AS THE TEMPERATURE DROPS It's Time To Winterize Your Boat

"Winterizing" normally refers to putting up the boat for the months too cold for boating, cleaning it, and stabilizing its systems to reduce potential problems when its time to head back out on the water the following

The following recommendations help make this task easier as well as simplifying the spring launching process.

Hypothermia

- If you are boating in cold water:
 - Dress in several layers of clothing under your PFD or wear a wetsuit or drysuit.
 - Learn to recognize the symptoms of hypothermia. Symptoms begin with shivering and blush lips and nails, and progress to a coma and, ultimately, death.
- ◆ To reduce the effects of hypothermia:
 - Put on a PFD if not wearing one. It helps you to float without excessive movement and insulates your body · Get as much of your body out of the water
 - as possible. · Don't take your clothes off unless
 - necessary clothes can help you float and provide insulation. · Don't thrash or move about. Excess
 - motion consumes energy and increases loss of body heat. · Draw your knees to your chest and your arms to your sides, protecting the major
 - areas of heat loss. · If others are in the water with you, huddle together with your arms around their shoulders.





Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless, tasteless gas that is very toxic even in small quantities. It is produced when a carbon-based fuel, such as a gasoline or diesel, is burned. Cooking ranges, heaters, and charcoal grills produce carbon monoxide also.

 ◆ Carbon monoxide disperses feely through the air and will travel readily throughout a boat.

 ◆ Carbon monoxide discharged as engine, generator, or appliance exhaust may re-enter your boat through any opening.

 ◆ By keeping a steady flow of fresh air moving through your boat, you will eliminate much, if not all, of the hazard. The danger comes when there are pockets of stagnant air loaded with carbon monoxide that are not flushed from your boat.

 ◆ When operating any type of watercraft, be careful running downwind because exhaust gases may blow back on board.

 ◆ The best prevention for carbon monoxide poisoning is knowing that carbon monoxide exists.

Inattentiveness or lack of concentration
Inability to think coherently

Treatment of Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

Evacuate, ventilate, investigate, and seek medical help.

Weather can change very rapidly and create unexpected situations for boat operators. Weather-related accidents in Arizona are on the rise, and even meteorologists have trouble predicting rapid weather changes. You should always monitor weather developments. One way is to tune to a VHF radio to the frequencies listed below. Then seek a protected area before the weather becomes a threat.

What To Do If Caught

in Severe Weather

- Prepare the boat to handle severe weather
 Slow down, but keep enough power to maintain headway and steering
 Close all hatches, windows, and doors to reduce the chance of swamping.
 Stow any unnecessary gear.
 Turn on your boat's navigation lights. If there is fog, sound your fog horn.
 Keep bilges free of water. Be prepared to remove water by bailing.
 If there is lightning, disconnect all electrical equipment. Stay as clear of metal objects as possible.
 Prepare your passengers for severe weather
 Have everyone put on USCG-apprived life jacket (PFD). If passengers are already wearing their PFDs, make sure they are secured properly.
 Have your passengers sit on the vessel floor close to the centerline for their safety and to make the boat more stable.

 Decide whether to go to shore or ride out the storm.

 If possible, head for the nearest shore that is safe to approach. If already caught in a storm, it mey be best to ride it out in open water rather than try to approach the shore in heavy wind and waves.

 Head the bow intot he waves at a 45-degree angle. PWCs should head directly into the waves.

 If he engine stops, drop a "sea anchor" on a line off the bow to keep the bow headed into the wind and reduce drifting while you ride out hte storm. In an emergency, a bucket will work as a sea anchor.

 If the sea anchor is not sufficient, anchor using your conventional anchor to prevent your boat from drifting into dangerous area.

