Banquet To Honor Contributors To Wildlife, Outdoor Heritage

The annual Arizona Game and Fish Commission Awards Banquet will be held on Saturday, Jan. 14, 2017, at the Arizona Grand Resort, 8000 S. Arizona Grand Parkway, Phoenix, Arizona 85044. The event will honor the recipients of the 2016 Commission Awards that were selected at the Commission's August 26 meeting.

The purpose of these awards is to recognize Arizonans who have contributed significantly to the conservation of the state's wildlife, its outdoor heritage, and the mission of the Arizona Game and Fish Department.

The banquet will begin with a social hour and live music at 5 p.m. followed by dinner at 6 p.m. The awards will be presented concurrently with dinner to allow for more live music and dancing afterward. We are looking forward to a great celebration of all our award recipients and are expecting this to be

our best banquet ever.
The Arizona Game and Fish Commission held its first annual awards banquet on Jan. 12, 1991. Since then, a total of 361 recipients have been recognized with Commission awards. The awards banquet gives the Com-

mission an opportunity to recognize individuals, groups and organiza-tions for their contributions to Arizona's wildlife resources.

All of the costs associated with the awards banquet must be paid for by ticket sales and sponsorship donations, including the complimen-

tary tickets for award recipients and their spouse or guest. TIS THE SEASON

May The Hope Of This Season Be Ever Green

Many of us decorate the traditional Christmas tree as we celebrate the holi-

days.

The modern Christmas tree was developed in early modern Germany (where it is today called Weihnachtsbaum or Christbaum) with predecessors that can be traced to the 16th and possibly 15th century, in which devout Christians brought decorated trees into their homes. It acquired popularity beyond Germany during the second half of the 19th century, at first among the upper classes.

The tree was traditionally decorated with edibles such as apples, nuts, or other foods. In the 18th century, it began to be illuminated by candles which were ultimately replaced by Christmas lights after the advent of electrification. The Christmas tree has also been known as the "Yule-tree", especially in discussions of its folkloric origins.

The evergreen tree has also come, for many, to mean lasting good wishes as one year ends and a new year begins. For our readers of all faiths then, we extend this wish: May the joy and hope you feel this season be as lasting as the evergreen tree.

Tonto Christmas Tree Permits Available

The Tonto National Forest began selling Christmas tree permits on November 16 Permits will be available at Cave Creek, Mesa, Payson, and Pleasant Valley ranger districts and at the Supervisors Office at the hours and locations listed below.

Permits will be sold on a first-come, first-served basis until they are gone. Permits can be purchased in person with cash, check, or credit card. Customers will be provided a map that shows the designated cutting areas along with additional Christmas tree cutting instructions. The permit will allow the holder to cut a tree within a designated area between the dates of November 18 through December 24.

Additionally, all fourth graders are eli-gible for a free Christmas tree permit, while supplies last, through the Every Kid in a Park initiative. Every Kid in a Park is a nationwide call to action to build the next generation of conservationists. All fourth graders are eligible to receive a fourth grade pass that allows free access to federal lands and waters across the country for a full year.

In support of this initiative, the Forest Service is making available a free Christmas tree permit to every interested fourth grader with a fourth grade pass or paper voucher. More information about the initiative and how to obtain a pass is available by visiting www.everykidinapark.gov. To be eligible for a free Christmas tree permit from your local national forest office, all fourth graders must be accompanied by a parent or guardian and present their fourth

Register your watercraft

Make sure the vessel's registration is current before heading out on the water. It's one of the most important boating requirements needed to operate a watercraft on Arizona waterways.

The registration fee is determined by water-craft length and ranges from \$20 to \$66 for Arizona residents and \$100 to \$495 for non-residents. Skip the line and renew your watercraft registration online at www.azgfd.gov/boating.

Riding a personal watercraft? Pledge to be a S.A.F.E R.I.D.E.R.

Nationally one in five accidents on the water involve a personal watercraft (PWC) and for that reason, the Arizona Game and Fish Department encourages everyone using such craft to use caution and constantly be alert to their surroundings while on the water. PWC operators should consider the acronym "S.A.F.E. R.I.D.E.R." and the following tips from the Personal Watercraft Industry Association:

- · Scan the water for hazards and other boats
- Avoid aggressive maneuvers
- Follow local boating laws, including rules to prevent the transfer of invasive species
- Examine your equipment
- · React to conditions
- Insist on a safe distance from other boats, swimmers and fixed objects
- Drive sober
- Evaluate weather and waterways
- Respect the environment by avoiding fuel spills and operating close to marine life



Those heading out on standup paddle boards, kayaks and canoes are also reminded that each are legally considered watercraft. Users are required to have a wearable PFD on board while on the water and must follow the same navigation laws pertaining to all

Know the Rules: Learn to identify "Navi-Aids"



Arizona law enforcement agencies write many citations for "failure to obey navigation laws." You can help ensure the safety of all on the

water by learning to identify these common navigational aids.



Information

Squares indicate where to find food, supplies, repairs, etc. and give directions and other information.

Controlled

Circles indicate a controlled area such as speed limit, no fishing or anchoraing, ski only or no skiing, or "slow, no wake."



