### Summer Entertainment Schedule Announced For Roosevelt Lake Marina



### There's No Time Like The Present To **Prepare Your Watercraft For Boating Season**

AZGFD gives eight tips for ensuring your watercraft is ready for another year.

The official start of the boating season is nearly upon us and many Arizonans are getting ready to pull their favorite watercraft out from storage in preparation for more fun on the water.

To ensure the season is hiccup-free, the Arizona Game and Fish Department recommends that all watercraft owners thoroughly inspect their vessel to help prevent problems



that could keep them off the water. To ensure you encounter only smooth sailing, watercraft owners should conduct the following

1. Registration — Make sure your boat-

ing registration is current. Those needing to renew their watercraft registration can do so 24/7 by visiting www.azgfd.gov and clicking on "Boat Renewals" or at their closest AZGFD regional office.

2. Fuel System — Check the system for any leaks or damages. Give special attention to any fuel lines and connections. Damaged fuel hoses could either be cracked, brittle or soft. Also ensure the engine exhaust and ventilation systems are functioning properly. Before starting your engine, open the engine cover and smell for the presence of fuel vapor. Leave the engine cover off when

### Yes, And Easier Than You Might Have Thought

Not many years ago, the idea of surfing in the desert was absurd. But today, with manufacturers' making boats that you can surf behind, this once far-fetched idea has become a reality.

Despite being able to surf behind a boat, this dream is still unattainable for most, with the average surf-capable boat ranging between \$80,000 and well over \$100,000. Wakes Founder and CEO, Brandon Fish (cover shot shows him surfing at Saguaro Lake), grew up in Arizona, caught up in the surf culture of the day.

Despite his dreams of being able to surf,

location hindered him from obtaining this dream. Though he was able to visit both California and Hawaii, where he was immersed in the culture and sport of surfing, it was never something he could take home

Today, Fish has a vision to change all that

He sees a future where surfing becomes as easy as buying a day pass at a ski resort. Fish's company is offering customers both day and season passes that will allow people to come and experience surfing behind these world-class boats at a fraction of the cost of owning one.

As it is now, to obtain this, a family has to own the boat, and have a vehicle that can transport the boat to the lake. This makes the surfing and wake boarding experience expensive, inconvenient, and time consuming.

### Register your watercraft

Make sure the vessel's registration is current before heading out on the water. It's one of the most important boating requirements needed to operate a watercraft on Arizona waterways.

The registration fee is determined by watercraft length and ranges from \$20 to \$66 for Arizona residents and \$100 to \$495 for non-residents. Skip the line and Spaces or hyphens should appear here. renew your watercraft registration online at www.azgfd.gov/boating

### Renew Online. It's Easy!

The Game and Fish online watercraft registration system allows you to renew your registration and have immediate use of your watercraft. Visit: https://az.gov/app/watercraft. You can also renew your registration by mail or in person at any Game and Fish office.

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### **Know the Rules:** Learn to identify "Navi-Aids"



Arizona law enforcement agencies write many citations for "failure to obey navigation laws." You can help ensure the safety of all on the

water by learning to identify these common navigational aids.



#### Information

Squares indicate where to find food, supplies, repairs, etc. and give directions and other information.

### Controlled

Circles indicate a controlled area such as speed limit, no fishing or anchoraing, ski only or no skiing, or "slow, no wake."



#### Exclusion

Crossed diamonds indicate areas off-limits to all vessels such as swimming areas, dams, and spillways.



### Danger

Diamonds warn of dangers such as rocks, shoals, con-struction, dams, or stumps. Always proceed with caution.

### **Other Non-Lateral Markers**

Safe Water Markers are white with red vertical stripes and mark mid-channels or fairways. They may be passed on either side



**Inland Water Obstruction** Markers are white with black vertical stripes and indicate an obstruction to navigation. You should not pass between these buoys and nearest shore.

### **Mooring Buoy**

Mooring Buoys are round and white with a blue horizontal band and are found in marinas and other areas where vessels are allowed to anchor.

Note, the following actions are il-

Willfully damaging, removing, interfering with, or tying up to a navagation buoy not intended for mooring

◆ Mooring, anchoring, or fastening to shore for more than 14 consecutive days any vessel on public waters.

### Need to borrow a life jacket?

Visitors to lakes Pleasant, Havasu, Saguaro or Mohave needing a life jacket can borrow one at Life Jacket Loaner Stations near each lake's boat ramps.

Stations contain jackets for infants to adults. Please return the jackets so they can be used by others.

Clean, Drain and Dry your boat, It's the Law.





### Multiple Quagga Mussel-Fouled Watercraft From Arizona Intercepted

AZGFD reminds boaters to 'clean, drain and dry' following five impoundments during past month.

Following the recent interception and impoundment (out of state) of multiple quagga mussel-fouled watercraft that had been in Lake Powell or Lake Havasu for extended periods, the Arizona Game and Fish Department reminds boaters to "clean, drain and dry" - and especially decontaminate — their watercraft and equipment before exiting waters designated as having aquatic invasive species.

