

Cave Creek Regional Park is a wonderful place to visit in the spring. The trails will make you feel as if you're far away from it all, even though you're close to Phoenix and Cave Creek.

To get there from Phoenix, take I-17 north to Carefree Hwy (SR 74). Exit Carefree Hwy. and travel east to 32nd St. (7 miles). Turn north on 32nd St. to the Cave Creek Regional Park entrance.

Kids will love it, and no matter what your fitness level, you'll find lots to look at and plenty to do.