Exclusion

Crossed diamonds indicate areas off-limits to all vessels such as swimming areas, dams, and spillways.



Danger

Diamonds warn of dangers such as rocks, shoals, con-struction, dams, or stumps. Always proceed with caution.

Other Non-Lateral Markers

Safe Water Markers are white with red vertical stripes and mark mid-channels or fairways. They may be passed on either



Inland Water Obstruction Markers are white with black vertical stripes and indicate an obstruction to navigation. You should not pass between these buoys and nearest shore.

Mooring Buoy

Mooring Buoys are round and white with a blue horizontal band and are found in marinas and other areas where vessels are allowed to anchor. Note, the following actions are il-

Willfully damaging, removing, interfering with, or tying up to a navagation buoy not intended for mooring

◆ Mooring, anchoring, or fastening to shore for more than 14 consecutive days any vessel on public waters.

Need to borrow a life jacket?

Visitors to lakes Pleasant, Havasu, Saguaro or Mohave needing a life jacket can borrow one at Life Jacket Loaner Stations near each lake's boat ramps.

Stations contain jackets for infants to adults. Please return the jackets so they can be used by others.



Free BoatUS Winterizing **Guide Available**

Water that is mistakenly left in a boat's engine block to freeze over the winter is sure to become an expensive repair bill come springtime. As the ice expands, it can crack the block and ruin the motor, damage fiberglass, split hoses, or destroy a boat's refrigeration system. To prevent a mishap while putting the boat away this fall, Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS), a boating advocacy, services and safety group offers the free 15-page "Boater's Guide to Winterizing.

Boat Thieves Want To Steal Yours

Boat US Offers tips to stop yours from being taken this winter.

Is your boat less than 26 feet? Does it have outboard motor power and rest on a trailer? If you said yes, beware – you're a big target for theft. A newly released study that looked at five years of BoatUS Marine Insurance claims files shows that 75 percent of all boats stolen matched this description. With the long winter lay-up period nearing, BoatUS has five tips to make your boat harder to steal.

1. Just one lock? Try another, and another. You simply can't have enough. The whole goal is to make someone else's boat more attractive than yours, so the more locks a thief sees - on the trailer tongue, outboard engine, or used with chain around the trailer wheels - the better the chance he'll move on.

2. Don't leave the key on a stored boat. Never assume your key's hiding place is so good that thieves won't find it. Remember, that's what these people do for a living.

3. Make the trailer impossible to move. A removable tongue hitch, or, better yet, removing the trailer tires if the boat's going into long-term storage turns your rig into 1-ton dead weight. The little things can help, too, such as not parking your boat in the driveway with the hitch facing the street. Consider using removable trailer lights — with most thieves working the nightshift, they want to avoid attracting the attention an unlit trailer would cause.

4. Don't stick out. You may want to think twice about hanging a "for sale" sign on the side of your boat. Use a full winter cover to hide attention-getting, splashy graphics. Store all valuables, removable electronics and paperwork at home during the off-season.

Here Are Cold Facts On The '120-Degree Rule'

Know when to wear thermal protection while paddling this season.

The boat may be put away for the season, but the occasional warm fall day still brings plenty of paddlers out on the water. Knowing when to wear the thermal protection offered by a dry- or wetsuit is key. However, a long-assumed guideline meant to help paddlers make the right decision, sometimes known as the "120-degree rule," may instead put paddlers in danger

The 120-degree rule is a formula that adds together the air and water temperatures to determine when thermal protection is required. It assumes that if the total is above 120 F, that no dry- or wetsuit is needed.

"Using this simple formula," says BoatUS Foundation Assistant Director of Boating Safety Ted Sensenbrenner, "a paddler could mistakenly believe that if air temperature is the low 70s and water temperature is hovering around the low 50s, that thermal protection is not necessary. That could not be farther from the truth."

Sensenbrenner says that warm fall or spring days give paddlers a false sense of security. "Water temperatures have plunged, but the warm sun on your face hides the reality that accidentally going overboard at this time of year could quickly lead to trouble."

According to research, sudden coldwater immersion can kill in several ways: involuntary gasp reflex and hyperventilation, cold incapacitation, and immersion hypothermia. Not wearing a life jacket compounds the drowning risk.

A word to the wise? "Always wear a life jacket when in an open boat or on deck, and consider the water temperature when dressing for your next boating adventure," says Sensenbrenner. For more on cold-water boating including what to wear, go to BoatUS.org/cold-water-boating.

Boat Pumpout Money Available For Marinas, Boat Clubs, Nonprofits

Grant application period ends soon.

Marinas, boat clubs or fuel docks with a working pumpout provide a vital service to recreational boaters. Installing a pump, however, and the annual costs to maintain one, can be high. That's where a program funded by the taxes and fees paid by boaters can help.

This fall, the US Fish & Wildlife Ser-

vice's Clean Vessel Act program aims to give out about \$12 million for the construction, renovation, operation and maintenance of public boat pumpouts. However, the deadline to apply for the 2017 grant cycle will soon draw to a close. BoatUS is urging anyone interested to apply now by contacting their state's grant coordinator.