Five vessels from Arizona waters have been impounded during the past month three in Idaho and two in Colorado.

There is absolutely no reason why boaters are not decontaminating moored boats before leaving a quagga mussel-infected water," said Chris Cantrell, AZGFD's Aquatic Wildlife Branch chief.

AZGFD recently contracted with a local business to provide free decontaminations for those with boats that have been

on a quagga mussel-infected water for more than five consecutive days.

If a boater plans on selling or moving a boat from one of the infected waters, please call AZGFD at (623) 236-7608 or Woods to Water Wildlife Solutions, LLC at (602) 920-4891.

"This way, we can help assist you with the required decontamination to ensure you stay compliant with multiple state and federal laws," Cantrell said.

Quagga mussels colonize rapidly on hard surfaces and can ruin recreational watercraft motors, alter water quality for aquatic wildlife, and clog water-intake structures such as pipes and screens, thereby impacting pumping capabilities for power and water treatment plants.

Under Arizona law, boaters and all recreationists who take watercraft and other equipment out of waters designated

as having aquatic invasive species must use the following steps when leaving that listed water:

Clean: Clean/remove any clinging material from the anchor, boat, motor and hull, trailer (all plants, animals and mud).

Drain: Remove all water drainage plugs (and keep them out during transport). Drain the water from the bilge, live-well and any other compartments that holds water. Drain the water from the engine and engine cooling system(s) You can do this by lowering the outboard. while on the ramp, until the water is re-

Dry: Ensure the watercraft, vehicle, equipment, or conveyance is allowed to dry completely before placing in another water in Arizona. Leaving your plugs out during transport will assist in ventilating and speeding the drying time of those difficult-to-dry areas of your boat.

There are additional steps to complete for watercraft that have been on AISlisted waters for six or more consecutive days. See more information on all statewide decontamination protocols, how to schedule a no-fee decontamination, an intro to invasive quagga mussels, and the Director's Orders lists of aquatic invasive species and waters.

### Ariz. Temperatures Are Warm, But The Water's Still Cold

Area lake temperatures between 50-60 degrees can be deadly.

Arizona's rising temperatures are signaling that the summer heat isn't far off and some residents are already eyeing area lakes, looking to hit the water.

With that in mind, the Arizona Game and Fish Department reminds watercraft users that while temperatures may be warm, water temperatures remain between the 50s and 60s at many of Arizo-

na's boating havens.
"Undoubtedly, we have seen phenomenally beautiful weather lately, but that hasn't done much to warm up our lakes, said AZGFD Boating Safety Education Coordinator Josh Hoffman. "The current lake temperatures would be quite a shock on the system if you were to fall overboard right now. Such a shock can lead to gasping for air, which if you aren't wearing a life jacket could prove to be your last gasp.

Even in a healthy person, cold-water immersion can impact muscle movement, breathing and a person's heart rate. Prolonged exposure to the water can lead to hypothermia, cardiac arrest and death.

If you fall overboard, climb back into



or on top of the boat. If you cannot, stay near the vessel and use oars or anything floating nearby to help stay afloat.

"Area lakes offer year-round family fun even during winter months, but it's critical for everyone to wear a life jacket, Hoffman said. "Should someone fall or be thrown overboard, that life jacket - regardless of water temperature — could very well save your life."

Life jackets aren't just a good idea, they are required by state law for anybody 12 years old and younger when the boat is underway. There must also be at least one life jacket available for everyone aboard.

To ensure watercraft users have life

jackets available, the department has installed 15 Life Jacket Loaner Stations at lakes across the state including Lake Pleasant, Lake Havasu, Lake Mohave, Saguaro Lake, Canyon Lake, Apache Lake, Bartlett Lake, and Patagonia Lake. Boaters needing a life jacket can borrow one, use it on the lake and return it once

Boaters are also encouraged to learn how to practice safe boating techniques and to respond in the event of an emergency by completing a boating safety course. To register for a free course or for more information on boating in Arizona, visit www.azgfd.gov/boating



### **BOATUS CONSUMER ALERT**

### Official-Looking Vessel Documentation Renewal Notices Can Lead To Confusion, Higher Expenses

Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS) Consumer Protection Department is advising boaters with vessels having a US Coast Guard Certificate of Documentation to be wary of any letter arriving by US mail offering renewal.

### **Members Complain**

An increasing number of BoatUS members have complained that these letters direct them to Web sites that may be mistaken for the actual US Coast Guard Vessel Documentation Center located in Falling Waters, W. Va., and appear to show a significant increase in the annual fee to renew US Coast Guard (USCG) documentation.

BoatUS advises that while the USCG does send official annual renewal notices by US mail, other notices being received by members are not from the USCG but rather third-party companies whose name or return addresses may appear similar to that of the official USCG Vessel Docu-

### Letters Look 'Real'

Members of the half-million boat owners group report the letters look like "real" USCG communications. Some examples members have forwarded to BoatUS do not have any disclaimers noting that they are not official USCG correspondence.