Coast Guard Auxiliary Joins With Alliance For Safe Navigation

The Coast Guard Auxiliary has joined forces with the Alliance for Safe Navigation (Alliance) to inform boaters of the importance of maintaining current navigation information. Alliance members include the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), BoatUS, Jeppe-sen Marine, the U.S. Power Squadron, OceanGrafix, and the Sea Tow Foundation for Boating Safety and Education. Surveys have revealed that most

boaters are not concerned about the accuracy of their charts and related navigation information. More than three quarters do not pay attention to local notice to mariners issued by the Coast Guard. The Coast Guard Auxiliary will utilize its Alliance partnership to promote boating safety.

Why not use the down time produc-

tively and take a boating safety class conducted by your local Coast Guard Auxiliary flotilla?

Also, Arizona Game & Fish Department, the Phoenix Power Squadron, and the Lake Pleasant Sailing Club all offer classes that are referenced each month on page three of AZBW/WOT.

The Coast Guard Auxiliary offers numerous boating courses for the public, but you may want to go with the basic "About Boating Safely" course or the more in-depth "Boating Skills & Seamanship" course as a refresher prior to the start of your boating season.

"About Boating Safely" is an eighthour beginner boating class designed to give you the knowledge needed to obtain a boat license or safety certification in many states. Many boat insurance companies will offer discounts on boating insurance to boaters who successfully complete

"About Boating Safely".

"Boating Skills & Seamanship" is a more comprehensive, multiple session program designed for both the experienced and the novice boater. The course consists of eight core-required two-hour lessons

A Note Re: Vessel Liahtina

A boater is quite right about only needing a flashlight or lantern for a (non-mechanized) boat less than 7 meters (23 feet). However, if the boat has machinery (a motor - even a trolling motor) on board, according to A.R.S. Title Five, which is what "Officer Friendly" out at the lake in Arizona enforces, you'll need running lights if you're out between sunset and sunrise, or operating in restricted (rain, dust or the like) visibility:

5-333. Classification of watercraft; l<u>ights</u>

- Watercraft subject to the provisions of this chapter shall be divided into four classes as follows:
- 1. Class A. Less than sixteen feet in length.
 2. Class 1. Sixteen feet or over and less
- than twenty-six feet in length.

 3. Class 2. Twenty-six feet or over and
- less than forty feet in length.
 4. Class 3. Forty feet or over and not
- more than sixty-five feet in length. B. Every motorboat, in all weather from sunset to sunrise, shall carry and exhibit the following lights when underway and, during such time, no other lights which may be mistaken for those prescribed shall be exhibited:
- 1. Every motorboat of classes A and 1 shall carry the following lights:
- (a) A bright white light aft to show all around the horizon.
- (b) A combined light in the fore part of the watercraft and lower than the white



trout fishery at Silver Creek, there was a stocking of lots of rainbow and Apache trout in the 3-plus-pound category. Wish I could have beene there, but with a 12-yearold boy at home, I don't have the luxury of traveling far on a school day.

Lake Pleasant

The striped bass bite at Pleasant is going bonkers. Mike McFarland, a guide at Pleasant, just had a client catch a nice 22-pounder (see the picture). It's mostly a topwater bite. Striped bass and largemouth bass are chasing shad at the surface.

McFarland said the bite is pretty much lake-wide and you might find striped bass, white bass and black bass all chasing shad.

Lake Powell

The dream fishing right now is at Lake Powell, according to Wayne Gustaveson's "Wayne's Words." The weather is near perfect and you might have the fishing trip of a lifetime with lots of stripers, largemouth bass and smallmouth bass.



I have had some awesome autumn fishing trips to Powell over the years. It can be topwater heaven. We once caught more than 60 largemouth bass in an hour fishing a narrow side canyon off the San Juan Arm. The bass acted as if they had never seen a topwater lure before.

Lees Ferry

Also Lees Ferry is a dream this time of year. The weather is pleasant; it's the offseason so you can often find the best gravel bars all to yourself, and the autumn angle of the sun brings out the subtle hues of the sandstone, making it an Arizona Highways photo special.