The nationally competitive, federal grant program, which is administered by individual states, pays up to 75 percent of the project costs and requires 25 percent matching funds. Some select states also contribute funds, which could essentially cover up to 100 percent of the costs. Any public or private boating facility or non-profit organization is eligible to apply. In addition to stationary locations on docks or shore, funds may pay for pumpout vessels, floating restrooms used by boaters, educational efforts on environmental pollution or for other boat sewage-related measures.

measures.

"With the growth of no-discharge zones nationwide, we need to ensure boaters – from the largest to the smallest boats – have meaningful access to local pumpouts," said BoatUS Foundation Vice President Susan Shingledecker.

Since the inception of the Clean Vessel Act, the grant program has funded more than 6,000 pumpouts and dump stations and provided funds to help operate and maintain more than 3,700 systems.

Recreational Boat Upper Deck Capacity Standards Revised

The membership organization that sets safety standards for recreational boat design and manufacturing, the American Boat & Yacht Council (ABYC), has re-vised its "Boat Capacity" (H-5) standard for upper decks on recreational boats. Upper decks are often referred to as the "fly bridge" or "upper helm." The new stan-dard, which is partly in response to fatal capsizing accidents involving overloaded fly bridges, will now include upper-deck weight capacity regardless of boat length.

Upper decks are typically found on boats greater than 25 feet and often found on fly bridge sportfish vessels, trawlers, houseboats and even some pontoon boats.

"New boats with upper decks will soon have an additional capacity placard for those areas to help boaters make smart choices about loading and stability, BoatUS Seaworthy magazine Editor Charles Fort. "This will help ensure boaters don't make the mistake of overloading

the upper deck."

The majority of boats built today adhere to ABYC's voluntary standards through the National Marine Manufacturers Association certification program. Additionally, ABYC offers standards for the maintenance and repair of recreational boats. "A boat that's designed, built, maintained or repaired to ABYC standards helps ensure a safe day on the water," added Fort.

Owners of older boats with upper decks may find the capacity in their owner's manual or by contacting the manufac-

An issue for small and large boats, capsizings and sinkings are at the heart of a new BoatUS Marine Insurance Program study that looked at five years of the association's member insurance claims files. The study reveals how these accidents happen and what boaters can do to avoid them, and it can be found in the August 2016 issue of BoatUS Seaworthy at http://goo.gl/m3hqO3. Data shows that while most capsizes occurred in smaller boats 18% occurred in boats over 25 feet.

Wayne Gustaveson Takes A Break, Thanks Readers

'Quality of life is measured by amount of time spent fishing."

Lake Powell fish at the end of fall were in prime time. Water temperature is in the mid 60s which means that all fish can basically go anywhere they want to. During summer there is a separation of large and small stripers because big fish need cooler temperatures. Those barriers are now removed.

Consider fishing patterns now to be just like fishing in late April and early May. The big difference is that spawning is not a factor. It is all about food and structure. The favorite meal now and always will be threadfin shad. Find threadfin and fishing success is assured. The hook is that threadfin numbers are not as high as seen in 2014 and 2015. All sport fish are searching for shad.

One Sure Fishing Technique

One sure fishing technique is to throw topwater lures in shallow water each morning and evening. You will consistently catch stripers and bass by pounding the shoreline in low light periods. The surface action may not last long after the sun hits the water but the information gathered during prime time will give you insight into where fish are holding.

All fish are really on the move right now as they search for shad. If bass and stripers hit surface lures in the back of brushy coves at first light, the next step using diving shad-imitating crankbaits like a bomber deep flat A, rattletrap or a

swim bait like a Yamamoto D-Shad.

If bass and stripers hit surface lures on primary points next to deepwater, then target the bench areas where water drops off quickly from 10 feet, down to 20, 40 or 60 feet.

Shad are on the move trying to avoid predators. Earlier this month there have been many examples of a hot spot blowing up at Padre Canyon, Kane Wash, Bullfrog Bay, or Good Hope only to quiet down in a few days as shad move out trying to find safe haven. Shad leave and stripers trail in hot pursuit. Bass tend to stay closer to home but will move from the back of the cove to the edge of deep

Spotty Results

Fishing results have been spotty recently because of fish movement. They also seem to feed for a short time where activity is intense only to quiet down after a short period. If a hot spot is located one day, keep track of the time and place and try to repeat that performance at the same time and place the next day.

The deep layer of fish between 60-80 feet is still there. These fish are down below the oxygen depletion layer that will soon be gone. For now it is possible to troll a downrigger in very deep water (60-80 feet) or drop spoons down when striper schools are seen on the graph. The huge line of fish seen at 60 feet and be-

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Electrofishing Reveals Tiger Trout Behavior, Fishing Secret

Caught a tiger trout, yet? Try fishing the shorelines at Woods Canyon Lake.

Some of our biologists were on the water at Woods Canyon, located on the Mogollon Rim, electrofishing from 7 p.m. to 4 a.m. for two days and caught more than 100 tiger trout.

"This number of tiger trout was interesting to us because we usually pick up few trout by boat electrofishing," AZGFD Reservoir Biologist Sally Petre said. "It seems as though the tiger trout behave a bit differently than rainbow trout and hang out in the shallows — where we shock — instead of deeper water." — instead of deeper water.

Anglers: with about another month remaining before lakes begin to freeze in higher elevations, it's time to get out and wrestle with a tiger.