While third-party companies may legitimately provide services to assist with

vessel documentation renewals, the US-CG's own renewal process is simple for most vessels and the price, \$26, is often much lower than what third-party services may charge. To renew, go to the USCG National Documentation Center Web site at www.uscg.mil/nvdc and click on "instructions and forms.

To be documented, a vessel must measure at least 5 net tons and, with the exception of certain oil-spill response vessels, owned by a US citizen. Boats about 27 feet in length or longer generally meet the weight requirement.

### **Proposed Boating And Watersport Rules, Fees Approved**

Commission changes need final approval.

The Arizona Game and Fish Commission recently approved several boating and watercraft regulation changes aimed at increasing customer service and public safety on Arizona's waterways.

The commission approved the changes at its April 7 meeting, amending the state's Article 5 rules, which outline boating and water sports regulations and fees. The proposed changes will now be considered by the Governor's Regulatory Review Council on June 6 and, if approved, will become effective Aug. 5.

The proposed changes were recommended as part of a legally required fiveyear review of the department's administrative rules. For more information or to view the complete list of proposed Article 5 changes, visit www.azgfd.com/agency and click on "Rulemaking."

The following are among the proposed changes:

 Requiring a signature be notarized/ witnessed when the seller is not listed as the owner on the current registration or the signature of the buyer or seller is in question.

- Allowing owners to obtain a duplicate watercraft registration/decal at www. azgfd.gov/boating.
- Increasing the valid timeframe for a temporary certificate from 30 to 45 days and allowing a watercraft agent to issue a temporary certificate with the sale of a used watercraft.
- Requiring liveries to affix a placard on the watercraft indicating the business name and phone number, and requiring a person who rents, leases or offers a watercraft for hire to register as a livery.
- craft for hire to register as a livery.

   Requiring a wake surfer to wear a personal floatation device and that an operator ensure an observer is watching if a person is being towed behind the watercraft and/or surfing a wake created by the watercraft.
- Prohibiting teak surfing, which is pulling a person from a vessel's swim platform.
- Requiring towing companies to notify the owner/lienholder that they have taken possession of a vessel within 15



days of obtaining the information from the department.

 Authorizing a third-party vendor to process new watercraft registrations, transfers, renewals and duplicate registrations

The following fee changes are also proposed:

- Watercraft transfer fee to \$13
- Duplicate decal and certificate number fee to \$8
- Dealer certificate of number fee to \$20
- Establish an abandoned/unreleased watercraft application fee of \$100

Transfer of ownership of a towed watercraft application fee to \$100



Tai Au is one of the best-known bass pros in Arizona — he started a *Face-book* page called "AZ Anglers" and there are now over 13,000 members. Tai is all about sharing his love for and knowledge about fishing, which is why he created a place where Arizona anglers could share, ask, learn, and even brag a bit now and

### Started As A Kid

Tai got into fishing when he was just a kid, going out with his dad. His mom and dad were actually "Boat People" from Vietnam, and he was actually born in a car in Tucson. Tai says that now that he looks back on it, his dad was probably fishing for food, sort of living off the land, but Tai loved it.

One day his dad took him to the store and bought him a crankbait, then took him to San Carlos Lake. That's where he caught his first bass and the bass fishing bug.

### Life Got In The Way

Life got in the way of fishing for a while. Tai says that seven years ago he pretty much crashed and burned — he suffered from depression, had no job, lost his house, his truck - lost everything and ended up crashing at his sister's place. Then his brother showed up and took him to the Delta where he fished as a nonboater and took fourth place.

"Fishing turned my life around," Tai says. Now he's a successful insurance agent with a great family, and he never lets fishing get more important than his family and his job.

#### Fishes Tournaments

Tai now fishes Wild West Bass, FLW, US Open, and Won Bass, as well as regional stuff when he is able. He has won \$5,500 since January of 2016 in spite of the fact that he never gets to prefish. His family and work come first. His goal is to fish the FLW tour in five years.

One of the most common questions Tai gets from guys starting out in bass fishing is, "How do I get sponsors?". Tai says it's easy: promote the sport, and you'll end up promoting yourself. Tai Au: Fishing Turned His Life Around

#### **Understand The Seasons**

Tai's tip for Arizona lakes in May is to understand seasonal patterns. This time of year the spawn is still going on, but it's heading to post spawn and the bluegill will be coming up. Then the shad will spawn. He starts using more chartreuse in his baits when the bluegills come up, because they have a chartreuse tint to them. During the shad spawn, he fishes shallow and fast.

So first of all, know the seasonal changes and it will help you on any lake. Look for birds right by the water or even in the water and you will know that shad are nearby.