High Country

For the high country, this is prime time for the elk rut. So there are lots of opportunities to fish and hear elk bugling. One of my favorites for this is Knoll Lake on the Mogollon Rim. Not only have I routinely heard elk bugles while fishing in autumn, but have heard the clash of antlers as well with two bulls fighting, and then watched as the local osprey dives into the

Bass Fishing Consistent All Over The Lake

Fishing out of Wahweap is hot and cold. Fishing is super hot for the first hour of light in the morning. Toss a small pro-file surface lure like a Sammy or Sugoi splash toward the shoreline for fast action from smallmouth bass and juvenile striped

On one morning recently, one of the hottest spots was the Stateline ramp cove. A shad school moved under the courtesy dock at first light and was quickly surrounded by bass and stripers. Lures landing on the outer perimeter of the shad school were quickly engulfed. Shore fishermen casting topwater would be quite successful on the swim beach side of Stateline ramp from first light until 7 a.m.

We left the ramp and went straight to Sand King Cove (Wahweap Bay) to catch a few more bass and stripers on the sur-Then we tried the cove on the left hand side of Castle Rock and caught more in the shade of the cliff wall.

All Good Things

But, all good things came to end as the sun peeked over the eastern horizon. We were very excited to see surfacing fish as the boat made it through the Castle Rock Cut. Unfortunately, we found that the widely scattered splashes were made by a school of big gizzard shad frolicking on the surface. The gizzard frolics can be identified by widely spaced splashes punctuated by a little tail flip as they hit the water. These were the only "fish boils" we saw. All of our other fish were caught blind casting toward the shore.

We then graphed unsuccessfully to find striper schools in locations they had occupied for the past few weeks. Stripers are apparently really scared of full moon Halloween stories in October. Fishing for stripers has slowed to a crawl in the south-

Stripers Still Going Strong

Luckily the uplake stripers are still going strong. Great reports are coming

URBAN FISHING REPORT Stockings Have Resumed As Weather Cools

All lakes were stocked again with channel catfish the week of Oct. 1-6. Fishing for catfish is good to excellent now that the fall stockings have resumed.

Mornings and evenings are the best times as catfish prefer to feed under dim or dark conditions. While the majority of stocked catfish are caught in the first five days of stocking, anglers are still catching cats one to two weeks later at a slower

Top baits for catfish have been stink baits, shrimp and worms fished on the bottom in the deeper lake sections. Use smaller sinkers and 8-pound test line to get more hookups.

Fishing for bluegill is good along the shorelines in 4-6 feet of water. Try mealworms under a small, thin bobber for great action. As lake temperatures fall below 78 degrees, expect better action for largemouth bass, especially in the early morning periods. Try finesse plastics rigged drop shot or Texas style for the bass and mix it up with small crankbaits, soft jerkbaits or spinnerbaits

Green Valley
At Green Valley Lakes (Payson), anglers are having very good luck for bluegill and crappie using worms and small jigs. Angler access is good with only a few patches of weeds to contend with.

Fall is a wonderful time to visit the Rim country, see the colors, and relax and fish along the grassy shorelines of this popular urban fishery just a mile west of Highway 87 on Main Street.

The fish-stocking program at Green Valley is different from all other Urban Fishing Program waters. Rainbow trout are the only species stocked by the department during an eight-month season that starts in mid-October and continues through early May.

No other fish species are stocked at Green Valley; however, good populations of bass, crappie, sunfish and even catfish can be found in this highly productive lake system. Best bets for trout are worms, Power Bait, and small jigs and spinners.

Lakeside Lake Gets Cats

The low-dissolved oxygen at Lakeside Lake in Tucson gradually increased to levels that allowed for a partial stocking of catfish the week of Oct. 1-6. The City of Tucson and lake consultants have been actively managing the water and aeration system to optimize oxygen recovery, but progress has been slow.

Game and Fish plans to stock the lake with 800 pounds of 14- to 18-inch catfish. A series of monsoon storms in early September brought high inflows into Lakeside Lake, causing oxygen levels to plummet and the first catfish stocking of the fall season to be cancelled

I will do my best to get the fishing report out in the timely manner that you are used to and with as much enthusiasm as Rory added to it.



from the San Juan and Good Hope areas. Spooning near Neskahi Canyon (San Juan) resulted in a 100-fish catch of 3-6 pound stripers for one party early this week.

stripers for one party early this week.