For the first time in Arizona, we've been stocking them into Carnero, Becker, Willow Springs and Woods Canyon lakes. See where these lakes are located. Also, many tigers seem to be growing larger and developing bolder lines and darker

The best fishing for tiger trout, which can be distinguished from rainbow trout by their tiger-like or blotchy pattern on

their body (compared to the rainbow trout's small black spots), has typically been at Woods Canyon Lake

Tiger Trout Fishing Tactics

All trout species can be found at all depths with falling water temperatures. Tiger trout recently have been coming up to the shorelines and corralling baitfish so fishing deep is not a must.

Some fly anglers have had success fishing from a float tube, and casting flies such as woolly buggers from deeper water toward the shorelines and stripping quickly back. Also try meal worms, nighterawlers, Panther Martins, Kast-masters, spoons, and Roostertails. Another successful fly has been almost any

See the regulations before heading out. At Willow Springs and Woods Canyon, tiger trout count toward your six trout bag limit.

More Fall Netting

Survey Results
Recent netting surveys at Carnero and Becker lakes resulted in tiger trout approximately 13 inches in length. But too few tiger trout were caught at either lake to determine much about their growth.

At Carnero, fishing is difficult for tiger trout because of the low water and thick weeds, but can be good if you can get to an open spot of water. There is a two-fish bag limit at Carnero and it's restricted to artificial flies and lures only.

Becker Lake, which has fewer weeds than Carnero, is open to catch-and-release only for trout (no trout may be kept) with only artificial lures and flies with single

Striped Bass Recipes: Simple Means To A Tasty End

We are in one of the best times of year for striper fishing. With anglers filling their coolers with these awesome tasting fish, we thought it would be a great idea to share some cooking recipes with you. A common question from anglers is what are some ways to cook these fish?

Striper Taco Tuesday

(If you like fish tacos, try this recipe.)

• Take fillets and cut them into 5-inch long and 1.5-inch



- Use an egg wash (beat eggs in a bowl) to coat fish.
- · After coating the fish with the egg wash, bread them with a corn meal and Panko bread crumbs mixture. Be sure to also season the dry mixture with some Old Bay seasoning, salt, and pepper.
- Heat vegetable oil to 375- 400 degrees and make sure there is enough oil for the fillets to float. Fish should sizzle the fish hit the oil. If not, your oil is not hot enough yet, pull the fish out when they are a golden color. Normally takes
- · Make a slaw out of sliced cabbage and put it into a corn/flour tortilla.

Pan-Fried Striper

- Olive oil, rock salt, and pepper to taste.
- · Squeeze lemon over it while it cooks. Use as much or
- · The best method is pan frying without skin. Pan fry on one side for 2-3 minutes and then the other side for 2-3 minutes (depending on thickness of filet). Make sure that pan is hot with the olive oil first to get a nice sear.
 - When the fish starts to flake apart it's done.

Baked Striper

- Cover striper meat with olive oil or melted butter.
- · Add a drop of lemon juice, and sprinkle with a bit of Montreal steak seasoning on a cooking sheet and bake for 5 minutes at 350 degrees
- · Take out of the oven and add your favorite Parmesan
- Put back in the oven and cook for about another 2-3

CONCEALED CARRY

It's Vital To Know The Laws

In the State of Arizona, it is legal to carry a concealed weapon whether you have a permit or not. It is also legal for visitors to do that. Open carry is also legal, and Arizona recognizes CCW's from all other states. That doesn't mean you can carry concealed everywhere without a permit, though.

Schools, government buildings, places where alcohol is consumed — these are just a few of the places where you can't carry. Does the store you're headed into have a "no guns" sign? Then you can't carry there. Find another store, or lock your gun in the car before you go in.

Why Have A CWW?

Since Arizona allows constitutional carry, why bother even having a CCW? For one thing, it means that in 37 other states, your Arizona concealed carry permit allows you to carry concealed there. Eight of those 37 states require a written agreement, however. With a concealed carry permit, you can skip the background check when you buy a firearm, and you are allowed to carry in a National Park, which you can't do without a permit. You can also carry your weapon in restaurants and other places that serve alcohol, as long as you yourself are not drinking alcohol.

In addition, you are not allowed to be carrying a weapon within 1000 feet of a school unless you have a CCW. That doesn't mean that you can carry on school property, but it does mean you are legal if you are walking down the sidewalk next to a school, or if you get pulled over in front of a school. However, laws have a tendency to change, and if you do decide to get a CCW, you still need to know the laws about concealed carry.



For our CCW class at *fast-az.com*, we were required to pass a basic-marksmanship class before completing the course.

The Most Important Reason

The biggest reason to have a CCW, in my opinion, is to learn the laws about using deadly force and to learn to carry a weapon safely and responsibly. There have been many cases, even in Arizona, of people who believed they were justified in using their weapon in self defense, but a jury didn't agree. You need to take a CCW class to learn what to do and, even more importantly, what to say or not say, if you are ever in a situation that requires

you to defend yourself or your loved ones.