#### Fish The Conditions

Second, fish the conditions. If the wind is calm, there probably isn't going to be a reaction bite, so put it down until the wind kicks up. If the lake is glass calm, go to finesse baits like senkos, jigs, or drop shot

### **Keep It Simple**

Third, keep it simple and fish effectively. Be eager to learn, but don't overthink things. By fishing effectively, Tai means to choose the bait that will most effectively cover the water. For instance, if the fish are in brush, a crankbait will hang up constantly. A spinnerbait is a better choice in brush

No Secret To Fishing
There's no secret to fishing, Tai says. You just need to be able to learn and adapt. The most important thing is know what you don't know. In other words, which techniques are you not so good at? Can't throw a jig to save your life? Take a couple of days and just fish jigs. Practice until you are versatile enough to fish whatever it takes to catch the bass. Patterns change and you need to be able to change with them.

LAKE POWELL FISH REPORT

### Fishing Is 'Pretty Darn Good!'

Quality of life is measured by the amount of time spent fishing.

BY WAYNE GUSTAVESON

Water temperatures are now up into the spawning zone. Largemouth bass, smallmouth bass and crappie are on beds now. This is the first spawn and we can expect the nest guardians to spawn perhaps two

to three more times before mid-May. Inflow continues to increase the lake level, which is now officially above 3600 MSL. Expect 40 more feet of elevation increase. Make sure to check the boat tie lines each morning if camping on the lake. Weather has been clear but there has been some wind in the evenings and overnight.

Now for the angling roundup: Fishing is pretty darn good!

### **Stripers On Fire**

Stripers are on fire at the dam and many other locations in the southern lake. Most anglers coming into the Wahweap Fish Cleaning station have 20 and sometimes many more fish to clean. Anglers are spreading out along the canyon walls and finding many new "striper honey holes".

Most of the recent reports are coming from Buoy 3 (south wall where the lake turns left just before Antelope Canyon); Power Plant Intake (look for chain link fence on top of the south cliff wall just beyond Antelope Point Marina); Buoy 9 on south wall; East wall before arriving at

My guess is that you can find stripers all along the main channel by searching for rocky outcroppings that offer shal-lower substrate than the steep perpendicular cliff walls. Just chum the chosen spot with anchovies followed by bait on hooks to excite the school. If nothing happens within 15 minutes, just move to the next likely spot on the canyon wall.

### Head Up Lake

If bait fishing is not your choice then head uplake to the southern shore canyons between Labyrinth and West Canyon. We have found willing stripers suspended in each canyon and willing to hit trolled and cast Rattletraps, Lucky Craft Pointers, Flicker Shad and other small jerk baits. These fish are suspended and very easy to see on the graph. Virtually all of the fish graphed today were stripers.

The difficult part is that these fish are holding in their current locations and feeding on plankton while waiting for shad to spawn. They will swim up to taste a shallow running lure but will miss a couple of times before hooking up. We caught our normal 30 fish this morning using this trolling technique.

### **Best News Flash**

Here is the best news flash: Buoy 25 is loaded with fish that are just waiting for

someone to bring some bait. We caught them trolling regularly but we could see hundreds of stripers swimming in shallow water looking right back at us.

The water is crystal clear and the visual experience is awesome. These fish are located in the Mile Marker 25 Cove and not along the steep wall closer to Face Canyon. Look for the longest cove on the south wall for best fishing success.

### **Bass, Crappie Success**

Those seeking bass and crappie are still finding great success. Look for shallow rocky structure where green water clarity is 5-10 feet. Green water is better than crystal clear or muddy brown. Find the good spots by going toward the back of the canyon and watching the structure and water clarity.

Bass grubs, senkos, dropshot shad-shaped worms, chatter baits, spinner baits are all working. We started catching smallmouth bass today on our trolled lures while fishing for stripers. Bass are getting much more aggressive and reacting much earlier in the day with water temperature hitting 60 by about 9 a.m.

### The Best Time To Catch

Next week we are going to be working between Bullfrog and Good Hope Bay. We will tag another 500 walleye for the 2017 Walleye Contest. The best time to catch these fish will be during the month of May. The contest started last year on July 1st which is past the best walleye fishing period. Expect the numbers of tagged walleye that are recaptured to soar in May.

The best spot will be between Bullfrog and Good Hope Bay. It might be a worth a May fishing trip to catch many different species at Lake Powell and maybe even win a prize for catching a tagged walleye.

I am very excited about the potential fishing success over the next six weeks. I recommend you take advantage of this opportunity to enjoy great fishing success and the beauty of Lake Powell.

At press time, lake elevation was 3600, and water temperature was 59-64F.



as volunteers from organizations such as Gila Basin Angler Roundtable and Midweek Bass Anglers. Supporting agency partners include the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Sport Fish Restoration Program, Tonto National Forest, and the National Fish Habitat Partnership-Reservoir Fish Habitat Partnership. ### **Homes For Fish: Habitat Improvement** Project Underway At Roosevelt Lake

In first phase of long-term project on Tonto National Forest lakes, AZGFD biologists sink fish habitat structures.

They are man-made homes for fish, some made of concrete, others of PVC and like building a neighborhood, provide the architecture for sustainable life.