Bass fishing is very consistent all over the lake — even at Wahweap. Drop-shotting plastic shad-shaped worms and senkos, casting plastic grubs and swimbaits and retrieving surface lures are all effective techniques now. Best colors are chartreuse and watermelon.

Just find a quick drop off near the brushy shoreline or a rocky reef in open water. Then use your favorite bass lure to catch smallmouth bass and an occasional largemouth. Work the bait slowly with a lot of fall-time in tree-lined areas for best results.


With water temperature falling and shad moving on shore, bass have moved into shallower water. Look for bass at depths of 10-20 feet.

As the moon fades, striper fishing will pick back up in the southern lake. For now, fish for bass or head to Rock Creek and places upstream to get stripers.

At press time, lake elevation was 3,620 and water temperature was 73-76F.







Write On Target

Grant Awards Help Fund Local Efforts To Expand Hunting, Fishing Participation

The Arizona Game and Fish Department is awarding grant funding to 14 local sportsmen's groups to support 22 projects geared toward increasing hunter and angler recruitment and retention.

The Local Sportsmen's Group Grant Program was started in 2007 to provide financial assistance to local sportsmen's organizations in supporting wildlife conservation. The program awards grant funds to eligible projects through a competitive application process each year.

Focus On Recruitment, Retention

The focus of projects eligible to receive grant funds is determined annually by the Arizona Game and Fish Department and may change from year to year. The 2012 grant year focus was on projects that promote or facilitate hunter, angler or trapper recruitment and retention.

The groups, led by the Congressional Sportsmen's Foundation, Cabela's, Safari Club International, National Shooting Sports Foundation, American Sportfishing Association and National Marine Manufacturers Association, used recently re-leased data from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's (Service) 2011 National Survey on Fishing, Hunting and Wildlife Associated Recreation to compare hunting and fishing participation and expenditures to mainstream industries

Important Elements Of Outdoor Heritage

"To put it in perspective, the 37 million sportsmen and women over the age of 16 in America is the same as the population of the state of California, and the \$90 billion they spent in 2011 is the same as the global sales of Apple's iPadTM and iPhoneTM in the same year," commented Jeff Crane, president of the Congressional Sportsmen's Foundation.

"Hunting and fishing have been, and clearly continue to be, important elements of our country's outdoor heritage and they are critically important to our nation's particularly the small local



and fishing opportunities.'

The participation and economic data, released in August by the Service, shows a 9 percent increase in hunters and an 11 percent increase in anglers compared to the 2006 survey. The important thing to note is that these numbers are just accounting for sportsmen and women age 16 and older, so actual participation is likely higher when adding in youth.

Most notable, however, is that hunters and anglers contintheir strong spending habits. From equipment expenditures (\$8.2 billion for hunters, \$6.2 billion for anglers) to special equipment (\$25 billion to-wards boats, RV's, ATV's and other such vehicles) to trip-related expenses totaling over \$32 billion, sportsmen and women continue to direct their discretionary income toward their outdoor pursuits.

75th Anniversary

This is the 75th anniversary of our nation's system of conservation funding model that is envied throughout the world that directs excise taxes on fishing and hunting equipment toward state-based conservation. The Sport Fish and Wildlife and Restoration programs have resulted in robust fish and wildlife populations and quality habitat that is the legacy of our industry and sportsmen and women alike,

said Michael Nussman, president and CEO of the American Sportfishing Asso-

Ardent Conservationists

Beyond the impact to businesses and local economies, sportsmen and women have played an essential and unmatched role in protecting fish and wildlife and their habitats. Sportsmen and women are the nation's most ardent conservationists, putting money towards state fish and wildlife management.

When you combine license and stamp fees, excise taxes on hunting and fishing equipment, the tax from small engine fuel and membership contributions to conservation organizations, hunters and anglers directed \$3 billion towards on-the-ground conservation and restoration efforts in - that is over \$95 every second.