Why do some states recognize your Arizona CCW and some don't? States, so far, have the power to legislate who is allowed to carry a gun in that state. If you look up "national CCW reciprocity" you will find a lot of different Web sites with a lot of different opinions. Many people believe that a national law allowing CCW holders to carry in any state is long overdue. Other people are terrified at the very idea of such a bill. Many people fear guns and honestly believe that they are safer without a gun — and they don't want you to have one either.

Many Bills Introduced

There have been many national reciprocity bills introduced in Congress, but so far none of them has come to anything. States' rights has a lot to do with this, but the States' Rights argument didn't stop the Supreme Court from mandating that all states recognize same-sex marriages.

In that case, the Court decided that individual state laws were denying some people a right that other people have. It could take a similar Supreme Court ruling for national reciprocity to become a reality. Meanwhile, it's up to you to know the law where you're going. Before you travel, look up the law in each state that you will pass through. The Arizona Department of Public Safety has a lot of information about reciprocity, and they urge you to contact each state before traveling. Know Tribal Law Re: Concealed Carry

Be especially aware of any Reservations that you will be traveling through. Information about the legality of carrying concealed on Reservation lands is very hard to come by, and incredibly vague. It's even hard to know if you're okay to carry

even if you are simply passing through on a state or national highway.

You may be best off if you completely unload your weapon and lock it in a safe box, separate from the ammo. I found one Web site that has compiled data on Tribal Law and Concealed carry, but that site also urges you to do further research. The site is http://www.handgunlaw.us/documents/tribal_law_ccw.pdf.

I am a total believer in CCW permits and training. If you want to carry concealed, please do yourself a favor and take a CCW course. The courses don't cost that much, and it's worth your while to spend a day learning about the reality of carrying concealed. I took my permit

class with the people at fast-az.com. They were great, and the course included firearms training as well as classroom teaching. They also have a "shoot/don't shoot" simulation at the end that is a real eye-opener. You have a laser pistol and watch as situations unfold, forcing you to make the decision

Invaluable Training, Knowledge

You are allowed to carry concealed in Arizona without a permit, but a CCW class is something you really should invest in. Get some buddies and take the class together. You'll have a great time, and the training and knowledge you receive is invaluable.



Fish Health Surveys Inform Conservation

I'm standing in a small side room at Willow Beach National Fish Hatchery, just off a larger chamber where a dozen concrete raceways lie. Double-doored olive metal cabinets stand against white walls under effusive florescent light. Well-used grease boards smudged with eraser marks under blue-ink to-do lists fit the narrow space on one end opposite an industrial-sized sink.

On a long wall, a hygienic 12-footlong stainless-steel counter is where the work gets done today. Two biologists stand over the counter immersed in their labors that involve isopropanol, forceps, test tubes and scalpels. They are here to assay the health of fish held at this federal facility.

Every Effort Is Made

Every effort is made to ensure that fish brought into national fish hatcheries—and the fish going out—are robust and disease-free. Toward that goal, Marlene Rodarte and Ashlie Peterson, fisheries biologists from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Southwestern Native Aquatic Resources and Recovery Center - Fish Heath Lab recently collected razorback sucker and rainbow trout tissues for the annual exam at Willow Beach.

The two scientists own a combined 42 years of experience in fish health, and laboratory practices. They are two among a staff of six fish health biologists at Southwestern ARRC, led by a doctor of veterinary medicine, Martha Keller.

Based In New Mexico

The Southwestern ARRC is based in Dexter, NM, in the southeast part of the state near the more recognizable cities of Roswell and Carlsbad. That's where scores of processed fish tissue samples taken for this annual check-up will be further examined. The Southwestern ARRC houses the fish health lab, a molecular genetics laboratory and is the largest native species fish culture program in the Southwest. The Southwestern ARRC conserves 15 threatened or endangered species and conducts research on four-to-six additional species of concern.

What Rodarte and Peterson endeavor to do here is akin to your annual check-up. It's preventative medicine. Following a protocol expected of all 71 national fish hatcheries, the rainbow trout and razorback sucker are tested every year for a

Rainbow Trout Welcomed Back

Rainbow trout were recently brought back to Willow Beach National Fish Hatchery following a three-year hiatus caused from a serious structural failure that interrupted its water supply. A new water intake was dedicated in October 2016, welcoming back the popular sports fish to the 57-year-old facility that sits 12 miles downstream of Hoover Dam on the Arizona side of the Colorado River.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department supplied 51,000 fingerling rainbow trout to jump start the program. Later this year, hatchery biologists will once again start raising rainbow trout from fertilized eggs sent from Ennis National Fish Hatchery in Montana.

Razorback Is Endangered

The razorback, so named for a prominent ridge on its nape is endangered with extinction. It's native to the Colorado River and its larger tributaries and the hatchery is part of a large endeavor to improve the fish's conservation status. The sucker with a belly the color of a wet lemon and sides ruddy like the flesh of a blood orange is curiously shaped for a life in fast-flowing water; the 'razorback' is a keel that keeps the fish oriented upright and on the river bottom in otherwise sweeping flows.

Rigorous Methods

As a matter of good science protocol, fish health practitioners follow rigorous and repeatable methods to collect fish tissues. There's much work at a laboratory bench examining kidneys and spleens and in the case of trout, skulls reduced to a granular slurry to be examined with much time over a high-powered microscope. Obviously the fish must be sacrificed to examine internal tissues and those sacrifices are kept to a minimum. Sacrificed fish are bathed in a compound called MS-222, a piscine Prozac of sorts, an FDA-approved anesthesia that humanely dispatches the animal.