The first step in placing fish habitat into the Central Arizona reservoirs took place on Thursday, April 20 at Roosevelt Lake with Arizona Game and Fish Department biologists dropping Fishiding HighRise structures made of environmentally safe PVC to the bottom of Roosevelt Lake.

These recycled items, 8 feet tall and excellent habitat for crappie, became the first fish homes. AZGFD plans to expand them into fish cities.

### Better Fishing For **Generations To Come**

For anglers, this Tonto National Forest Lakes Habitat Improvement Project will result in better fishing for generations to come in the region's most popular fishing lakes

Also in April, Roosevelt Lake was stocked with 12,000 pounds of crappie fingerlings, as well as 25,000 pounds of 4-inch Florida-strain largemouth bass for the third consecutive year. Roosevelt Lake also is above 70-percent full for the first time since October of 2011. The higher water level has flooded shoreline brush that provides more cover and habitat for spawning fish.

### **Plenty Of Habitat**

The fish habitat improvement project includes placing multiple types of fish habitat around the lake at varied depths to ensure there is plenty of fish habitat available for when water level fluctuates.

Similar work is planned for other lakes along the Salt River chain and Bartlett Lake. The next planned step involves AZGFD biologists using a 36-foot pontoon boat to transport and lower heavier concrete fish habitat structures — critical to anglers' fishing opportunities - into Roosevelt Lake.

This fish habitat project is a cooperative effort with numerous anglers, as well

RIFLE NUMBER TWO

### The Two Gunsmiths Continue Their Restorations

As the first rifle we discussed in previous issues, this one also had a concept of purpose at its foundation. Going back into history, William Jeffery was a competitor of John Rigby Company. Rigby is the oldest firearms manufacturer in England, and had an agreement with the Mauser Company pertaining to importation of their firearms.

In 1900, Rigby requested that Mauser enlarge their Mauser action for larger car-tridges, and in 1911, used this action as the basis for their .416 Rigby Cartridge. Jeffery was thus unable to purchase the enlarged "Magnum" Mauser action. By some significant modification, the standard Mauser action could be modified to take a larger cartridge.

### The Way Jeffery Made Their Rifles

The standard Mauser action was designed around a family of cartridges with a 57mm length designation, and maximum overall lengths in the range of 3.250. The .404 Jeffery however had a length of 3.530. In order to use the standard action, each had to be modified to take a longer, fatter cartridge with a larger case head. This was exactly the way that Jeffery made their rifles.

These rifles were made in grades from basic to extremely fancy, with wood and accessories appropriate to their cost. While the high-grade rifles were purchased by sportsmen of note, the base rifles were purchased by game departments in the African nations for use by their game rangers who patrolled their herds, culling injured or diseased animals, and

protecting against poachers. It was the game warden's rifle that became my vision of the rifle I wanted to build

### The Perfect Starting Point

After a careful search, I found the per-fect starting point. The rifle began life during the buildup of the German Army before the Second World War, in 1937 at Mauser Werke, as evidenced by its S/42 and 1937 markings on the front receiver ring, as well as the military acceptance marks. This was not, however, a collector rifle.

As so many of these rifles, sometime soon after the Second World War, it had been converted to a hunting rifle.

conversion work had included re-barreling, restocking, drilling holes for a receiver sight, and latter for scope mounts. Also at some time in the past, the bolt handle had been changed to clear the ocular end of the scope. The rifle was currently in .30-06 caliber, and most of the work had been nicely done.

### The Look Of Old, Trusted Rifle

One of the features which drew my eye was the stock. It had lines that spoke well to its age and origin. It had the look of an old, trusted rifle. The wood was not really plain, but not of a very fancy figure. It was lighter in color, and would clean up nicely, and yet I wanted it to show some of the marks from its obvious use. The shape of the cheek piece was classic. Also present were a grip cap, forend tip and butt plate. It was, in short, a neat old rifle, and after an exchange of a moderate amount of monetary remunerations, it

### A Pleasing Grain

Looking back, I somewhat regret that I did not fire it in its original (to me) condition, but it was immediately disassembled. The wood was stripped, sanded and filled, with some of the deeper marks left to provide the aged patina of use. A recoil pad from "Limbsaver" replaced the hard butt plate. This rifle was going to be shot after all. Finish was a semi-gloss Tung Oil and showed off the pleasing grain without being too reflective

### **Receiver Modifications Start**

Next came the task of barreling the Mauser receiver with the second barrel that had been ordered. This was a Krieger Chrome Molly Steel barrel that was also a tribute to the barrel maker's art. Fitting and chambering followed the exact process previously described, yet as soon as completed, the barrel and receiver were separated to allow for the start of the modifications to the receiver itself.

First the opening in the bottom of the receiver had to be made longer to allow

the .404 Jeffery loaded cartridges to pass through into the chamber. metal from the rear of the opening to the point where the bolt can first contact the case rim makes up part of the increase This is supported by removal of metal from the rear of the magazine box.