This does not include their own habitat acquisition and restoration work for lands owned or leased for the purpose of hunting and fishing, which would add another \$11 billion to the mix.

The final report, including state-bystate information, is expected to be released in late November.

Arizona Deer, Elk Hunters Can Assist In Monitoring For CWD

The Arizona Game and Fish Department is asking for assistance from deer and elk hunters in monitoring efforts for chronic wasting disease (CWD).

Hunters can provide assistance by al-

lowing Game and Fish personnel or a cooperating taxidermist or game-meat processor to collect a tissue sample from their harvested deer or elk.

CWD is a neurodegenerative wildlife disease that is fatal to cervids, which include deer, elk and moose. Clinical signs include loss of body weight or emaciation, excessive salivation, increased drinking and urination, stumbling, trembling, and behavioral changes such as listlessness, lowering of the head, and repetitive walking in set patterns.

No Evidence Re: **Affecting Humans**

No evidence has been found to indicate that CWD affects humans, according to both the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the World Health Organization.

CWD has been detected in 22 states and Canadian provinces as of August 2012. Arizona Game and Fish began conducting CWD surveillance in the state in 1998 and has since collected more than 16,000 samples. No samples have yet tested positive for the disease, but Arizona shares borders with three states — Utah, Colorado and New Mexico - in which CWD has been found.

"The success of the CWD surveillance program is reliant upon the participation of hunters, meat processors, and taxider-mists," said Wildlife Disease Biologist Carrington Knox. "To ensure that CWD has not entered Arizona from neighboring states, we are concentrating our efforts in the game management units that border Utah and New Mexico.

For Kaibab, Arizona **Strip Hunters**

For Kaibab and Arizona Strip hunters (Units 12A, 12B, 13A, and 13B), the Jacob Lake check station will be open for collecting samples on the following dates: Oct. 26-Nov. 5 for the general deer hunt; and Nov. 23-Dec. 3 for the late season hunt. The check station will be operational from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., except for the day following the end of each hunt (Nov. 5, and Dec. 3) when the check station will close at 12 noon.

Department biologists will be working in the field from Nov. 2-5 and Nov. 16-19 in Unit 28, seeking successful hunters to provide samples for the CWD monitoring effort in this area.

Hunters who wish to assist the monitoring effort by bringing in the head of their recently harvested deer or elk to a Game and Fish Department office for sampling are requested to do so between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Fri-

Please Include This Information

Place the head in a heavy plastic garbage bag for delivery and keep it cool and out of the sun. If the weather is warm, it is best to either bring in the head within a day of harvest or keep it on ice in a cooler before delivery.

When submitting heads for sampling, please provide accurate, up-to-date hunter information (name, street address, city, state, zip code and phone number) as well as hunt information (hunt number, permit number, game management unit harvested in, county, state, and hunting license), as this information is crucial should CWD be detected in a sample.

If this information is not provided, the

Arizona Hunters Deserve Recognition Re: Condors

Majority of hunters in Arizona's condor range voluntarily join lead-reduction efforts.

Hunters in Arizona continue to prove to the critics that voluntary efforts to conserve endangered wildlife do work, often better than mandated measures. In the last five years, 80 to 90 percent of hunters in Arizona's condor range have taken measures to reduce the amount of spent lead ammunition that is available to California

"Arizona's voluntary lead-reduction program has been well supported by hunters, and they deserve a thank you for continuing sportsmens' proud tradition of being the nation's first wildlife conservationists," says Kathy Sullivan, Arizona Game and Fish Department's condor program coordinator.



Great Strides In Arizona

We've made great strides in this state and now that condors have expanded their range into southern Utah, we know where we need to focus the next steps in lead reduction efforts.

Lead poisoning has been identified as the leading cause of death in endangered condors and the main obstacle to a selfsustaining population in Arizona and southern Utah. Studies suggest that lead shot and bullet fragments found in animal carcasses and gut piles are the most likely source of lead in condors.