The time investment to assay wild or hatchery fish populations is quite large. Tissues are collected and processed and shipped to the laboratory in New Mexico. From start to finish, from gathering fish to looking at fish tissues through scopes to the having final data for Dr. Keller to report to fisheries managers, an annual hatchery exam may take on the order of 120 hours to complete. One always hopes

for a clean bill of health, but in the event that disease pathogens are found, Dr. Keller offers potential remedies or treatments

Rodarte And Peterson

Rodarte and Peterson have seen the Southwest like no others. Shortly after visiting Willow Beach on the Arizona-Nevada border, their work took them to the legendary Lake Fork east of Dallas, Texas, a fishery known for growing massive largemouth bass. The fish health program services nine national fish hatcheries as well as the state game and fish departments in Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas. They have examined alligator gar and largemouth bass, Gila trout and Apache trout, Texas blind salamanders and some of the rarest fishes in the world, all with an eye on finding diseases.

They've seen peculiar things in the bellies of fish, like song birds and field mice. Despite handling fish day after day, they both still enjoy angling and hunting.

they both still enjoy angling and hunting. Work Essential To Fisheries Conservation

And they do ferret out disease-causing pathogens. The work is essential to fisheries conservation, be it common game fishes such as rainbow trout or the imperiled sucker with the curious ridge on its back. No matter the species, understanding the health of captive or wild fishes is necessary to make informed management decisions.

New License A Boost To Military Families

Spouses of active duty members qualify for resident status.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department reminds all active duty members of the U.S. Armed Forces stationed in Arizona that they, and their spouses, may purchase resident hunting and fishing licenses.

The current law stipulates that an active duty member permanently or temporarily stationed in Arizona may purchase a resident license permitting the taking of wildlife. That privilege recently has been extended to their spouses, as well.

Gov. Doug Ducey signed House Bill 2324, sponsored by state Rep. Frank Pratt (LD-8, Casa Grande), in May. The Arizona Game and Fish Commission toted unanimously in January to support this expression of gratitude for those who serve. The law became effective Aug. 6.

"Through the years, the department and commission have been proud to pro-

vide opportunities for our active military members and veterans," said Pat Madden, commission chairman. "We're grateful for their sacrifice and service, and we're honored to be able to extend this privilege to their spouses."

A valid license is required for the taking of wildlife, including fish, in Arizona. A resident can purchase a combination license (hunting and fishing), valid for 365 days from the date of purchase, for only \$57.

Licenses can be purchased at all department offices and more than 300 license dealers statewide, as well as online by visiting https://license.azgfd.gov/home.xhtml. If a license is purchased online, it must be printed from a home computer. The department will not mail any license purchased online.

The license also will allow the spouse of an active duty member to apply for big game hunt permit-tags as a resident.

The Fishing **Should Be Great**

Extra trout stockings in White Mountains lakes to provide great fall/ early winter fishing.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department (AZGFD) has recently stocked thousands of catchable size rainbow trout into many of the White Mountain lakes. This gives anglers an extra incentive to get out to the lakes

Show Low Lake was stocked with 4,000 rainbow trout. Bear Canyon and Willow Springs Lake received 5,000 fish each. Another 7,000 trout went into Woods Canyon Lake. Fool Hollow Lake and River Reservoir each received 8,000 trout.

The AZGFD hatcheries had a surplus of fish that needed to be stocked into lakes to make room for next year's trout. The fishing should be great -- especially with the cooler temperatures of fall/early winter.

This time of year, try fishing for rainbow trout using green, garlic scented PowerBait or worms. Tiger trout were also stocked for the first time in Arizona this year into Willow Springs and Woods Canyon lakes. Springs and Woods Canyon lakes. Catch tiger trout using lures — they are more aggressive than rainbow trout. Bear Canyon Lake is a hike-in-only lake, but worth the short, steep hike. All others are easily accessible

AZGFD's Sandhill Crane Cam Now Streaming

Live stream offers viewers a unique, convenient experience. der of the day.

Sandhill cranes have returned to southeastern Arizona and the Arizona Game and Fish Department's live-streaming camera is again trained on their wintering grounds at Whitewater Draw Wildlife Area.

'Now is the perfect time to watch these magnificent birds as they winter in Arizona, said Randy Babb, watchable wildlife program manager for the Arizona Game and Fish Department. "This live-steaming camera allows the public to have an unfiltered view of our state's wildlife. It also allows the department to connect the public with wildlife.'

One Of Two In The U.S.

The live stream is one of two in the country that offers viewers a glimpse into crane wintering habits. Each year, sand-hill cranes coming as far away as Siberia travel thousands of miles to winter in southern Arizona.

The best time to view the birds is a half-hour before and up to a half-hour after sunrise, just before they leave the roost to feed for the morning. Cranes also return to Whitewater Draw sometime in the late morning, generally before noon and remain at the wildlife area for the remain-

While the department will do its best to keep the camera focused on the cranes and other interesting wildlife subjects, there will be times it isn't possible due to the unpredict-

ability of wildlife. Viewers who don't see activity when they try the camera are encouraged to routinely check

back. This is especially true in the early winter, when the newly arrived birds are establishing a routine.