While this can "weaken" the magazine box, it must be remembered that when this rifle was first designed, it was made to withstand the rigors of the battlefield. This is no longer an issue. The remainder of the length is made up by removing a small part of the lower feed ramp, and recontouring the ramp to permit cartridges to feed from the magazine. This must be very carefully done, and prior to starting, you need to understand how the bolt locks into the receiver, and how to avoid weakening that area.

### Careful Attention Must Be Paid

Next, it is important to remember that this new cartridge is also larger in diameter than the original round. This again relates to removal of metal from the internal rails of the receiver, again, using small amounts, and trial and error methods to avoid too much metal removal. The shape of these internal rails is an integral part of

### State Has A Variety Of Terrains And **Habitats – Something For Everyone**

There are 90 wilderness areas in our a total of 4,512,120 acres. That's a lot of country! But what exactly is a wilderness area, what can you do there, and how does a place become a wilder-

A wilderness area is a place where the lands are designated for preservation and protection in their natural state and where the earth and its community of life are untrammeled by men (from the Wilderness

These lands remain undeveloped and no permanent improvement or human habitation is allowed. They are devoted to public purposes of recreation, scenic scientific, educational, conservation, and historic use (Wilderness Act).

#### No Motors Involved

Wilderness areas are set aside for the

enjoyment of the people, and any outdoor activity you can think of is permissible, as long as it doesn't use mechanical transport or motorized equipment. So you can hike, boat, kayak, ski, swim, fish, hunt, bird, etc. — anything you want as long as there are no motors involved.

The National Wilderness Preservation System has 109,127,689 acres, which is just 4.8 percent of the land in the United States. But 52 percent of that is in Alaska, so in the mainland United States just 2.75 percent is set aside as wilderness. This is to protect some of the most beautiful and wild places.

### Four Agencies Share Management

There are four agencies that share the managing of the wilderness areas: Bureau of Land Management, Fish and Wildlife

Service, Forest Service, and National Park Service. They share the responsibility of protecting the wilderness areas from human influence, and they have to take into account things like grazing, access to private lands, mining, fish and wildlife, cultural sites, fire, and even insects and disease

Some wilderness areas have restrictions on group size, campsite location, or

length of stay, and some of the more popular ones even require permits. All of this is to protect the wilderness from people, but also to ensure that the people who use the areas get some solitude

In some places, dogs may be prohibited or only allowed on leashes, and sometimes parts may be closed to protect sensi-

### What's It Like To Visit?


So what's it like to visit a wilderness area in Arizona? We recently visited the Hummingbird Springs Wilderness Area near Tonopah, which is off I-10 west of Phoenix. First of all, it was a bit difficult to find the right road, since on our maps the roads were not numbered, and my favorite mapping app, Trimble, no longer works. But, we did find the road in spite of having no interactive map.

Hummingbird Springs is a bit different—there is a road that goes right along next to it, and that road divides Hummingbird Springs Wilderness from the Big Horn Mountains Wilderness Area. Hummingbird Springs Wilderness Area is 31,200 acres and includes eight miles of the Big Horn Mountains.

#### Tonopah Desert Is Gorgeous In Spring

Gorgeous In Spring

The Tonopah desert is gorgeous in the spring, and there were wildflowers everywhere — the cacti were in bloom and so were the palo verde trees, and there were even tiny flowers about a quarter inch across all over the ground. Bright yellow brittle bush blossoms were massed everywhere.


We saw a deer, many beautiful birds, lizards, ground squirrels, and not a single other human being. The road is rough — it took us over two hours to go 14 miles, which is probably one reason why we never saw any other people.

This isn't a trip you want to do during monsoon season — flash floods are a definite danger. You can even fish for trout in the creek. Start at Bull Pen Ranch for a pretty easy trail that follows the creek for six miles then goes up the northern slope and out of the canyon. It's just east of Camp Verde and you can find maps and information online.

### Miller Peak Wilderness Area

We have also visited Miller Peak Wilderness Area near Sierra Vista in the Huachuca Mountains. This place is gorgeous and includes Miller Peak, which is 9,466 feet high. We took the grandkids up there last summer. The road to the top is one of those narrow, twisting gravel roads that are so much fun to drive. At the end of the road is Ramsey Vista Campground and that's where you can find trailheads to take you into the wilderness.

To get to Ramsey Vista, take highway 92 past Sierra Vista about 8 miles. Turn west onto Carr Canyon Road. It's 7 miles

### Hummingbird Springs, Sugarloaf Mountain

Once you get to the end of the road, a fence bars you from using your vehicle to enter the wilderness area. There is a go-through for walking, and the road is now a hiking trail. It's just over a mile to Hummingbird Springs from the fence. The spring is abandoned and the fins have fallen off the windmill, but the old cachement tanks are there, looking like the foundations of a house.