Many hunters do not realize that the

carcass or gut pile they leave in the field usually contains lead bullet fragments. Although remains from game hunting provide an important food source for condors, several birds can be affected by feeding off one lead-laden carcass or gut pile. By using non-lead ammunition, hunters help provide condors with an important food source to aid in their recovery.

Utah Also Launching Effort

Utah's Division of Wildlife Resources recognizes the importance of their state in condor conservation and is launching an effort this year that is similar to Arizona Game and Fish's

Arizona's condor population was reintroduced to the state under a 10(j) Rule, a special provision of the Endangered Species Act that designates the population as experimental and not essential to the species' survival.

The 10(j) rule was used to obtain acceptance among communities in Arizona and Utah and assures that "current and future land...uses...shall not be restricted due to...condors" and that the federal government did "not intend to" modify or re-strict "current hunting regulations any-where...in the experimental population

Conservation Must Constantly Adapt

Sullivan says, "Wildlife conservation must constantly adapt and the condor program is no different. As biologists, seeing the condors expand into Utah is gratifying and an important step in their reintroduction, but now we see where our focus needs to be in the coming years."

Arizona Game and Fish's lead-reduc-

tion efforts are supported by the Arizona Deer Association, Arizona Elk Society, Arizona Antelope Foundation, Arizona Desert Bighorn Sheep Society, and the Arizona Chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation.

AZGFD Analyzing New Photo Of Possible **Endangered Cat**

TUCSON, Ariz. — The Arizona Game and Fish Department is currently analyzing a recent trail camera photo of either a

jaguar or an ocelot sighted southeast of Tucson.

The photo includes only the tail and a small portion of a hind quarter of the animal, making positive iden-tification more difficult. Game and Fish is now consulting with outside experts about the photo, taken Sept. 23 and submitted by a sportsman, to better

identify the species.

Reported By Hunters

Four of the last five confirmed jaguar sightings in Arizona have been reported by hunters, who all took responsible action to document the animal and report it to Game and Fish. Sportsmen also provided Game and Fish with two sets of trail camera photos of an ocelot in the Huachuca Mountains in 2012.

These hunters have provided biologists with critical information that may not otherwise be known, information that will help increase the understanding of these species' existence in the borderland area.

SOLAR COOKING

Oh, The Possibilities For RVers, Campers, Boaters! food is made.

Hunters and anglers also will find this method useful and valuable for their travels.

By Heather Stevens Sun Cooking

There is something almost revere about a campfire. It's a travelling tradition while one person sets up the tent or opens up the van, the other forages for fuel and gets a blaze going. It's romantic, it's enter-taining and it's often the place that good



But sometimes it's actually a part of traveling could happily do without! It's hot work, the wood is often damp or if it's not, there's a fire ban and I get tired of telling the **Kettle** kids, "Don't run around near the fire!" So we've started a new camping tradition, of setting up the solar

A solar oven is an ingenious device that uses the sun's rays to heat and cook food. It works a bit like a car on a hot day sunlight comes through the windows, the dark surfaces soak up the heat and it leaves the dashboard hot enough to cook an egg!

But, more than just eggs, a solar oven can get up to around 180oC, which is the perfect environment to cook just about anything. A solar oven can be a bit like carrying around a whole range of home kitchen appliances; it can work as

An oven: Perfect for cooking cakes, biscuits, breads, muffins, lasagne, roasting nuts, even a full leg of lamb and veg!

A 'slow cooker': Works well for soups,

stews, pizzas, casseroles, legumes, rice,

beans, curries, jams, preserves, etc.

A fry pan: Although a solar oven doesn't get that "sizzling" frying that a fire can, it does work for cooking things like fish, eggs +bacon + tomatoes, sausages, steak (turns out very tender!) chicken stir fry, anything that you can put in a pan. You don't need to turn them or prod it as you

A kettle: Depending on the model and weather conditions, a solar oven can get water to boil in as little as 25 minutes. Store the hot water in a thermos or insulated solar oven to have hot cups of tea into the evening. This is also great for water pasteurization — if you're using stream water, bring it to above 65°C in a solar oven as a way of pasteurizing it and killing off any nasties. It's a nice way to make some hot water for a shower or washing up too!