Through March/Early April

The live stream is offered from early November when cranes first start to arrive at Whitewater Draw, through March or early April when the birds leave to migrate to northern nesting grounds.

For those who find the live stream viewing fascinating, the department encourages a trip to Whitewater Draw Wildlife Area for a full sensory viewing experience. The sight of up to 10,000 birds is impressive.

About Sandhill Cranes

Worldwide there are 15 cranes scattered across the globe. Most of these are found in Africa, Europe and Asia, and many are either threatened or

endangered due to a variety of reasons with habitat loss being chief among them.

Two species of cranes are found in North America, the endangered whooping crane and sandhill cranes, which is the most abundant crane species on the planet.

Cranes of all species sport long necks. beaks and legs with short tails that are not visible when the wings are closed. Sandhill cranes are predominantly grey with fleshy red caps on their heads. The largest subspecies can stand nearly 4-feet tall and sandhill cranes are long-lived and mate

They are wary birds that shy away from areas of dense vegetation that may conceal predators. Cranes prefer to feed and roost in open areas where potential danger can be seen from a distance. Wintering sandhill cranes often feed on agricultural grain crops but may also frequent open desert and fallow fields.

The sandhill crane live stream is supported by the Wildlife Conservation Fund, which comes from tribal gaming and the Wildlife Viewing Program. You can find out more about wildlife viewing and upcoming public wildlife viewing activities at www.azgfd.com/Wildlife/Viewing.

Three Bull Elk **Poached Near Joseph City**

"The poacher left these animals to waste, and we need assistance from the public to find the individual(s) responsible. This is a senseless act and not the actions of a hunter," said Officer Ken Clay, an AZGFD wildlife manager. "What makes this act so appalling is this particular area is open to elk hunting year round to anyone who purchases a non-permit elk tag over the counter at one of our offices."






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Coyotes Curling Club Invites You To Learn

LOCKETT MEADOW AND SCHNEBLY HILL ROAD

Countless Arizona Sites Are On My 'Bucket List'

I'm an Arizona native, yet there are still countless sites in Arizona that are on my bucket list. My dad took me hunting and camping hundreds of times, and I've seen some gorgeous places - places that aren't on the typical tourist list of places

For instance, on a deer hunt off Dugas Road, I was walking along a small wash when it turned a corner and opened up into a little canyon. There was small stream, maybe a spring, that flowed just a short way before going underground.

I'll Never Forget

A big owl was in a tree by the water. The black rocks, yellow grasses, green tree, brilliant blue sky, and that little bit of water all came together to make that spot one of the most memorable places I've ever been to. I don't even know what it's called, but I'll never forget how it looks.

Arizona is full of small beautiful places like that, but it also has many grand and amazing views like the red rocks of Sedona and the brilliant yellow aspens of Lockett Meadow. I'm telling you about

these places now so that you can mark your calendar and make plans to see the meadow next fall

The red rocks can be visited almost any time of year, but one of the best places to view them is from Schnebly Hill Road. This is a road that would be impassable

Schnebly Hill Road

My dad and I hunted off Schnebly Hill Road several times when I was young, but I had never seen the part that descends into Sedona until John and I decided to make the trip last month. We had just gone up to Flagstaff to see our granddaughter at NAU, and neither of us had ever done the entire Schnebly Hill Road drive.

The weather was iffy - light sprinkles and very overcast. We chose to drive west on the road - from I-17 to Sedona. I'm really glad we did, because we were headed into the views instead of having them in our rear view mirror

Named After Carl Schnebly

The road is named after Carl Schnebly, who used it to transport goods to and from Flagstaff. He also petitioned for a post office, but the names he proposed were too long to fit on a cancellation stamp, so he named it Sedona after his wife.

This road is *rough*. If you start from

I-17, the first few miles are simply very well maintained gravel and the road goes through pine forest. There are several cool places you might want to stop some old water tanks, and an old dam that has been breached and now just backs up a meadow.

Pretty soon, though, you'll reach a point where you can begin to see some of the famous red rock formations around Sedona. This is where the road begins to roughen up, and before long you will be winding down a steep canyon. The views are absolutely incredible, which makes the drive worthwhile

A 4WD Recommended

A 4WD is highly recommended, and don't even try it without, at the very least, a high-clearance vehicle. There are rocks and ruts and drop-offs that will tear off the bottom of a regular car. We took the road in a 4WD pickup truck, and most of the other vehicles we saw were quads and Jeeps. No cars.

If you don't have a 4WD vehicle, you can find Jeep tours out of Sedona online. We saw several of those, but they were all coming up out of Sedona and we were going down.

There are several places where you can pull off and take photos, and seriously, the views will blow you away. Photos don't do them justice – it will be a drive that you will never forget. It took us two hours (it's about 12 miles total, one way), and that's with stopping several times to take

photos and enjoy the view.

I wouldn't try the road if it was snowing, and in fact there are several gates on the road that I'm sure they close in winter.