There are several ruins around, and walking in to the spring is the only way to get a complete view of Sugarloaf Mountain, which is a pretty spectacular place. The base of the windmill is down in a ravine, and there is a hole beneath it with some water in it, so there are lots of animal tracks around. We thoroughly enjoyed our little hike and the drive in.

### West Clear Creek

Another fantastic wilderness area to visit is the West Clear Creek Wilderness Area. It consists of a canyon that is only about a ½ mile to two miles wide, but it's gorgeous and allows you to be by yourself in some of the most gorgeous country in Arizona. There is water down there and if you want to hike the whole canyon, you're going to get your feet wet.

to the campground, and it's all forest up there. Beautiful! You can hike to the top of Miller Peak if you're feeling ambitious. There are toilets and picnic tables at the campground, and there is a small day use fee and camping fee. There are eight campsites.



### **Her CAVIT Story**

A few years back Kelsee was like many high school students; she was trying to find her place in the world. She found herself not really having a "path" in life; her grades were not where she, or her family, wanted them. She had moved high schools and just kind of felt a little lost.

One evening, she and her mother were searching online for ideas of possible careers that she could pursue, or even be interested in pursuing. Her family was full of fire fighters, military members, and other public-service professionals. So naturally, the search started there.

### Her Mom: Her Inspiration

I recently watched some of the videos regarding the Salt River horses that the Arizona Republic was kind enough to film. They showed people who were out with their cell phones and cameras, delightedly taking pictures of the horses. They interviewed a rather portly man who proclaimed that people "should get out and see wildlife; this is amazing".

As I watched these new-found rugged outdoor people looking at horses, suddenly dawned on me how this is the newer generation of wildlife watching. I want to compare how what I consider true wildlife watchers prepare for wild-life viewing and how the "new" wildlife watchers prepare



We get up in the dark and put our camouflage gear and head out to the woods. There is no light, so sometimes we operate out of moonlight, sometimes with a small flashlight. We hike in to a spot that we feel wildlife may be at dawn. The only way to glass for animals is at a higher elevation than they are.

We pick our way up through some-times rocky, sometimes steep, areas to reach a spot for glassing. We slowly and quietly set up our tripods and binoculars and prepare for that gray light of dawn to begin watching for wildlife.

Scanning up to a mile out, we intently watch for movement or shapes of animals that hopefully are heading back to their beds for the day. Wild animals have adapted to the fact that traversing during daylight hours is not conducive to long-term health. They are wary and move cautiously as light begins to filter

through the trees

With a practiced eye, you can follow them for a while, watching to see how they behave, how they are constantly assessing their environment looking for

Life as a wild creature is not guaranteed and predation is a reality.

### **New Style**

A great morning breakfast after a long night's sleep, perhaps at a Denny's, perhaps at another of the chains thatoffer great breakfasts. Making sure the vehicle is packed with the appropriate goodies, they depart for the Beeline highway. The long half-hour trip makes way to the low desert that holds the Salt River horses.

A three-week-old bobcat kitten snatched from the wild. An abandoned baby otter found hungry and dehydrated in an East Valley canal.And a malnourished, sickly "kidnapped" deer fawn.

It's not another day at the local zoo. It's a typical day at the Arizona Game and Fish Department's Adobe Mountain Wildlife Center, where wildlife experts work daily to rehabilitate and save some of the state's 800-plus native wildlife spe-

It's often a thankful, albeit costly, job.

To help defray rising costs of caring for Arizona's wildlife, AZGFD recently began its "Be a Hero for Wildlife" donation campaign to give the public an opportunity to support its efforts to treat sick, injured, orphaned and confiscated wildlife by texting CRITTER to 41444 from any smartphone.

"All this dedication and care comes at a great cost," said Mike Demlong, who manages AZGFD's Wildlife Center and Wildlife Education programs. "Many of

the animals that come to us require exten-

sive medical treatments, X-rays, monitoring and specialized care, and those expenses are considerable. It's rewarding work, especially when it comes to helping some of our younger, more vulnerable

On April 14, it was a three-week-old bobcat kitten turned in by a member of the public, who intended to raise it as pet The individual ultimately turned it over at the urging of a family member, who saw a Valley TV news story earlier that evening of a deer fawn that was kidnapped from the wild and being raised as a pet

In both cases, each of the animals required extensive care, attention and resources just to keep them alive. The malnourished deer fawn alone continues to require a specialized diet, vitamin supplements and injections, and daily monitoring to make it healthy enough to eventually live out its days in a zoo.

Nearly one month later, the depart-

ment has spent about \$4,500 and counting to rehabilitate the kidnapped deer fawn. A six-day stay for the bobcat kitten cost the department \$3,000.

Unfortunately, the department does not receive state general fund dollars. That's what makes donations that much more important," Demlong said


We are certainly headed in that direction today. That movie is far closer to the reality of today than the creators would have thought so many years ago.