A dehydrator: Some designs can allow for airflow and then be used to dehydrate food. Great for times when you get gluts of tomatoes, mangoes, chillies, bananas, sweet potatoes etc. On the road, we often came across little road side stalls selling inexpensive seconds — we'd spend a day dehydrating them so that we'd have a store of preserved goods that would last months, if not years, on the road. They are often good to eat straight away, or you can use them to add to meals for some extra fruit or veg when you're out of fresh

A thermal cooker (like a "HayBox"): Some designs, such as the SunCook solar oven that has good thermal insulation will allow you to cook overnight or on rainy days — heat up the food on a conventional stove (gas, fire, electric) to boiling point, wrap it in a towel and pop it into the oven with lid closed. A good solar oven is insulated and can keep the heat in. This means the food will continue cooking and can't burn or spoil. This is great for slow cooking like rice, soups, stews, oats, dhal etc.

Other!: There are lots of other novel

things that people use solar ovens for such as "canning" acidic foods like tomatoes, extracting wax from honey, dying fabrics, killing pantry pests like larvae, raising bread, making yoghurt or pasteurizing potting soil.







Jaguars

Jaguars have been protected outside the United States under the Endangered Species Act since 1973. That protection was extended to jaguars within the U.S. in 1997, the year after their presence in the Arizona and New Mexico borderlands was confirmed.

Jaguars once ranged from southern South America through Central America and Mexico and into the southern United States. It is believed that southern Arizona is the most northern part of the range for a population of jaguars living in Sonora,

Ocelot

Ocelots are small to medium-sized spotted cats with a long tail. These cats have been listed as endangered since 1982 under the federal Endangered Species Act.

The present range for ocelots is in the

eastern and western lowlands of Mexico, from southern Mexico through Central America and in the lowland areas of Colombia, Ecuador, Peru and Brazil. On the fringes of their range, they occupy a very limited region in both the United States (a remnant population exists in southern Texas) and Argentina.

Other Cats

Other animals such as bobcats, young mountain lions and servals, an African cat popular in the pet trade, are sometimes misidentified as ocelots, which is why verification is so very important.

Jaguars and ocelots are protected by the Endangered Species Act and should be left alone. If anyone encounters a cat believed to be a jaguar or ocelot, the Game and Fish Department requests that photos, along with observation information, be reported immediately to the department or through the Operation Game Thief hotline at (800) 352-0700.

is avoided.

With the removal of harmful engine deposits and an increase in combustion efficiency, exhaust emissions are also greatly reduced. This results in cleaner air and cleaner boat transoms as black exhaust smoke is noticeably reduced.

Carbon deposit formation is a byproduct of unburned fuel in the combustion process; Star Tron's enzymes will break down and disperse these deposits restoring engine performance.

While Star Tron can be used yearround to enhance engine performance and keep the fuel delivery system clean, its enzymes also provide powerful fuel-stabilizing action. As a bonus, you'll eliminate the hazardous disposal problem when it's time to flush the systems.

Note: Choose an antifreeze based on its PVC burst point, and avoid any containing alcohol.

The Winterizing Kit includes a 5-gallon tank, a gate valve/cap and a length of clear hose. You just need to supply an appropriate flushing attachment for your type of engine and a garden hose.

It Doesn't Get Any Easier Than This

Using the hose and engine flusher, run the engine until it reaches normal operating temperature to allow the thermostat to

open. Next, turn off the engine, disconnect the garden hose and attach the hose from the 5-gallon tank of antifreeze that you've placed up high to allow gravity to flow it into the engine water intake.

Open the valve on the 5-gallon container, start the engine and let it run at idle speed until you see the colored antifreeze flow out of the engine's exhaust/water outlet. Immediately shut off the engine, close the gate valve on tank and remove the hose. Trailered boats can be flushed right on the trailer.

It doesn't get any easier than this.