Several Trails

There are several trails that cross the road several times, and just judging by the terrain, I'd venture to say that those trails must be steep and strenuous. A Red Rock Pass (or America The Beautiful Interagency Pass, Golden Age or Golden Access) is required when leaving your vehicle unattended while you're on National Forest land around Sedona and Oak Creek Canyon.

The Red Rock Pass is \$5 and you can get them almost anywhere in Sedona. You can find out more about that online at the National Forest website. They also have a map that shows you where the pass is needed. Just Google "red rock pass". The road is just south of Munds Park on I-17.

Lockett Meadow

We took the granddaughters to Lockett Meadow years ago, but that was in the

grade pass or paper voucher.

Rules For Christmas Tree Permits

- · Each Christmas tree permit is \$15 and allows permit holders to cut a tree up to 10 feet tall:
- · One tree per household. One person may purchase up to four permits for other families, not living in the household;
- Permits are for personal use only;
- · Trees must be cut within designated cutting areas;
- Trees may be cut November 18 to December 24, and
 - · No refunds on Christmas tree per-

Tree cutters are reminded to be prepared for sudden weather changes and colder conditions when in high elevations. A fun family outing can become miserable and even dangerous with a quick change of weather for the unprepared. The permits expire on December 25, however, Forest officials recommend cutting your tree early in the season before the higher elevations are snow bound. Trees can stay fresh for quite some time if cared for

properly.

To help keep your tree fresh, cut two inches from the bottom of your tree when you get home and place it in water. Keep your tree watered and in a shady spot until you are ready to move it into the house. Another helpful hint is to bring an old tarp to wrap your tree in. Then when you drag your tree out of the forest, the tarp protects the tree and helps you avoid breaking branches. The tarp can also help avoid wind damage on the way home.

low is mostly gizzard shad, but when shad are present, stripers may be close. Don't spend a lot of time fishing in deep water where no fish traces are seen. Instead, focus on the spot where many fish traces are seen on the graph.

The key to identifying shad and stripers is to stop the boat directly over a large concentration of fish at 60 feet. If those fish then form a long horizontal line as they move under the boat it is most likely that they are gizzard shad. If they have some separation between individual fish and are stacked in a hump, it is likely that these fish are stripers. Drop a spoon immediately into the school to quickly catch a lot of stripers in a short time.

Survey Measures How Fish Are Faring This will be the last regular fish report

for 2016. We will be netting fish for our annual UDWR survey during the first two weeks of November. The sample sites are Good Hope Bay, Rincon, San Juan (Piute Canyon), and Wahweap Bay. We compare fish numbers among years to find out how adult fish of all species are faring this year compared to other years dating back as far as 1982. I will report that information midwinter on www.wayneswords.com.

Thanks for reading my reports and using the information to harvest fish that are in high numbers (striped bass, walleye, and smallmouth bass) while protecting those fish that are in low numbers (largemouth bass and crappie). We are a good team that makes fishing at Lake Powell better due to our efforts. I can't wait until next year!

At press time, lake elevation was 3609.82 and water temperature was 65-

phone, take photos/video, provide tracking, or kill the motor if your boat moves from its virtual boundary can stop a theft in its tracks. Once a boat is gone, the BoatUS study finds that only one in 10 vessels are ever fully recovered.

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
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

summer. Even in summer, the meadow is a pretty place, with its little pond, forest, and a nice hiking trail.

The Fall Is Gorgeous

But in the fall! The trees of Lockett Meadow put on quite a show in the autumn - the bright yellow of the aspens against the dark green of the pines is stunning. We even saw a few orange and reddish trees, but for the most part, yellow is king. It is absolutely beautiful. We went in October specifically to see the fall colors and we weren't disappointed.

We took a lot of photos, did a little hik-

ing, and had lunch standing up by the car near the little water hole. It was very busy. In fact, it was difficult to find a place to park so that we could hike the trail. The trail itself was also very busy, to the point of almost never having other people out of sight and hearing. Consequently, we didn't see any wildlife.

When we were here years ago, the trail was an old road. The new route does eventually meet up and follow the old road again, and the trail climbs steadily until you are in the Inner Basin - inside the old volcano. Pretty cool.

In The Summer

In summer there are wildflowers,

birds, and not as many people, but those trees make it all worthwhile. The road up the mountain to Lockett Meadow is steen narrow, and rough. I recommend a 4WD or at least a high clearance. There were a few cars on the road, and the large number of vehicles made the drive even harder - since it is so narrow, there are places where it is very difficult to pass another car coming the opposite way.

Off-road etiquette says that the vehicle facing downhill must back up and give way to the vehicle facing uphill, but not everyone knows this, and there were a lot of very scared drivers on that road the day we were there. So take your time and be kind, and don't even think about taking

an RV or a trailer up there.

Campground First-Come, First-Served

There is a campground at Lockett Meadow with 17 single unit sites, fire rings, picnic tables, and vault toilet. Bring your own drinking water. They don't take reservations, so first-come, first-served.

To get to Lockett Meadow, take Highway 89 northeast from Flagstaff for about 12.5 miles and turn left on Forest Road 552, right across from the Sunset Crater National Monument turnoff. Take this FR552 for about a mile, then follow the Locket Meadow sign. The road is closed late fall to early spring for snow.