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### These Steps Help Minimize Cases Of Swimmer's Itch At Desert Lakes

With recent reported cases of swimmer's itch at Canyon Lake, there are some preventive measures that swimmers and families can take while visiting the lakes northeast of Phoenix to reduce the odds of contracting the skin rash. Preventive measures include -

- · Avoid swimming or wading in shallow water with submerged vegetation
  - · Avoid marshy areas
- · Avoid shallow areas where snails commonly are found
- · If you feel a tingling sensation on your skin, leave the water immediately and brisklyyou're your skin with a
  - · Towel dry or shower right after leav-

ing the water

Swimmer's itch, also known as cercarial dermatitis, is caused by an allergic reaction to microscopic parasites (larvae) of certain flatworms that can be encountered while swimming. These larvae burrow into the swimmer's skin, and may cause an allergic reaction and rash. Because these larvae cannot develop inside a human, they soon die.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, swimmer's itch is not contagious and is rarely dangerous. However, it can be uncomfortable as symptoms include -

• Tingling, burning, or itching of the

popular outdoor activities. Providing good places for anglers to fish is one of AZGFD's primary goals. Five of the biggest and most popular lakes to fish are located in central Arizona and are managed by Salt River Project for the Valley's water supply: Roosevelt Lake, Apache Lake, Canyon Lake, Saguaro Lake, and Bartlett

### Program Began In 2014

In 2014 the Department embarked on a program to improve fisheries habitat in the reservoirs of central Arizona and restore the fisheries to their former glory days. All five of these lakes are more than 70 years old, and Roosevelt Lake is more

than 100 years old. Over time, reservoirs lose quality fish habitat through decomposition of the natural vegetation that was flooded, particularly where water levels fluctuate wildly, such as at Roosevelt.

Similarly, one of the largest and most successful fish habitat projects in the nation, the Lake Havasu Fishery Improvement Program, has been ongoing since 1993 and is credited with improving sport fish habitat in this Colorado River reservoir.

The Tonto National Forest is the land management agency for five of the biggest and busiest fishing lakes in Arizona. In 2013, the economic value to the state of Arizona associated with these five lakes was estimated to be more than \$318 mil-

the controlled round feeding of this type of action, and the transition of the cartridge from the magazine to the chamber should be smooth. Careful attention must be paid to angles as you move the rail taper forward to accommodate the more forward shoulder of the new case

### The Magazine Box

Another issue is the Magazine Box While the removal of metal from the rear made some additional room, doing the same to the front will not provide the room needed, as the loaded cartridges are still too long. The usual old school remedy was to remove the front of the magazine box, and make an extension which is welded or silver soldered into place.

As this rifle was going to be glass-bed-ded anyway, we decided to try something different. With hard kicking calibers, we can mix finely ground particles of stain-less steel into the bedding material for increased strength. For this rifle, we re-

moved the front of the magazine box and when we glass-bedded the bottom metal, formed the front of the magazine box with the reinforced bedding material. After final shaping, the new front was polished to ensure smooth feeding of cartridges.

### The Next Steps

The next steps were to open up the face of the bolt and the extractor to accommodate the larger diameter of the .404 cases hase As a final modification to the extractor, a bevel was cut into the front face of the extractor to allow it to snap over a cartridge rim if a round had to be single loaded into the chamber. Cartridge feeding was then refined by polishing surfaces where needed.

- · Small reddish pimples
- Small blisters

Use of Corticosteroid cream, applying cool compresses to the affected areas, bathing in Epsom salts or baking soda, applying baking soda paste to the rash and use of an anti-itch lotion may provide relief.

first starting so you can inspect for proper functioning of the engine.

- 3. Belts, Cables And Hoses As with fuel lines, inspect all belts, cables and hoses that may have been damaged while in storage. Inactive items can become brittle and may crack. Ensure belts are fitted tightly and that there are no cracks on the outer jacket of the throttle, shift and steering control cables.
- **4. Electric System** Inspect all electrical connections to ensure they are clean, tight and corrosion free. All electrical systems should be regularly inspected by a qualified technician.
- 5. Fluid Levels Check all fluid levels including engine oil, power steering, power trim reservoirs and engine coolant. Also be sure to change the engine oil, oil filter and drive lubricants.
- 6. Propellers And Hulls Ensure propellers are free of dings, pitting, cracks and distortion, and that they are secured properly. On the hull, inspect for blisters, distortions and cracks. Also make sure

the vessel's drain plug is in place before launching.

7. Safety Gear — Check to ensure all life jackets are still in good condition, that they are the right size and fit for your passengers. On average in Arizona, life jackets should be replaced every five years. Remember that state law requires anyone 12 and under must wear a life jacket at all times when the vessel is underway and there should be one life jacket aboard for every passenger.

Don't forget that a throwable flotation device — usually a cushion with handles or a ring buoy — is required for all watercraft longer than 16 feet, except for canoes and kayaks. Also check to ensure the fire extinguisher is fully charged and stowed in the proper location.

8. Take A Safety Course — The department offers free courses in Phoenix and Lake Havasu City every month to provide water users the information and tips needed to stay safe while on the water.
